Soft Wood Made Hard By The Use of Sugar
A nong new uses to which sugar timber. Much interest has been aroused by the announcement, as the
result of a prolonged series of iments, of a method of so treating timber as to secure, even from soft
wood, a larger increased toughness and hardness. The treatment which the timber is subjected is saturation at the hoiling point with a
solution of sugar, the water bein afterward evaporated at a high tempores and interstices of the wood fille with solid matter, and the timber vol canized, preserved and seasoned. The nature of a moderately soft wood is hard substance, without brittleness and also without any tendency split or check. - New York Tribune
