State Superintendent of Public Instruction Fall has asked the attorney-general for an opinion relative to his powers in connection with the employment of teachers for the day schools for the deaf provided for by an act of the 1901 legislature. The law provides that the state shall pay \$150 per year for each teacher employed in cities, but Supt. Fall has discovered that in some cities, notably Grand Rapids and Jackson, teachers are employed who are merely graduates of high schools and have no special training for the work of teaching the deaf. He has caused the state allowance in such cases to be held up, and he desires to have the attorney-general give him an interpretation of the law as to the scope of his powers under the law.
