Sir Henry Mortimer Durand, British ambassador at Madrid, will succeed the late Sir Michael Hebert as ambassador to the United States.

Michigan farmers planted 171,452 acres to potatoes this year; the yield is 16,630,941, giving an average of over 97 to the acre; and the value is \$4,324,045.

Hon. Arthur M. Clark, for 25 years grand lecturer of the Michigan Grand Lodge, F. & A. M., and one of the best known men in the state, died at his home in Lexington, Tuesday.

Last Saturday, at Memphis, Lou Dilloa, owned by C. K. G. Billings, of Chicago and driven by Millard Sanders, proved her right to the title of queen of the turf by trotting a mile under adverse conditions in the remarkable time of 1:58½.

The secretary of the interior's estimate of the appropriations necessary to conduct the affairs of his department for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1905, places the total requirement for the department at \$156,000,000, which is about \$3,000,000 less than the appropriation for the current year.

In the furious gale which raged Sunday on Lake Superior, the steamer W. F. Sauber foundered 30 miles northwest of Whitefish Point at 3 o'clock Monday morning. Capt. W. E. Morse of Cleveland, and Oiler Frank Robinson of Detroit, who remained on the sinking steamer after the remainder of the crew had been taken off by the steamer Yale, lost their lives.

In the circuit court at Standish, last Saturday, William C. Curtis, of Omer, who had been found guilty of knowingly and wilfully having misappropriated about \$5,000 of the money of Arenac while acting as township treasurer, was sentenced by Judge Sharpe to the penal reformatory at Ionia for a period of not less than six months nor more than one year.

Roy Smith, a 14-year-old boy at Omer, was out hunting Friday morning and he met with a terrible accident. He was standing on a stump, with the shot gun held away from him while he lighted a cigarette. The gun slipped from his hand, the trigger striking on the stump, the charge entered his left arm, which was literally shot to pieces. The member was amputated at the elbow.

Williamson Melvin of Reno, Ioseco county, filed a petition for a modification of the decree granted to Lucinda Melvin, Sept. 19, 1889, by which twenty acres of land in Birch Run was given her; also the custody of the minor children. The petitioner alleges that the land has not been worked; that the children have not been cared for; that Lucinda Melvin is of unsound mind, and he is able and willing to care for the children. An order for the hearing Dec. 7, was made.—*Bay City Times.*

Strength of U. S. Navy.

Washington, Oct. 26.—Rear-Admiral Bowles, chief of the bureau of construction and repair, in his annual report to the secretary of the navy shows that the following additions have been made to the effective force of the navy during the year:

One battleship, four monitors, twelve torpedo boat destroyers, one torpedo boat and seven submarine torpedo boats. The list should have been increased by two battleships and five cruisers, the report states, but owing to strikes and other causes, their completion was delayed.

The report shows there are 252 vessels in the navy fit for service, 45 building and 25 unfit for sea service. Vessels fit for service, including those under repair are as follows: First class battleships, 10; second class battleships, 1; armored cruisers, 2; armored ram, 1; single turret harbor defence monitors, 4; double turret monitors, 6; protected cruisers, 14; unprotected cruisers, 3; gunboats, 12; light draft gun boats, 3; composite gun boats, 6; training ship (caval academy) sheathed, 1; special class (Dolphin-Vesuvius), 2; gunboats under 500 tons, 21; torpedo boat destroyers, steel torpedo boats, 29; submarine torpedo boats, 8; wooden torpedo boats, 1; iron cruising vessels, steam, 5; wooden cruising vessels, steam, 6; wooden sailing vessels, 4; tugs, 39; auxiliary, 5; converted yachts, 23; colliers, 16; supply and hospital ships, 14.

The following are under construction or authorized: First class battleships, 18; armored cruisers, 8; protected cruisers, 9; gunboat for great lakes, not begun, 1; composite gunboats, 22; steel torpedo boats, 6; training ships, 2; training brig, 1; tugs, 2.

M. E. Preachers to Meet at Standish.

There will be a district meeting of Methodist Episcopal ministers of the Bay City district November 23-25 at Standish, the object being to devise methods for the prosecution of a vigorous campaign along all lines of church work the coming year. The subjects to be considered are revivals, probationers, Sunday schools, leagues, benevolence and temperance. A new departure will be made in the methods of convention work. Instead of papers being presented touching these several interests the preachers will be divided into departments presided over by a department chairman. Every department will take up the work assigned to it and plan for a triumph in this year's work. A report will be asked of each pastor as to the condition, problems and needs of his charge and the special cases referred to appropriate departments for consideration. This is an emphasized method of the old time question box.

A good program has been arranged for the ministers' conference. It will open with a song service led by the preachers' choir, followed by devotional service, led by Rev. B. C. Moore. There will be addresses by Rev. Howard Goldie and Rev. H. A. Sheldon. The second day will open with devotional service led by Rev. A. E. Pomeroy and Elder W. M. Ward will follow with "A Statement of the Case," after which there will be reports received for charges by the pastors and the assignment of special cases to the departments. The devotional exercises in the afternoon will be conducted by Rev. John Lambrecht, and in the evening by Rev. H. J. Johnson. There will be a sermon by Rev. B. F. Lewis, and Rev. G. N. Kennedy will conduct an altar service. Rev. G. L. Tiffany will lead the devotional services on the third day, and the call of departments will follow.

The district stewards, composed of one layman from each church, will meet at the same place and at the same time.—*Bay City Times.*

Cost of Education.

Lansing, Oct. 26.—State Superintendent of Public Instruction Delos E. Felt, in his annual report, makes some interesting comparisons with the system of education in vogue in the state 50 years ago and that of the present time. Half a century ago there were 118,282 pupils; today there are 738,184. The primary school means of 50 years ago amounted to \$39,013, while last year they reached \$1,909,495.

Fifty years ago there were no high schools in the state recognized by law. In 1859 the law giving the people the right to establish high schools was passed, and today there are 552 graded districts having high schools. Other information regarding the school system is given to elaborate the idea of the growth of the schools. There are in the state 7,204 districts containing 8,104 schoolhouses. The total number of teachers employed last year was 16,582, and total wages paid them was \$4,997,758.69. The average monthly wages for male teachers in ungraded schools was \$29.45; in graded schools, \$4.76; for female teachers in ungraded schools, \$6.99, and in graded schools, \$45.94. These figures show an increase all along the line. It is shown that the sums expended for the larger educational institutions of the state in addition to that expended in the common schools give a grand total of \$10,266,827.76.
