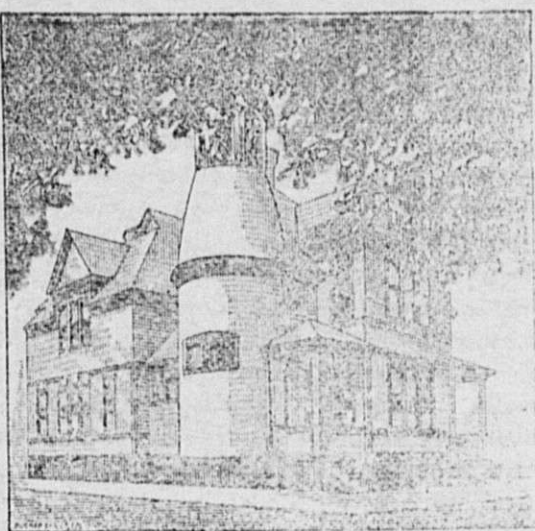

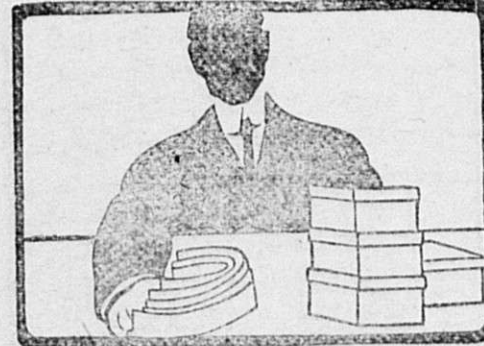

Miniature Swiss Clock.

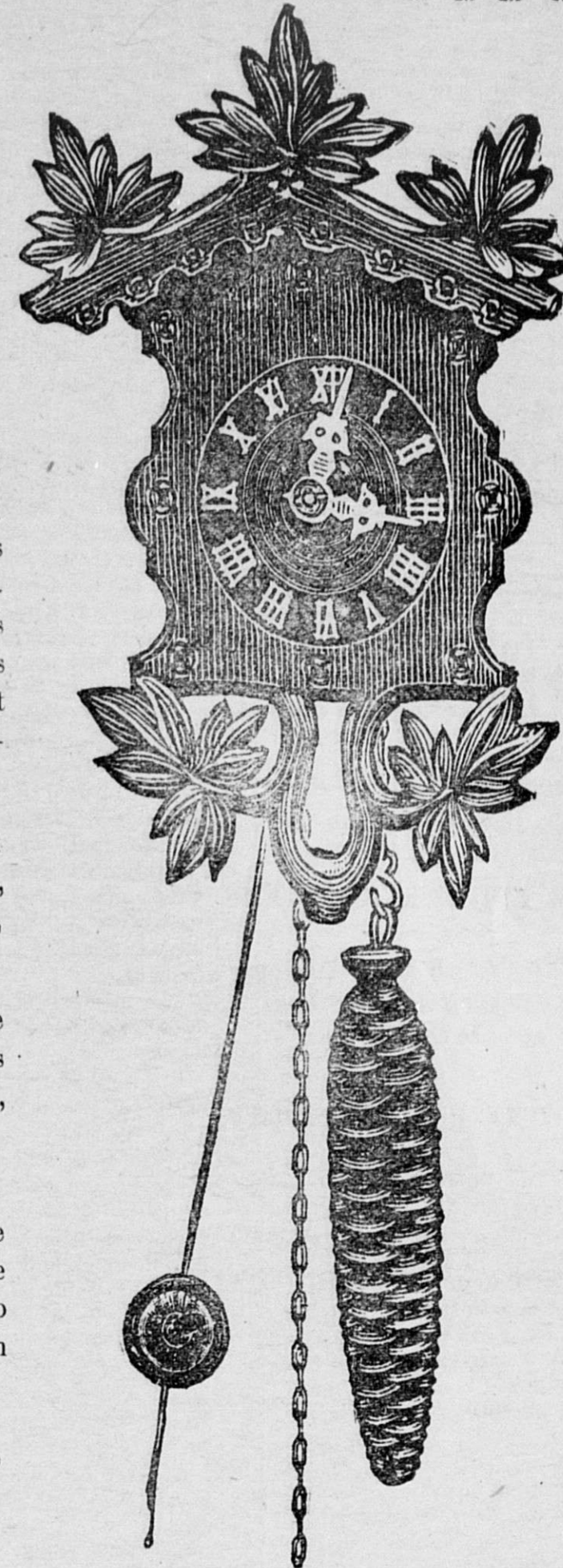
