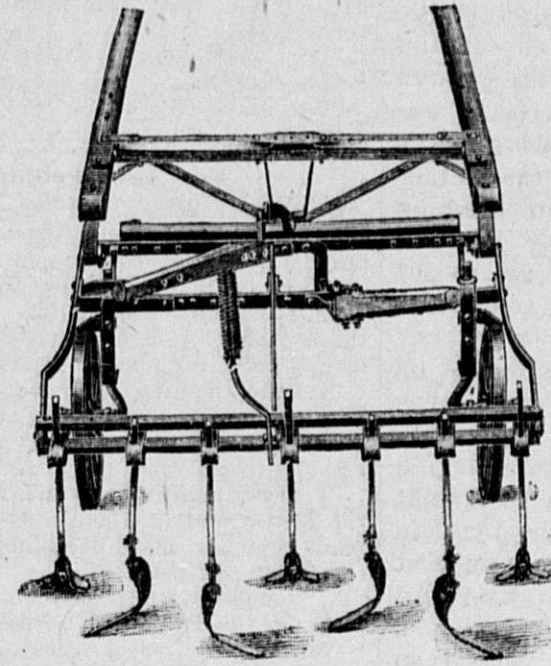

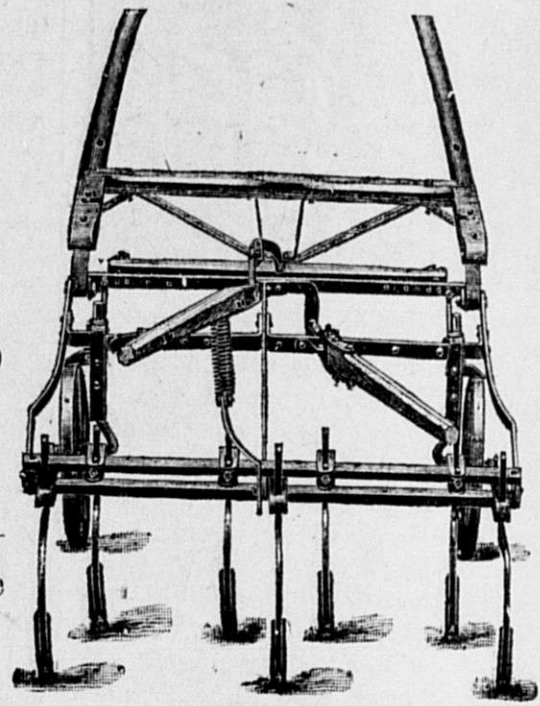


This shows our No. 53 PLANET JR.

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A DISASTROUS FIRE.

The Ev. Lutheran Emanuel Parsonage Destroyed Early Saturday Morning.

THE LOSS WILL REACH \$3,000.

About 2 o'clock last Saturday morning the barn belonging to the Ev. Lutheran Emanuel church was discovered to be on fire, and before it was under control the barn, handsome parsonage and the entire block of horse sheds in the rear of the property was burned. The valuable driving horse, together with the buggy, cutter, harness, and other property belonging to Rev. Emmil were burned. The largest portion of Rev. Emmil's household goods were saved, yet his personal loss will foot up to about \$1,300, partially covered by insurance. The loss to the society on parsonage, barn and sheds, will reach fully \$2,500 with an insurance of only \$1,000.

It was a very close call to the most disastrous fire seen here in many years. Through an accident to the church bell, and the inability to use the fire bell at the city hall, it was fully 30 minutes before sufficient help could be aroused to get the fire apparatus on the scene, and the fire had gained great headway. Fortunately the church nor school house did not catch, as the iron roof on the parsonage kept the sparks from flying as much as they otherwise would. Had either of these caught, it would have been almost impossible to have kept it from spreading further.

Ordinance No. 46.

Relative to Prohibiting the Riding of Bicycles, Tricycles or Tandems on Certain Sidewalks in the City of Tawas City.

SECTION 1. No person or persons shall ride a bicycle, tricycle or tandem upon the sidewalk in the city of Tawas City, on the westerly side of Lake street, from First street to Mathew street, and on the north side of Mathew street to the Tawas river.

SECTION 2. Any person or persons guilty of the violation this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, pay a fine not to exceed twenty-five dollars and the costs of prosecution, and on the failure to pay such fine and costs shall be imprisoned in the county jail of Isosco county not to exceed thirty days, unless payment thereof shall be sooner made, or in the discretion of the court, the court may sentence such offender, or offenders, to imprisonment in the county jail of said county not to exceed thirty days.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall take effect on and after the 28th day of July, A. D. 1903.
