### Tawas Beach Regatta.

The Tawas Beach Yachting Association, encouraged by the interest manifested in the race between Cadillac and Detroit off Tawas beach last year, has offered a special prize of \$250 for a race between any two of the following: Cadillac, Detroit, Milwaukee or Iroquois. The races will come off between August 1 and 10, but the date has not been definitely set, in order that no conflict will occur with the Put-in-Bay or Montreal races. A total of \$750 in cash prizes, three cups and a number of pennants will be offered by the club which claims the list to be the largest ever offered on the lakes. The Detroit & Mackinac railroad, which is fostering the association, will assist in providing social enjoyments for visiting yachtsmen and a big fish supper will be given at the close of the meet. The following prize list is announced:

First day—\$100 first, \$50 second, \$25 third.

Second day—\$100 first and D. & M. cup, first; \$75 second, \$50 third.

Third day—Power yacht races—\$85 in three prizes and Bay City Tribune cup to the first. Free-for-all for sailors—\$65 in three prizes and Commodore's cup to first.

For 21-footers and over "Rudder" measurements will be used.

## EASTER SERMON.

### The Resurrection as a Practical Force in Christianity.

The above is the theme of the Easter sermon preached by Rev. E. King, of Tawas City M. E. church, last Sunday morning. The text was chosen from Matt. 28:6—"He is risen." and the following is the discourse:

"He is risen!" what comfort do these words give to the disciples of Christ! For nearly nineteen centuries the hearts of myriads of Christ's followers have beaten with a more confident hope, for this victory over death and the grave. No point of Christian doctrine has been so violently and yet so hopelessly attacked as that of the resurrection of the Son of God. If the incarnation, the divinity and miracle-working powers of Christ be admitted, "why should it seem a thing incredible that God should raise the dead?" No intellect has been so keen, nor any argument so clear and strong as to be able to disprove the fact of the Christ and Christian resurrection. It stands like Gibraltar, and the angry torrents of disbelief do not shake it. The resurrection is the challenge of Christ to His enemies and the powers of hell. It is no cunningly devised fable, as some would prove it, but a fact of history, the Christian's hope. With His crucifixion the doctrines of Christ were condemned; with His body they were buried in Joseph's new tomb; when He rose they rose with Him. But for the resurrection He and His teachings would soon have been forgotten.

Therefore, it is fitting that we should commemorate the event with gladness of heart and joyfulness of spirit this Easter Sabbath morning. As we recall the ecstasy of the disciples and the women at the holy sepulchre in contrast with their anxiety of a few hours previous, we also rejoice that we can say, "He has risen!" And He now sitteth at the right hand of the Father, making intercession for us. His promise was that the bodily temple should be rebuilt in three days and He fulfilled the promise. Why shall we not believe and expect the fulfillment of the promise that we also shall rise from the grave and come forth on the resurrection morning, to receive our recompense of joy or sorrow? It is indeed a satisfaction to the righteous to know that their labors will be rewarded and their ideals realized in the continuance of the soul life beyond the grave, where it is not limited by the human infirmities of our present existence. Indeed our spiritual instinct and longing would not be satisfied were we not assured of the immortality of the soul.

This doctrine does have a positive value, and an enormous influence over the life of the individual. Paul says, "a power to beget; begotten by the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead!" But what does it beget and what is its influence?

1. It makes us possessors of all the facts of the gospel.

It is the primary link of the truths of Christianity. Even Calvary's scene can bring no greater satisfaction to human conscience, though we would not minimize the great atoning act on Golgotha's hill, but the religion that does not take us beyond the cross, pointing us to a dead instead of a living and resurrected Savior, does not have the begetting power of living faith, and fails to bring us into possession of the fullness of Christian joy and experience.

We are reminded of the child of the fable. She was playing on the sand by the sea. In her play she picked up a bright jewel. She discovered that it was fastened to a slender filament of gold. As she pulled on it another jewel came into sight. Standing enchanted she kept pulling, and link followed link, and jewel followed jewel. As the chain grew in this way, amazed she cast it about her neck and shoulders until she was bedecked like a royal princess. So the man that has gotten hold of this first link of the chain of evangelical Christian truth, and if he will keep on pulling he will find himself possessed of the whole system of God's glorious gospel, and

**Supervisors' Proceedings.**

(Continued from last week.)

To the Hon. Board of Supervisors of Iosco Co.: Your committee on judiciary, to whom was referred the report of the county clerk made at the January meeting of this board, for investigation, would respectfully report as follows, and advise the passage of suitable resolutions carrying into effect the recommendations herein made.

Your committee met in the court house in the city of Tawas City, Wednesday, Jan. 28, in response to the call of the chairman. The bills satisfied out of the different funds enumerated by the county clerk in his report were looked up and each item as reported was found to be correct.

In the examination of the bills allowed for the year 1902, several were found which in the minds of your committee constitute a needless expense on the county. Especially is this true of the poll books furnished by the county at every election at quite a large expense. These books instead of decreasing the amount of work which necessarily falls upon an election board, manifestly increase it—instead of simplifying matters their tendency is clearly to complicate. We find that these books are made to accommodate the names of some 750 voters, whereas there isn't a voting precinct in the county that polls more than 100 votes at each election. One sheet of common foolscap paper would answer the purpose of this book for which the county is charged the sum of 75 cents. We would therefore recommend that the county clerk be instructed to discontinue supplying the various voting precincts in the county with these books out of the county funds and that townships or cities desirous of continuing their use be compelled to supply them out of such township or city funds.

Furthermore, inasmuch as objection has been made by this board to the action of county officials in purchasing necessary supplies for their respective offices, and having the bills for same sent to the board for allowance after the supplies have been ordered and accepted, we would recommend that a resolution be adopted by this board authorizing and making it the duty of the committee on public buildings and repairs to make all such purchases of such supplies amounting to more than \$5.

Moved by Searle supported by Wood that report of committee on judiciary be accepted and adopted. Carried by the following vote: Yeas 18, Nays 0.

Resolved, That the supervisors of the city of Tawas City and the supervisor of Tawas township be and are hereby authorized to spread upon their respective rolls the several items of rejected taxes as shown by the report of the auditor general to the county treasurer last made.

Moved by Waterbury supported by Anschutz that resolution be adopted. Carried by following vote: yeas 18, nays 0.

Moved by Macfarlane supported by Searle that bill of prosy atty for \$50, for extra compensation be referred to judiciary committee for investigation as to work done and present state of cases, and report to this board at 1 p m.

Carried by following vote: Yeas—Brown, Jackson, Karus, King, Macfarlane, Ramage, Rawden, Stockman, Searle, Venners, Sutherland—11. Nays—Dimmick, McDonald, Anschutz, Patterson, Waterbury, West, Wiltzie, and Wood—5.

Chairman appointed supvr Anschutz on judiciary committee in place of supvr Ely. Chairman appointed supvr King in place of W O Emery, and A F McDonald in place of Thos G McCausland on committee on salaries of county officers.

On motion board took a recess until 1 p m standard time.

Afternoon Session.

Board called to order by chairman at 1 p m.

Quorum present. Your committee on salaries of county officers, to whom was referred the request of county treasurer Stockman for extra compensation for clerk hire, would recommend that request be denied.

Thos Jackson, Wm West, Edwin Rawden, A F McDonald, E L King, Committee.

Moved by Brown supported by Macfarlane that report be accepted and placed on file. Carried by unanimous vote.

Moved by Brown supported by Venners that county treasurer be allowed \$100, for extra clerk hire. Lost by following vote: Yeas—Brown, Dimmick, McDonald, Macfarlane, Patterson, Ramage, Rawden, Stockman, Venners, Waterbury, Wiltzie—11. Nays—Jackson, Karus, King, Anchutz, Searle, West, Wood—7.

Moved by Waterbury supported by Brown that committee on public buildings, supplies and repairs be authorized to purchase an atlas of Iosco county as published by The Consolidated Publishing Company of Minneapolis, Minn. Carried by following vote: yeas 13, nays 0.

Moved by McDonald supported by Waterbury that this board recommend to each township board of the county of Iosco that they purchase a copy of the Iosco county atlas published by The Consolidated Publishing Company of Minneapolis, Minn. Carried by unanimous vote.

Following resolution was offered by supvr Waterbury, same being supported by supvr Macfarlane:

Resolved, That the committee on buildings and supplies be instructed to purchase 100 plats of each township and city in the county of The Consolidated Publishing Co, for the use of the townships and cities and that these plats be and remain the property of the county. Carried by following vote:

Yeas—Brown, Jackson, King, McDonald, Macfarlane, Patterson, Ramage, Rawden, Stockman, Searle, Venners, Sutherland, Waterbury, West, Wiltzie, Wood—16. Nays—Dimmick, Karus, Anschutz—3.

To the Hon. the Board of Supervisors of Iosco county:

Your committee on judiciary to whom was referred the matter of allowing the bill of the prosy atty for \$50, for services in small-pox cases, would recommend that the bill be allowed, provided that this amount be full compensation for services performed and to be performed with reference to said cases unless carried to higher court, with the understanding that the prosecuting attorney shall use his utmost endeavors to prosecute the same.

Chas T Venners, Edwin Rawden, Geo C Anschutz, H A Brown, Thos Jackson, Committee on Judiciary.

Moved by Brown supported by Rawden that report of committee on judiciary be accepted and adopted. Carried by following vote:

Yeas—Brown, Dimmick, Jackson, King, Macfarlane, Patterson, Ramage, Rawden, Stockman, Searle, Venners, Waterbury, Wiltzie—18. Nays—Karus, McDonald, Patterson, West, Wood—5.

Moved by Patterson supported by Ramage that expense bill of prosecuting attorney, amount \$30.20, be allowed. Carried by following vote: Yeas 17, nays—West—1.

Moved by Brown supported by Macfarlane that county treasurer be allowed \$90, for clerk hire for year 1903.

Moved by Wood supported by Ramage as an amendment that county treasurer be allowed \$100, for clerk hire for year 1903. Lost by following vote:

Yeas—Brown, Dimmick, McDonald, Macfarlane, Patterson, Ramage, Rawden, Stockman, Venners, Waterbury, Wiltzie, Wood—14. Nays—Jackson, Karus, Anschutz, Searle, West—6.

Vote was then taken on original motion.

Carried by following vote: Yeas—Brown, Dimmick, King, McDonald, Macfarlane, Patterson, Ramage, Rawden, Stockman, Searle, Venners, Waterbury, Wiltzie, Wood—14. Nays—Jackson, Karus, Anschutz, West—4.

Moved by Brown supported by Wood that board adjourn until tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock. Motion lost. YEAS 9, NAYS 9.

After some further discussion it was moved by Waterbury and supported that board adjourn, which motion prevailed. Whereupon, the board was adjourned until tomorrow morning at nine o'clock, standard time.

Wednesday, March 25, 1903.

The Board of Supervisors of Iosco county met in the court house in the city of Tawas City, Mich., on Wednesday, the 25th day of March, 1903, at nine o'clock a. m., pursuant to adjournment from yesterday.

The board was called to order by chairman Geo Sutherland, who ordered the clerk to call the roll.

Present—Supervisors Brown, Dimmick, Jackson, Karus, King, McDonald, Macfarlane, Patterson, Ramage, Rawden, Stockman, Venners, Sutherland, Waterbury, West, Wiltzie, Wood—17. Quorum present.

The minutes of yesterday's proceedings were at this time read by the clerk and there being no objection they were declared by the chairman unanimously approved.

Moved by Searle supported by Brown that the \$5 deducted from Dr Gates bill for performing post mortem on Mrs Sholtz be allowed. Carried by following vote:

YEAS 15, NAYS 0.

Moved by Waterbury supported by Rawden that prosecuting attorney be instructed to investigate as to whether services at post mortem of Mrs Sholtz for which bills have been presented to this board were actually performed, and if not why said bills were certified to by the coroner. Carried by unanimous vote.

Moved by Waterbury supported by Karus that bill of Dr Gates for expert testimony at inquest on Mrs Sholtz, amt \$10, be allowed. Carried by following vote: YEAS 17, NAYS 0.

Moved by Brown supported by Jackson that bill of C Curry for livery hire, amount \$3 00, be allowed. Carried by following vote: Yeas 17, nays 0.

The following resolution was offered by supervisor Waterbury, the same being supported by Patterson:

WHEREAS, It appearing that the work of this board could be greatly expedited and much expense saved the county by a change in the method of auditing accounts; therefore, be it

Resolved, That we recommend that at the first meeting of the board of 1903 that the chairman appoint three committees on claims to consist of three members each, to be designated as committees No 1, No 2, and No 3.

That to committee No 1 be submitted all claims for purchases of material and supplies and miscellaneous accounts.

That to committee No 2 all claims of sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, constables, justices of the peace, and poor commissioners.

That to committee No 3 all claims emanating from health boards, probate office, and for payment of physicians in post mortem cases and expert testimony in criminal cases.

Carried by following vote: yeas 17, nays 0. The following resolution was offered by supervisor Waterbury, same being supported by Karus:

Resolved, That the committee consisting of supervisors Rawden and Venners be and are hereby appointed a board as a committee of compilation of bills, whose duty shall be to compile from the journal of this board such resolutions as have from time to time been adopted, intended to govern the action of this board in matters of allowance of claims in special cases and such other resolutions as may seem to them proper and necessary for the information of members of the board, and that this compilation be submitted at the next regular meeting of this board; and further, be it

Resolved, That we recommend that this board authorize the printing of this compilation with the next edition of the rules of order of the board of supervisors of Iosco county.

Adopted by the following vote: yeas 17, nays 0. Resolved, That the sum of one thousand five hundred dollars be and is hereby appropriated or so much thereof as may be necessary for the purpose of constructing fire-proof vaults for the safe keeping of county records, according to plans and specifications furnished by Messrs A C Varney & Co, architects, said plans being hereby adopted.

Resolved, That this board appoint upon nomination of its chairman, a competent person to superintend the construction of such vaults, who in conjunction with the county clerk and probate judge, shall constitute a committee whose duties shall be to advertise for bids for the construction of such vaults, to fill the contract to the lowest responsible bidder or bidders from whom sufficient bonds for the fulfillment of their contract shall be required, and to draw orders upon the county treasurer to pay for work done and material furnished.

Resolved, That the county treasurer be and is hereby authorized to pay the orders drawn upon this fund by the county clerk countersigned by the probate judge and certified to by the superintendent of construction.

Moved by Patterson supported by Wiltzie that above resolution be adopted. Carried by following vote: Yeas 16, nays 0.

On order of chairman the several committees retired to their several duties and the balance of the board was given a recess subject to call of the chair.

The board was called to order by the chairman at 11:15 a m.

The chairman nominated supvr Waterbury as supt of construction of the vaults as provided by resolution of the board.

Moved by Rawden supported by Venners that the nomination of the chairman be confirmed. Carried by following vote:

Yeas 16, nays 0.

Easter Sermon.

(Continued from 1st page.)

adorned with every shining privilege with the gift of divine grace.

II. It confirms our faith in the over-rule of God in the human world and in the ultimate triumph of His Son.

There are many things happening in this world that discourage our belief in the sovereignty of God and divine government.

The prospect of accomplishment of the Savior's mission seemed well-nigh hopeless and His efforts mispent when darkness settled on the earth and around the cross of a crucified Christ.

As we speak of the over-rule of God, so may we speak of the onward and triumphant march of the cause of Christ.

III. It interprets nature to man. Christ made nature a book of God. He used it as a parable of the spiritual and made its pages legible.

But there is a symbolism in nature which speaks to us of the resurrection—though the doctrine is never reached through nature alone.

At the close of autumn we see nature putting on a shroud and passing into the grave of winter.

The Resurrection of Christ gives dignity to the common grub which lies in our pathway and which we trample under foot without a single thought.

IV. It is the source and spring of the new and higher life in man.

Paul says, "He is our life"—the risen Christ—the Christ at the right hand of the throne.
