## Weekly Crop Report.

 The following, is the weekly climate and crop bulletin issued by the Mich-igan section T. S. denartment of agrculture for the week ending last
Monday: The mean dailr temperature for the week was 57.0 degrees, tal precipitation was the average inch, or 0.42 of an inch below the
normal; the sunshine averaged 51 par ent af the possible amount. The week has been generally dry
and cold; except in a few scattered ocalitits, only light showers have necurret. Frosts of some severity oc-
curred in the Upper Peninsula, nipping early corn, potatoes and aarden northern eounties of the Lower Peninsula, slightly
gardea truck.
The cool, dry weather has greatly Corn is slow and backward, and it the more northerly counties lonks
pale and sickly; in the southern counties its color is better. Generally, it has been too dry for wheat, rye
oats, barley and peas, which haye made very little advance during the reek. The hav prospect has veterioated; old meadows are short and ra-
ther thin and indicate light yields her this and indicate light yields.
New cloyer is promising, but indicates a yield below the average treme southern counties.
Bean and late potato plantirg are counties the soil is too dry for favorable germination: early potates have made good growth and are generall
quite promisng. sugar beets con tinue quite healthy and are being generally cultivated; corn cultivation
in the southern counties is also quite general. Buckwheat seeding has be un in the northern counties. Strawberries are yielding rathe
unevenly and the crup is being unevenly and the crup is being short
