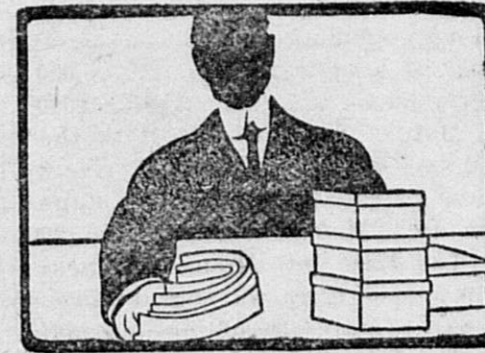

Church Debt Cancelled.

It was with a great deal of pleasure and surprise that the people of Christ Church, East Tawas, heard the news on Trinity Sunday, that the mortgage had been cancelled. This mortgage has been hanging on the church property since June 15, 1893, when the Rev. R. T. W. Webb, now of Mount Clemens, Mich., was rector. The loan of \$1000.00 was made by the trustees, Messrs. C. W. Luce, C. H. Chamberlain and D. D. Wessels, from the American Church Building Fund Commission of New York, and from June, 1893, the people have worked hard, under many difficulties, to clear the property of debt. An effort was made by the Woman's Guild to pay \$200 each year on the principal, but it was not done. In 1901 but \$300 had been paid on the principal, and \$404.24 on the interest. April, 16, 1899, the building was partially destroyed by fire. The following entry was made in the register by the rector, the Rev. Geo. W. Wye, "At 4 p. m. Christ Church was discovered to be on fire; the vestry, organ, chancel, two windows and inside of roof badly damaged, also carpet, books, etc., with smoke, fire and water, also ceiling and south end of guild room." From this time, services were held in the Baptist chapel, until Oct. 29, 1899, when the congregation moved back into their church.

June, 1st, 1901, there had been paid but \$300. Sept. 1901, there remained \$600; Jan., 1903, \$500; March 1903, \$242, and about \$31 interest. June 1, 1903, the mortgage was cancelled by a gift from the Michigan Church Building Fund Commission, and the church now awaits consecration, which will probably take place when the Bishop comes for confirmation, some time in July.

There has been cleared away to date in the present year \$261.44 of the floating indebtedness, by a gift from the treasurer, C. W. Luce, \$222.50 of the principal by the sale of lands; \$271 by gift from the Michigan Board, besides \$40 paid by the Woman's Guild, making a total of \$784.94.

The church at East Tawas has been under the care of the Rev. R. T. W. Webb, April 14, 1889 to July 14, 1895, the Rev. Edward H. Earle, Aug. 1st, 1895 to Easter Day, 1896; the Rev. J. O. Miller, July 1st, 1896, to Aug. 31, 1897, assisted by a lay reader, A. H. Wilson; the Rev. Geo. E. Wye, Oct. 3, 1897, to July 27, 1902; the Rev. Frank A. Saylor, March 1st, 1903, to present time.

The building itself is one of the most complete of its size in all its appointments, lacking only an organ to help in the service (the pipe organ was destroyed in the fire of 1899, and nothing has been done to replace it) It is churchly throughout and makes one feel that one is in the presence of God, to enter its doors. As God has been so good to us in the past, may He bless our work in the future to His own glory. F. A. SAYLOR, Rector.

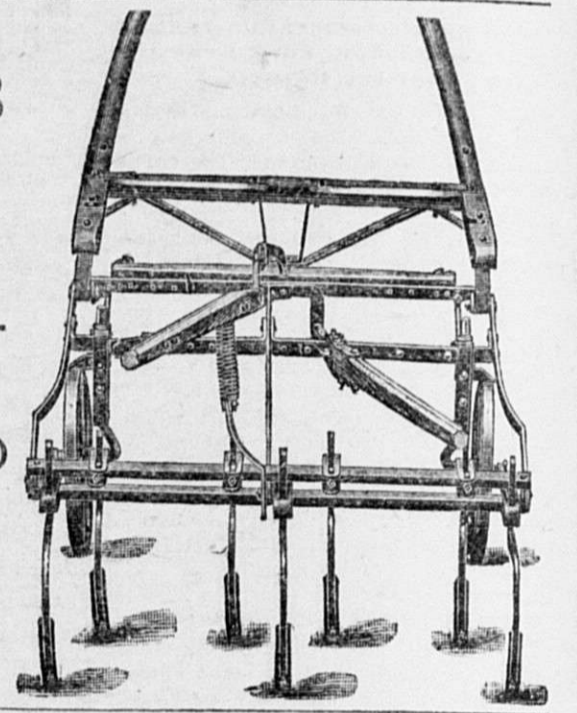

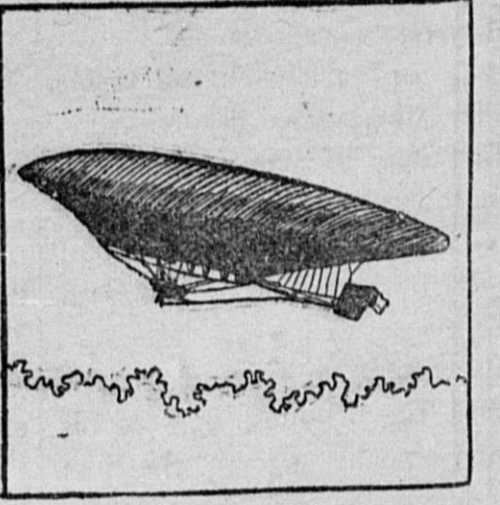

AERIAL TRAVELING.

The Lebandy Air Ship Brings It Into the Domain of Reality. The airship constructed for the Lebandy brothers of Paris has made a highly successful trip under Pilot Juohmes and Engineer Rey. The start was made from St. Martin during a light rain and with a brisk wind blowing. The dirigible craft passed over the cathedral spire, and left that town, going diagonally against the direction of the wind was coming from. Over Limay, Mantes and Rosny the air ship was put through a series of evolutions, and answered her helm and maneuvered to the perfect satisfaction of all interested in her. She then re-

turned to her point of departure, where she descended without accident. The distance covered was thirty-seven kilometers in one hour and thirty-six minutes against Santos-Dumont's record for the Deutsch prize of eleven and one-half kilometers in thirty minutes. The Lebandy air ship is similar to the form adopted by M. Santos-Dumont, but is twice as large, the length being about 177 feet and the greatest diameter thirty-three feet. The casing, which weighs over three-quarters of a ton, consists of two thicknesses of cotton tissue, between which there is a thin layer of india rubber. It is capable of resisting a pressure equal to 1,700 kilograms, though its weight does not exceed 330 grams per square meter. The seams are covered with india rubber bands, fixed with a solution, and the entire cover has been several times varnished with a special substance termed ballonnine. The car of the balloon is constructed of steel tubes bound together with piano wire. A cloth covering has also been fixed in such a way that it can be opened out and utilized as a parachute in case of accident. A forty horse power motor supplies motive power to two screws placed on either side of the car.



CHIMNEYS OF CONCRETE.

In a gorge of rock little more than 200 feet wide the United States government has decided to construct a dam of solid masonry at the Tonto basin site that will create in the valleys of the upper Salt river and Tonto creek in Arizona the largest artificial lake in the world. From it the now arid plain will be irrigated and millions of gallons of water will be secured for every acre of lower valleys tributary to these streams. Water power will be used in generating electricity for the construction of the dam. Great quantities of lime and clay in the vicinity will be available for the hydraulic manufacture of cement, to be used in the bottom and sides of the reservoir. The great basin will impound storm waters in sufficient volume to reclaim and liberally irrigate approximately 200,000 acres of land. The cost of construction will amount to \$2,500,000. The length of the artificial lake is estimated at thirty miles, and the average width will be about ten miles.

Chimneys of Concrete.

One of the latest uses of the combination of steel and concrete for building purposes has been exemplified at Los Angeles, Cal. An enormous chimney for the power station of a number of electric roads was constructed of that material. The height of this chimney from the base (which was fifteen feet below ground) was 180 feet. The lower portion was eighteen feet square, outside measurement, but at an elevation of fifty-one feet the structure assumed a cylindrical form and had a diameter of fifteen feet two inches. In order to give greater strength to the structure twisted steel bars were arranged in the concrete, both vertically and horizontally, in accordance with a well known patented system.

Greatest Pumping Plant.

The greatest pumping plant in the world is one which draws 5,000,000 gallons of water a day 387 miles to the gold fields at Bulla Bulling, Australia.

Animals and Poisons.

Certain substances which are deadly in their effects upon men can be taken by the brute creation with impunity, says the Family Doctor. Horses can take large doses of antimony, dogs of mercury, goats of tobacco, mice of hemlock and rabbits of belladonna, without injury. On the other hand, dogs and cats are much more susceptible to the influence of chloroform than men, and are much sooner killed by it. If this invaluable anesthetic had been first tried upon animals we should probably have never enjoyed its blessings, as it would have been found to be so fatal that its discoverers would have been afraid to test its effects upon human beings.

Watch the Overflow Pipes.

All waste and overflow pipes, from that of the refrigerator to the kitchen sink, become foul with grease, lint, dust and organic matter that are the result of bacterial action. They are the direct source of contamination of the atmosphere of the entire house. All such pipes should be flushed generously once a day and the kitchen sink pipe with clear boiling water. Once a week flush all pipes with a boiling solution of washing soda and give them a monthly flushing with caustic potash. Avoid injury to the metallic rims of these pipes by using a large funnel.

To Polish Windows.

The best way for polishing windows is a small hand mop made of scraps of canvas. Pieces no larger than a dollar can be used, and if well worn the mop will work so much the better. String them all together on a piece of strong twine, then tie together in a bunch. When dirty wash it out dry and before using rub it soft between your hands.

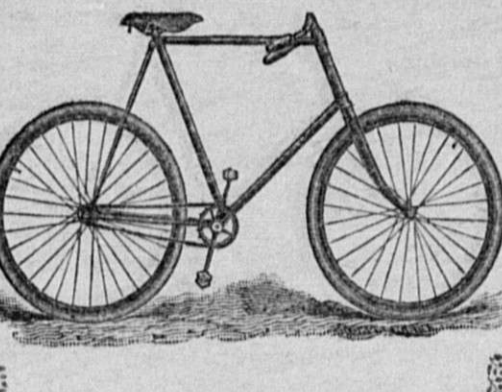
