Pius X.

Cardinal Joseph Sarto, patriarch of Venice, was elected Pope to succeed Leo XIII, last Tuesday; having received the necessary two thirds majority of the college of cardinals at Rome, on the seventh ballot. The new pope at once chose the name of Pius X, and was proclaimed as head of the Roman Catholic church. He is a native of Italy, and was born in 1835.

Don't Mince His Words.

In announcing that he will take no further steps to obtain the removal of Tax Commissioners Freeman and Sayre, because the governor is the court of last resort, and has not seen fit to remove them, Attorney General Blair does not mince words in expressing his opinion of the act of the commissioners in furnishing the railroad companies with affidavits.

"Ever since I got into the case it has seemed that Freeman and Sayre were at all times solicitous for the railroads," Mr. Blair asserts, "They had a great deal to say about the injustice to the companies, but they did not talk much about the interests of the people. I consider the affidavits simply as a showing of the sentiments which they had entertained all along."

These are strong words, but they will undoubtedly strike a responsive chord in the breasts of thousands of citizens.—*Lansing Republican*

The Sales of State Land Were Large.

State Land Commissioner Wildy's annual report shows that Michigan still has for sale and for homestead entry 643,361 acres of all kinds of lands, despite the sales made to people who are bent on monopolizing large tracts. These lands are classified as follows:

Primary school lands, 44,881.89; agricultural college land, 56,788.33; salt spring, 280; asylum land, 280; swamp land, 43,988.95; tax homestead land, 496,422.64; total, 643,360.79.

For 161,472 acres sold during the year, state got \$171,879. The patented homestead lands deeded comprises 1,371 acres; the tax homestead land, 35,979 acres. The whole receipts from sales, interest, penalties, and other sources was \$222,383; the trespass collections reached \$13,286.

For non-payment of interest, 1,237 acres were forfeited to the state. Acting under the authority of a law giving him discretionary power, the auditor general and land commissioner withdrew from homestead entry 71,046 acres and sold them for \$77,466.

Of the area still held by the state, 452,938 acres was tax homestead land deeded during the year by the auditor general.

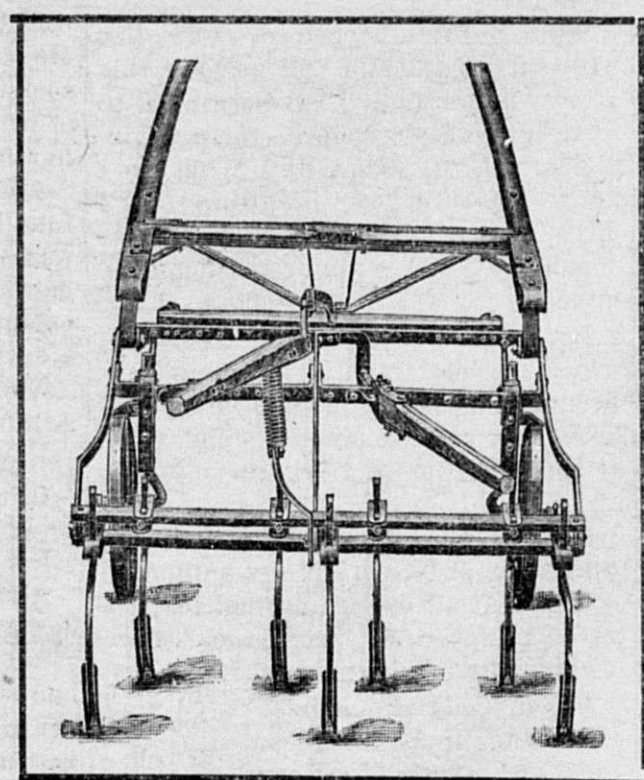

It will be remembered the governor was grievously disappointed because the Beaver senator's choice of a colleague to succeed Don Cameron was Boies Penrose.

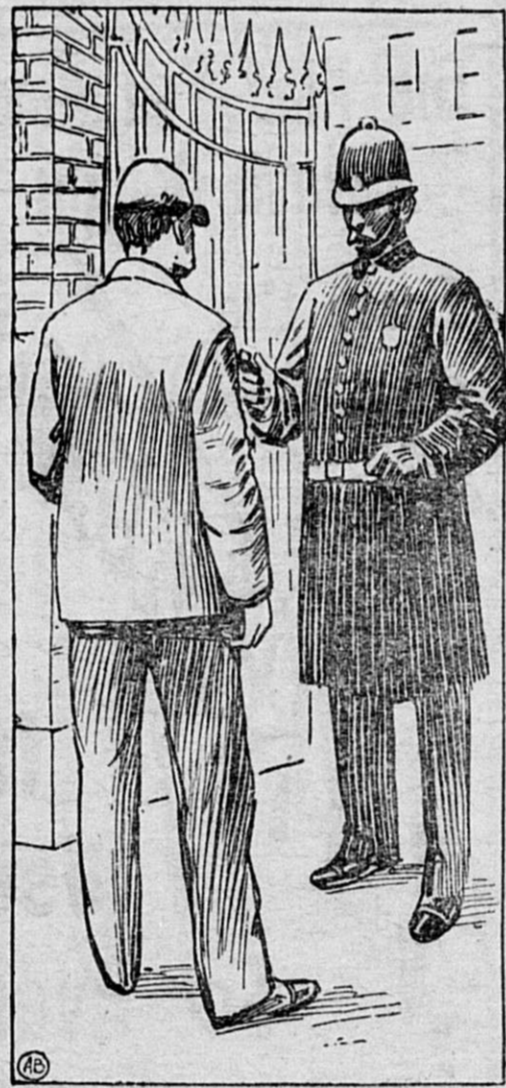
Very emphatically the governor declared that he would never sign such a measure. The presence of the junior senator, whom he cordially disliked, did not tend to mollify him.
