## Timely Topics

TERSELY TOLD

What is needed in Michigan politics is a few men whose minds are not for rent.

A town has been discovered in Wisconsin which is without a lawyer, a saloon, a store or a railroad.

On September 14. Alpena will vote on a proposition to bond for \$100,000 to provide a municipal lighting plant.

The amount of heat produced by an average man in a day's work is sufficient to raise 63½ pounds of water from freezing to boiling point.

Plum orchards in Ogemaw county are affected with rot, and the trees are so full that farmers are giving the plums away to anyone who will pick them.

W. C. Wetmore, of Concord, has a pair of calf boots made in 1851-52 years ago. Mr. Wetmore is a farmer and one of the pioneer residents of Jackson county.

A colony of prohibitionists from near South Bend, Ind., have located in Richland, Ogemaw county. A singular thing about the men is that they are all of magnificent physique, none weighing less than 260 pounds.

The Ogemaw county bonds, amounting to \$10,000, will be due in October, but the county will be able to meet them, as early in November the county and towns will receive \$35,000 from the sale of state tax lands in Lansing recently.

Because a neighbor's horse had wandered into his field a Wexford county man—or brute, rather—filled his shotgun with beans and buckshot and fired the charge into the horse's side. There's a good chance for the humane society to get busy.

Young Mr. Rockefeller, testifying that he prays for light and gets it, raises a question. If he gets light by praying for it, should the rest of us be charged 10 cents per gallon at retail? Very likely the bureau of corporations will take this matter up in due time.

The largest boat ever built on the great lakes has been ordered by A. B. Wolin from the American Shipbuilding company. The boat will be built at the Lorain yards and will come out in April 1904. She will cost \$500,000. The dimensions for the boat will be 560 feet long, 540 feet keel, 86 feet beam, 32 feet deep. Capacity 10,000 tons, draught 18 feet.

An unknown negro caught in the net of strangling Mrs. Margaret Gerah a white woman, in her home at Armourdale, Kan., Saturday afternoon, escaped to the Kansas river, where he drowned himself rather than run the chances of being lynched, a crowd having chased him to the bank of the stream. The woman was seriously hurt, but will recover.

The annual meeting of the Michigan Beet Sugar Manufacturers' association was held at the East Saginaw club Saturday afternoon. The officers elected were: President, W. L. Churchill, Bay City; vice-president, Carmen Smith, Owosso; secretary and treasurer, F. R. Hathaway, Alma. It is understood that Michigan manufacturers of sugar will make no further effort to prevent the ratification of the Cuban reciprocity treaty.

The success of the corn crop this year will depend largely upon the time the first frost appears. A few fields are well advanced while others are late. Some will be lucky if they have a crop at all. The backward condition of the crop is caused by the dry spring which interfered with the planting. If there is no frost until late in September the bulk of the crop will be out of danger. Should a frost come before the middle of September many fields will be injured or ruined.

Messrs. Lyon & Healy, of Chicago, have presented to the U. of M. museum eight models of ancient musical instruments, which nicely supplement the Stearns collection already in the cases. These instruments formed a part of the firm's exhibit at the Columbian exposition. The models comprise a chiterna, strung like a mandolin, but played like a guitar, after one made by Tielka, in Germany in 1645, a guitar after Stradivarius, 1680; a cetera, Stradivarius, 1700; a cruth, and a minstrel's harp, Welsh, eleventh century; an Indian yima, made of bamboo; a Japanese lo-o coto, and a Siamese ranat.
