Woodmen's Meeting.

Over one hundred accepted the invitation extended by the members of Ottawa Camp, No. 2450, of East Tawas, and Tawas Bay Camp, No. 11, 353, Modern Woodmen, of this city, and gathered at the Maccabee hall last Monday evening, to listen to one of the finest addresses on fraternity and fraternal insurance ever delivered in the Tawas. Judge Fred G. White, of Pontiac, Ill., National lecturer of the Woodmen, was the speaker of the evening, and he proved a most entertaining one. A young man of fine address and thoroughly familiar with the subject of Woodcraft in particular and fraternal insurance in general, he is well equipped to represent from the public platform this greatest of fraternal insurance societies. His address was free from all unkind or derogatory remarks toward any sister fraternal order, and exemplified fraternity in its broadest sense. He set forth the advantages and stability of the Woodmen in a fair and practical manner, and impressed the benefits of such societies upon his audience. Those who failed to hear this address were the losers.

The address of welcome was delivered by Attorney Rawden, and the response by Mayor E. J. Bullard, of St. Johns, the state deputy. Both were of a very entertaining and instructive in nature and were well received.

The program was interspersed by instrumental and vocal music, furnished by Wilfred Cardorette, J. J. Richardson and F. F. French, all of which was of a high quality and added much to the evening's pleasures.

At the close of the program all were invited to the dining room where a fine supper served by the Neighbors and ladies.

The cause Woodcraft should be materially strengthened by the occasion, and certain it is that the members of the two local camps received much encouragement and enthusiasm.

Mortality During October.

There were 2,624 deaths reported to the department of state for the month of October, or 98 less than the number returned for the preceding month. The death rate was 12.5 per 1,000 population. Deaths by ages are as follows: Under 1 year, 499; 1 to 4 years, inclusive, 185; 65 years and over, 796.

There was a considerable decrease in deaths of infants and children, and a slight increase in deaths of elderly persons, as compared with September.

Important causes of death were as follows: Tuberculosis of the lungs, 190; other forms of tuberculosis, 35; typhoid fever, 90; diphtheria and croup, 78; scarlet fever, 7; measles, 3; whooping cough, 16; pneumonia, 143; diarrhea, and enteritis, under two years, 173; cancer, 129; accidents, and violence, 202.

There was 1 death from smallpox which occurred in the city of Hillsdale. Somewhat increased mortality was shown from tuberculosis, diphtheria and croup, and pneumonia. Typhoid fever caused 90 deaths as compared with 74 for the preceding month. There was a very large decrease in deaths reported from diarrheal diseases of children, and also a considerable diminution in the number of deaths from cancer.

Own A Farm.

The only business that can stand the test of time and circumstances is the ownership of a free and clear farm. A man may work at a manufacturing business half his life time and suddenly a better invention may shut up his works. A man may spend his life as a merchant, local misfortune may put him through the bankruptcy court. A man may work as an employe for a life time and be a competent, faithful servant to his employer and suddenly he is retired because his company has consolidated with another. The owner of a clear farm is unassailable. He may not have all the luxuries of life, but he is dead sure to obtain the necessities and he cannot be discouraged or ruined.

Mortgage Taxes.

Are you a money lender? Have you invested your savings in a nice little mortgage drawing 7 per cent interest, with a clause inserted requiring the mortgagor to pay all taxes which may be assessed against you on account of your ownership of that mortgage?

If so, you are a user and are liable to a forfeiture of all interest according to the supreme court of Michigan. The case on which this decision was rendered was carried up from Bay county, and is entitled Mary E. Green et vs. executors. vs. Emeline M. Grant.

In rendering a decision on the points involved the justices of the supreme court, with only one dissenting voice, Chief Justice Hooker, declare that if at the time a mortgage is made the mortgagee knows that the aggregate of interest and taxes against the mortgage exceeds the legal rate of interest the contract is usurious, but if the mortgagee believed that if the aggregate of interest and taxes would not exceed the maximum rate of interest allowed the contract, is not usurious.

The maximum rate of interest in Michigan is 7 per cent, therefore an agreement to pay 7 per cent interest and also the mortgage taxes, no matter how small the latter may be, becomes usurious.

The penalty for exacting usury in this state is a forfeiture of all the interest on the indebtedness, and this decision of the supreme court is likely to compel a great many money lenders to revise their methods of doing business.—*Bay City Times.*

Our Costly Crime.

It has been some time since any paper has dared to claim that the Philippines will "pay". The facts are too apparent for even the most exuberant political imagination to overcome. If we could make a profit of ten per cent, on every dollar's worth of goods we sell to the Philippine islands, it would take us more than a thousand years to get back what we have already expended. If we could increase our present trade 100 per cent, and make a profit of ten per cent, on every sale, it would about defray the cost of maintaining there two regiments of American soldiers. Some of our military officers say it will be necessary to maintain there an army of from 30,000 to 50,000 men. An army of 30,000 men, kept there for a single year, would consume the profits on our present exports for 150 years. Besides all this, it is to be remembered that our exports are chiefly for the needs of the army and the camp-followers. If we should cease paying the bills, the market would disappear.

The Philippines invasion is simply an expensive crime.—*San Francisco Call.*

Seventeen Inditements.

Grand Rapids, Nov. 21—As a result of former City Attorney Salsbury's confession, warrants were issued this morning for 17 former city officials, charging them with accepting a bribe in connection with the Garman-Cameron scheme for bringing water to this city from Lake Michigan. Among those indicted are ex-mayor George R. Perry, and state senator Burns.

The amounts the respondents are charged with having received out of the alleged boodle fund range from \$200 to \$3,333.

It has developed that Salsbury's first confession was not so complete as the prosecution had hoped, Prosecutor Ward went to work at once upon the leverage offered by the incomplete statement, and secured enough additional evidence so that Salsbury was summoned again last night for a conference. The result was a statement which is completed as complete.

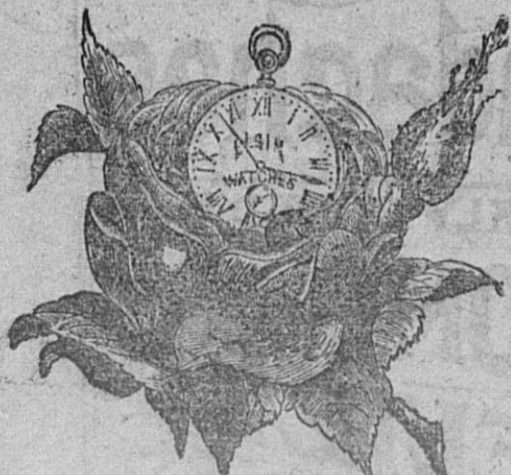
