Miss Beryl Hurlbert arrived home last Saturday from the state Normal, at Ypsilanti. She has accepted a position as teacher in the schools at Tecumseh for the coming year.

According to reports submitted at the state encampment at Muskegon last week, the membership of the Michigan G. A. R., has decreased from 19,000 ten years ago to 13,716. During the past year there has been 400 deaths.

The wide tires seem to be gradually displacing the narrow, especially for farm work. They should take the place of the narrow tire on the highways, as the roads can be kept in condition with much less expense where heavy loads are drawn upon broad tires than when narrow tires are used. It is not only for the sake of the highway but there is a saving in draft upon almost all kinds of roads.

Last Friday a "barn raising" held at the farm of James Leonard, on the Townline, when a record was made. Builder Hausier had the frame of a 32x56 barn ready to raise and when the men gathered in the morning not a stick was up, but when they quit at supper time the frame was up, and the siding and roof boards on ready for the shingles. The way the work progressed speaks well for the builder as well as the men who helped him.

Last Friday, William Wendt received a handsome trout fishing outfit, consisting of rod, reel, line and flies, from J. D. Hawks, president of the D. & M. railroad. It was sent in recognition of his ability as an angler in landing the largest trout ever caught on the line of the D. & M., which he caught in Cold creek last summer and sent to Mr. Hawks. Billy says the big fellows want to lay low now as with the finest outfit hereabouts he'll surely land them.

A Thrilling Adventure.

A woman's bravery, coolness and presence of mind prevented a horrible ending to an accident at Lake Hook last Friday. Mrs. P. P. Pendergast and Miss Greenberg were in a boat on the lake near the middle and in very deep water, when in attempting to pass one another in the boat they were thrown into the water, the boat partially capsizing. Neither could swim but Mrs. Pendergast, with rare presence of mind, managed to seize the boat with one hand and her companion's clothing with the other, saving both from sinking or being separated from the boat, into which they managed to climb with difficulty. So many accidents of this kind result fatally and so few persons know what to do in such an emergency, that Mrs. Pendergast deserves great praise for her coolness and brave action.—Hutchinson (Minn.) Leader.

Mortality of Michigan.

The total number of deaths returned to the Department of State for the month of May was 2,733. This number was 12 fewer than that returned for the preceding month. The death rate for the month was 13.0 per 1,000 estimated population.

Deaths at certain ages were as follows: under 1 year, 447; 1 to 5 years, 173; 65 years and over, 818.

Important causes of death were as follows: tuberculosis of the lungs, 199; other tuberculosis, 29; typhoid fever, 42; diphtheria and croup, 45; scarlet fever, 25; measles, 28; whooping cough, 34; pneumonia, 254; cancer, 125; accidents and violence, 205.

There was one death reported from smallpox from Detroit. There was 4 deaths reported from lightning, one each in the townships of Alpine, Kent county, Deerfield, Livingston county, Thomaston, Saginaw county and Escanaba city.

Revision of the Constitution.

One of the measures passed by the legislature provides for the submission to the people the question of calling a convention to revise the constitution of the state of Michigan. In calling attention to the matter, Senator Kelly rightfully mentions it as one of the important actions of the session, and he adds that there is occasion for much careful consideration of the question. He believes that the need for revision ought to be made apparent to all, and points out that most of the time of the late legislature was devoted to the passage of local measures. It is his opinion that the constitution may be revised as to permit of a larger share of self-government than is now permissible to cities and counties. Each session 132 legislators are called upon to act on matters of which few of them have any personal knowledge. Each session lobbies come to Lansing to pull for or against some bill concerning only their immediate localities. How much time is thus taken up over affairs that ought to be settled at home, no one knows.

If for no other reason than to eliminate the flood of local bills before each legislature, the revision would be warranted. There are other matters, too, that deserve attention, among them the salaries paid to state officers which are beggarly in the extreme. Senator Kelly rightfully declares that there is need for arousing the people to the importance of revision, that all may see its necessity, and act accordingly.—Lansing Republican

Assaulted the Sheriff.

A dispatch to the Detroit Tribune says Sheriff Pomeroy, of Arenac county, last Thursday ordered Deputy Sheriff John E. Bradley, of Au Gres, to arrest Mrs. S. J. Hannan, of that village for selling liquor without a license and she resisted, calling an employe, John Brown, to assist. Brown hit Bradley with a club, breaking his jaw in two places. Sheriff Pomeroy arrested Brown Wednesday and landed him in jail after a hard tussle, and Mrs. Hannan will also be arrested. Bradley is in a very precarious condition and may die.

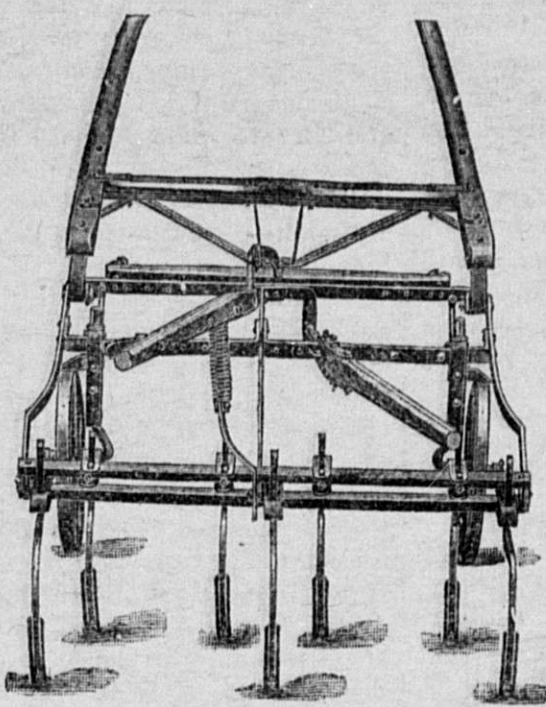

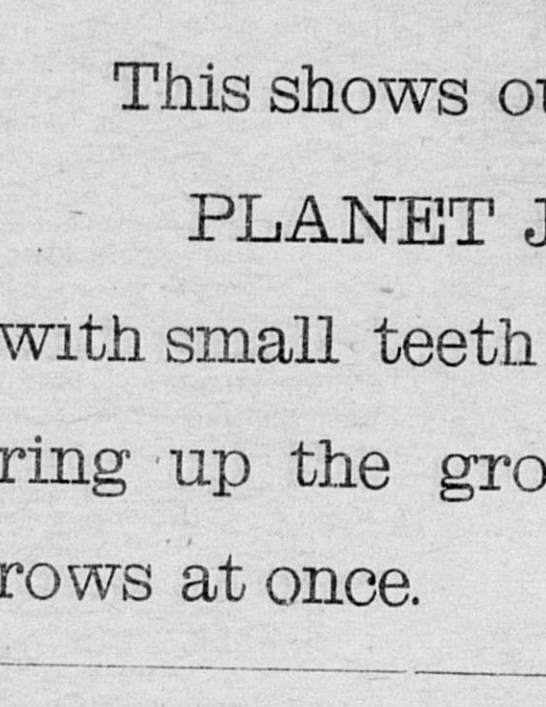

PLANET JR.

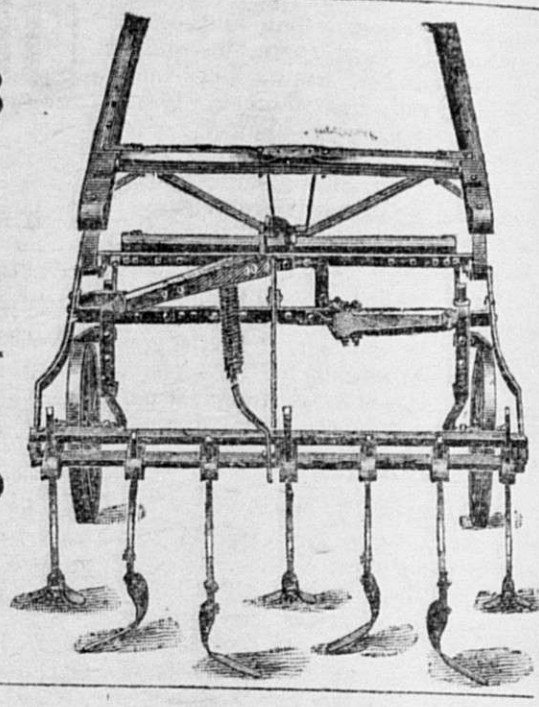
Horse Cultivator, cutting big weeds in small beets, two rows at once.

Notice of Adoption of County Road.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN: Notice is hereby given that the Board of County Road Commissioners of the county of Iosco, at a meeting held at the Court House, in the city of Tawas City, in said county, on Saturday, May 16, 1903, adopted the following pieces of road as County roads:

That piece of road running westerly from the southeast corner of the southwest quarter of section 19, town 23 north of range 8 east, and running thence westerly between sections 19 and 20 of town 22 north of range 8 east, and sections 24 and 25 town 22 north, range 7 east, a distance of one and one-quarter miles, to be known as the Hemlock County Road.

Also, that piece of road beginning at the south east corner of south east quarter of section 24, town 22, north of range 7 east, and running thence north between sections 19 and 24 of town 22, north of range 7 east, and town 22 north of range 8 east, for a distance of one mile, the same to be known as the Wilber County Road.

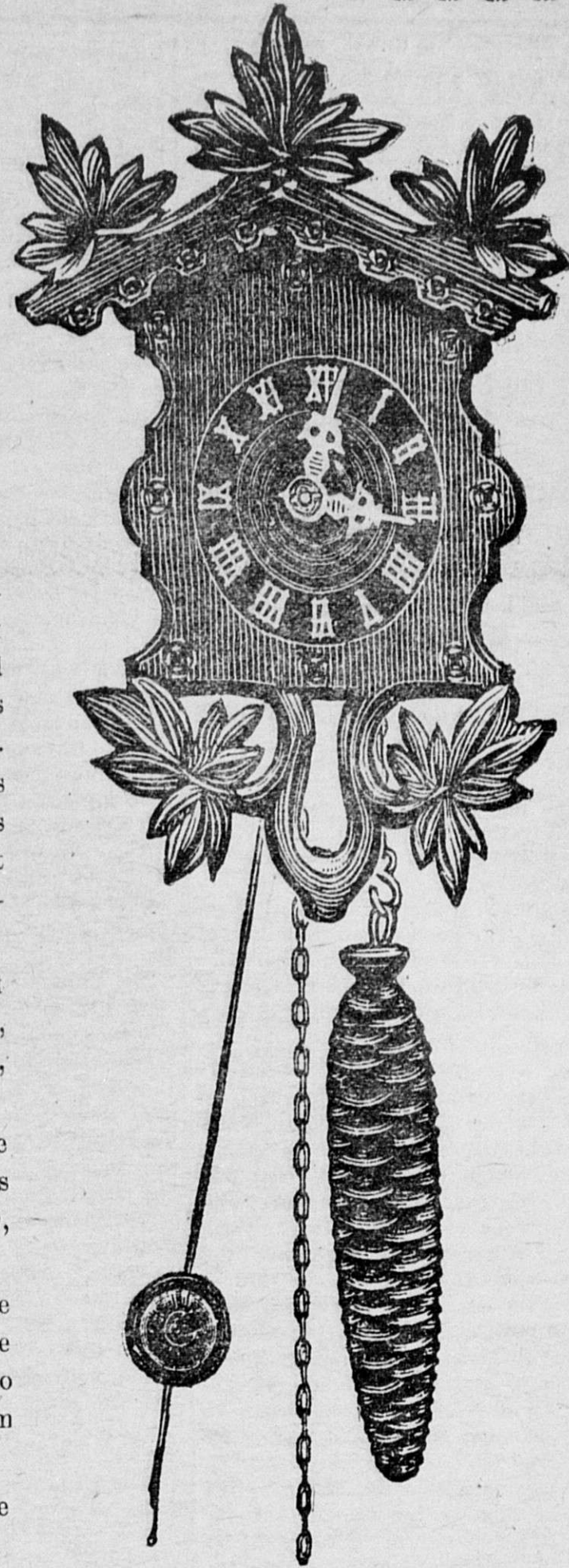

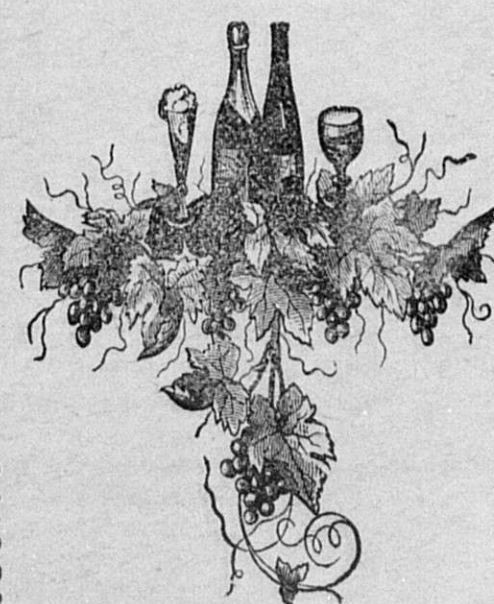

Soft Wood Made Hard By The Use Of Sugar.

Among new uses to which sugar has been put is the preservation of timber. Much interest has been aroused by the announcement, as the result of a prolonged series of experiments, of a method of so treating timber as to secure, even from soft wood, a larger increased toughness and hardness. The treatment to which the timber is subjected is to saturation at the boiling point with a solution of sugar, the water being afterward evaporated at a high temperature. The result is to leave the pores and interstices of the wood filled with solid matter, and the timber vulcanized, preserved and seasoned. The nature of a moderately soft wood is in this way changed to a tough and hard substance, without brittleness, and also without any tendency to split or check.—*New York Tribune*

Weekly Crop Report.

The following crop report has been issued by the Michigan section of the weather bureau in connection with the U. S. Department of Agriculture for the week ended last Monday.

The mean daily temperature for the week ended June 22 was 58.1 degrees, or 9.2 below the normal, the average total precipitation was 0.64 of an inch, or 0.11 of an inch below the normal; the sunshine averaged 51 per cent of the possible amount.

The week has been cold with unevenly distributed precipitation; in the southeast quarter of the Lower Peninsula many showers have occurred, while in other sections of the state ample rains did not occur until during the last two or three days. Some light frosts occurred in interior portions of the northern counties and Upper Peninsula, doing slight damage. The cold temperatures have greatly retarded the growth of corn, which is small and very backward and in many counties looks sickly and yellow. Wheat, rye, oats and barley have improved. Pastures and meadows were short, but have been greatly benefited by the rains. Clover haying is quite general in the southern counties and the yields, while below the average, are fair. Old meadows are generally short and thin and the general hay prospect is poor. Bean planting has made good progress and most of the seed is germinating well. Buckwheat seeding is general in the northern and central counties and the ground is being prepared in the southern. Sugar beets are generally doing well. Oats are uneven, somewhat thin and heading on short straw. Barley and peas are quite promising. Early potatoes made good progress and now indicate good yields in most counties; late potatoes are mostly planted.

Strawberry yield is uneven. Apple prospects continue fairly promising. Grapes are not setting well. Early cherries are scarce and the yield of late cherries will be short.

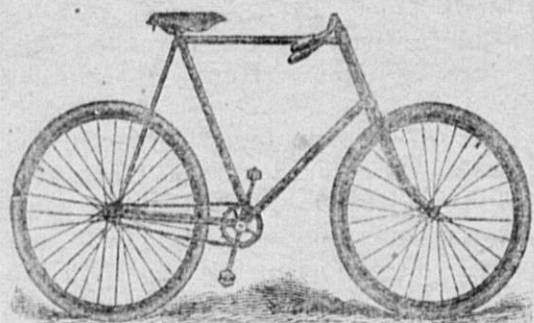
