The record of deer hunting fatalities in Michigan this season is 14 killed and 21 wounded. Four more deaths and five more wounded than last year.

W. H. Honey, a well-known business man of Standish, died at Bishop's hospital, in Bay City, Monday, of appendicitis. The deceased was 37 years of age.

The Pere Marquette car shops at Saginaw were destroyed by fire last Friday morning, incurring a loss of about \$35,000, and throwing 150 men out of employment.

Invitations announcing the marriage of Miss Delia, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Noel, of East Tawas, to William Owen, of Beloit, Wis., on Dec. 28, are out.

Tawas Bay Camp No. 11353 Modern Woodmen of America, of this city, are making good substantial gains in membership, now having a nice class of applicants ready for adoption.

The new United States cruiser Des Moines, in her official trial over the Cape Ann course, exceeded her contract requirement of 16.5 knots per hour, making an average speed of 16.663 knots.

For the first time in the history of the United States the production of coal has reached a total of over 300,000,000 short tons, showing an actual output of 300,930,659 tons of 2,000 pounds, valued at \$373,133,843.

During the early hours of Saturday morning the store of Grimore & Co., at Au Gres, was burglarized, the thieves taking a quantity of clothing and other articles. The officers were notified and captured the men at Standish.

President Hawks, of the D. & M. Railroad Company, has filed with the railroad commissioner for approval, a map of the proposed extension of that road showing crossings with the Michigan Central tracks in Cheboygan.

Twenty-three Michigan patients have been treated with the prevention of hydrophobia in view, at the Pasteur laboratory of the University of Michigan since it was opened last spring. The treatment is free to Michigan patients.

Andrew Merschel, who has been in employ of F. H. Richards & Co., for the past year and a half, has engaged in business for himself, and has opened a shop in the Conklin building, East Tawas. He is an expert workman and is prepared to do all kinds of plumbing, steam fitting and repair work.

The good people of the seventh and tenth congressional districts can prepare for a flood of sugar beet literature from Washington. Rep. Fordney has had printed 20,000 copies of his late speech on sugar beets and against Cuban reciprocity, and the presses of the government printing office are running off 15,000 copies of George Loud's speech.

Elizabeth Flitcroft was this morning granted a decree of divorce by Judge Shepard from Craig N. Flitcroft. The solicitor for complainant was Chas. W. Hitchcock. Mrs. Flitcroft was the only witness on the stand and Judge Shepard ordered that other testimony taken by the commissioner be transcribed. The grounds on which the decree was granted is desertion. —Bay City Times.

During the first five months of the present fiscal year the state land office has averaged receipts of \$40,000 a month, or \$200,000. This sum is larger than the average yearly receipts of the office, and is due to the large sales of state lands, which have brought in a great deal of money and at the same time improved conditions generally. The lands sold were to a large extent those which had been carried on the books of the state as delinquent for taxes. The land will now be subject to taxes again, and in all probability taxes will be paid on a greater portion of them.
