Timely Topics

TERSELY TOLD

Pinconning will have a street fair Sept. 29.

Peter King was instantly killed at Kalamazoo Monday, while engaged in repairing a trolley wire.

Bay City will make an effort to have the Detroit & Cleveland line run its boats to Bay City next year.

James Allen, of Allegan, was arrested at Chicago last Saturday for eloping with his mother-in-law.

Henry A. Gustin, one of the oldest and most highly respected citizens of Bay City, died last Friday, at the advanced age of 81 years.

Charles V. DeLand, one of the best known and most highly respected citizens of this state, died at his home in Jackson, early Monday morning, aged 77 years.

Arenac county has the distinction of being the first county in the state to secure the establishment of a state normal training school under an act passed at the last legislature. It commences in October and will be located at Standish.

Lord Salisbury made a request that his funeral expenses should not exceed \$100, and only \$70 was expended. But even that sum largely exceeded the cost of the funeral of the Duke of Westminster, the richest landholder in England.

William H. Leavitt, the young man who is announced to wed Ruth, the daughter of William J. Bryan, was formerly a resident of Alpena, where he is well and favorably known. He is one of the best known portrait artists in this country.

Rear-Admiral George W. Sumner, who is a native of Michigan, celebrated the forty-fifth anniversary of his entrance into the naval service Saturday at his home in Boston. His formal retirement from the service will take place in December.

Attorney-General Blair is about to commence suits against a number of corporations of the state which have failed to comply with the law concerning the making of annual reports to the secretary of state. Heavy penalties are provided by the statutes for failing to file reports.

Michael Dunnigan, a Michigan Central brakeman, whose home is in Bay City, west side, was killed while working in the yards at Pinconning Monday morning. He was switching cars for the train when, in some unaccountable manner he fell under the rear of the engine and was literally ground to pieces.

The contract for the Michigan building at St. Louis was signed Saturday afternoon. The construction will be done by George Richman's Sons, the Ingham County court house contractors, for \$12,500, but the cement and other materials will be donated, so that in reality the building will cost about \$25,000.

Alpena.—All of the laborers, about 75 in number, employed at the Michigan Alkali Co's big quarry went on a strike Monday afternoon, demanding \$1.65 for 10 hours' work. Their demand was refused, and they now say they will not go back for less than \$1.75 for the same number of hours. They were formerly working 11 hours per day.

The steamer A. A. Parker foundered in Lake Superior, off Grand Marais, her crew being saved with difficulty after a three hours' battle with the seas. She was formerly the Kasota, a Detroit boat, and eight years ago was sunk in collision with the D. & C. steamer City of Detroit. After her decks were awash the life savers took off nine of her crew, the rest escaping in one of the Parker's yawls just as the steamer made her final dive. The little boats were making a losing battle when two tugs, sent to the rescue, reached and saved the exhausted men.

Lansing.—The attorney-general is very busy preparing his defence in the railroad cases. He has been authorized to employ two additional stenographers and typewriters to assist in the work. Experts Cooley, Davis and Walker are working hard on the valuation of the railroad property, and expect soon to have their task completed.

The case of Richard Canfield, the alleged gambling house keeper of New York city, came up on change of venue at the opening of the September term of the supreme court at Binghamton Tuesday. Canfield's attorney was permitted to withdraw the plea of l.o. guilty and given 24 hours to prepare a demurrer to the indictment.

Annie R. Sharpley, who caused the postoffice authorities much trouble through her swindling operations in raising the figures on postal money orders in many cities, has been sentenced to the Eastern penitentiary in Philadelphia for two years. She came from England several years ago and is said to be connected with a good family there.

Benton Harbor.—In spite of the cold and rainy weather throughout the state, this season has been one of the best ever known to farmers in this vicinity. Even the berry crop, which has been lighter than any other, was a profitable one, and a commission man declares that never, since he has been in the fruit belt, has he seen such heavy shipments of peaches.

Prof. Fred C. Clarke of the Ohio university at Columbus, committed suicide by shooting himself in the head on the university grounds Saturday. He was a graduate of the Michigan university and well and favorably known. Unfortunate investments in mining companies are said to be responsible for the act. A widow and one daughter survive him.

Two more indictments were reported out by the federal grand jury investigating the postal scandal against State Senator George A. Green of New York and George W. Beavers, former chief of the salary and allowance division of the postoffice department, in connection with the contract for time recorders. Green furnished a \$10,000 bond at Birmingham, N. Y.

Holders of policies in Canadian insurance companies who have been wondering where they would "be at" in case of war between Great Britain and the United States, can set their minds at rest. A statement by Insurance Commissioner Barry says the question was taken care of by the last legislature, when the law governing Canadian reserves was amended so as to compel companies doing business on this side of the line to make deposits large enough to cover the full policy valuation of their American business.

O. K. by Loud.

The Michigan congressional delegation held a conference at Grand Rapids Wednesday. Col. Loud of this district was among the early arrivals. Relative to the plan of Congressman Smith to have the next state convention nominate the candidate for United States senator, Col. Loud expresses himself as follows:

"I think that would be the fairest way to settle the question," he said. "There will be no contest for election of delegates to that convention and the United States senatorship would have a clear field. Delegates could be elected on that issue alone. In convention they could adopt a resolution asking the legislature to elect on certain conditions. Delegates to the convention come direct from the people and any action of the convention with delegates elected on that issue would be almost the same as a sentiment expressed by popular vote."

"Self Accused."

At the opera house, East Tawas, next Wednesday evening, Sept. 30th, the melo-drama "Self Accused," will be presented by local talent under the direction of Burdett Milton Garfield, of Buffalo, N. Y., for the benefit of Prize Primary 81, of the 3 P's. This ledge has been trying to secure Mr. Garfield for two years to come here, but have been unable to get him until now. Mr. Garfield is considered one of the best directors in the east and is kept busy in the larger cities handling the swiftest production and does not visit any small places as a usual thing, and the ledge is to be congratulated on securing him now. The play is one selected by the ledge and is a good one with lots of comedy and exciting situations which will be well brought out by Mr. Garfield. Our theatre goers have expressed a desire to see Mr. Garfield on the stage so he has consented to produce two

short twenty minute sketches in which he will play the comedy lead. "A trip on the Doby" will be used as the curtain raiser. This sketch was recently presented at the Temple theatre in Detroit by Filson Earl, one of America's greatest sketch teams. "Supper for two," another very funny sketch, will be given as an after piece. Specialties will be produced between acts and there will not be an idle moment from start to finish. As the curtain will go up at 8 o'clock sharp, local time, every one should be on hand early to see it. Reserved seats are now on sale and should be secured early, as no doubt every seat in the opera house will be taken.

THE FAIR.

The annual fair of the Iosco County Agricultural Society came to an end last Friday, the last day having a good attendance, but owing to the extremely bad weather the society will lack about \$200 of having sufficient funds to pay expenses, premiums and repairs on the grounds.

The exhibits were about 25 per cent less than last year. The fruit exhibit was the finest ever seen at a fair in this county, and we doubt if it could be excelled in the state. The quality of all exhibits showed improvement over previous years and shows that our farmers are advancing rapidly in all kinds of agricultural and stock raising.

The running race was won by Fred L. Twining's Flora W., with Faculty Smith's Button second, and Gus Flunt's Glad Tidings third. Best time 5:3.

I have had opportunity to study the value of technically educated men, and I have no hesitation in asserting that, aside from electricity, mining and chemistry, only an extremely small percentage of this country's progress in manufacturing has been due to such education. In fact, I think it is safe to say that most of it was gained before our manufacturers knew what technical education was.

Much is being said just now about the demand by manufacturers for graduates of technical schools, and no doubt they are being tried in some establishments. But where one concern can be found that is seeking this class of help, no doubt there are at least twenty that are not doing so. It is simply a fact.

IF THESE SAME BOYS HAD UPON LEAVING GRAMMAR SCHOOL GONE TO WORK IN A FACTORY AND RECEIVED REASONABLE ATTENTION THERE THEY WOULD HAVE BEEN WORTH A GREAT DEAL MORE TO THEIR EMPLOYER THAN THEY ARE AFTER GOING THROUGH A TECHNICAL SCHOOL.

I am inclined to think that the effect of these schools is much the same as in the case of the regular colleges and universities—that is, that upon leaving them the students are so certain of their own importance that it takes them a long time to realize that they have human limitations.

To be successful in a manufacturing business a man must possess not only mechanical ability, but also executive and business ability. Where one technically educated man is found who has made a success no doubt there are a hundred who have been successful without such education.
