State Land Commissioner Wildy's annual report shows that Michigan still has for sale and for homestead entry 643,361 acres of all kinds of lands, despite the sales made to people who are bent on monopolizing large tracts. These lands are classified as follows:

Primary school lands, 44,881.89; agricultural college land, 56,788.33; salt spring, 280; asylum land, 280; swamp land, 43,988.95; fax homestead land, 496,422.64; total, 643,360.79.

For 161,472 acres sold during the year, state got \$171,879. The patented homestead lands deeded comprises 1,371 acres; the tax homestead land, 35,979 acres. The whole receipts from sales, interest, penalties, and other sources was \$222,383; the tres- I pass collections reached \$13,286.
