Fire losses in the city of Detroit reached the enormous figure of \$225,000 during the first ten days of this month. This is more than half the value of the entire losses by fire in that city for the entire year of 1903.

Edward Conners, a 16-year old blind boy, committed suicide last Friday, at the school for the blind, at Lansing, by jumping from a third story fire escape, with a rope around his neck. He was the son of Wm. Conners, of West Branch.

Over in Grand Rapids a junk dealer has been hauled up for stealing a furnace and an exchange asks, "What will those fellows up there steal next?" It would be better for the rest of the town if a few of them should steal away in the night.

The G. A. R. posts of the state report greater loss of membership during the past six months than ever before in a similar period of time recording to Assistant Adjutant General Wyckoff. One secretary writes that another report would probably never be received from his post, owing to the infirmity of most of its members.

State Salt Inspector Porter's report shows the salt inspection for the month of December to have been: Saginaw district, 17,507 barrels; Bay, 9,844; St. Clair, 73,468; Manistee, 168,045; Mason, 25,486; Wayne, 55,726, making a total for the month of 350,076 barrels, an increase compared with the inspection of December, 1902, of 180,059 barrels.

The workmen on the D. & M. between here and Aloah certainly have a hard time of it this weather. They are working on the cuts in different places and besides the frozen earth they handle they are compelled to use dynamite on some of the hard pan sub-soil. However, they are proceeding with the work rapidly, when all is taken into consideration. —*Cheboygan Democrat.*

The pedro party given by Easter Morn Hive, of East Tawas, last Wednesday evening, was a very pleasant affair. Mrs. Bert Andrews won the first prize for the ladies, and Robert McMurray the gentleman's first prize. The "booby" prizes were won by George Adams and Miss Della Larson. The sofa pillow was won by Mrs. F. W. Jameson. About fifty were present.

Interstate Commissioner Judson C. Clements says that railroad accidents in 1903 were far in excess of the bloody records of previous years. "The presence of a dozen trains on trackage normally accomodating three will necessarily cause mistakes added to which the condition of the over-worked trainmen is not conducive to clear-headed train operation," he said. He is strongly advocating the block system. At present only one-seventh of the mileage of the country is blocked.

Mining engineers will be interested in the new explosive, maganite, which has been invented by Captain Baudinet and C. J. Rusher. The invention is claimed to be stronger, safer and cheaper than dynamite, while it gives off no poisonous fumes. At some recent trials which took place at Camp's Bay a four-ounce cartridge of maganite was placed in a bored hole in a rock and fired, with the result that the rock, although bedded some feet in the earth, was rent asunder, and large pieces were dislodged from their bed.

The total production of coal, anthracite and bituminous, during 1903 is estimated to be 360,000,000 tons, an increase over 1902 of 87,000,000 tons. The telephone girl is a thing of the past at Grand Rapids, the Citizens' company having displaced them with an automatic switchboard which will work 24 hours a day without a murmur, and will absolutely refuse to flirt over the 'phone. There are 5,000 wires connected with the new switchboard, which is said to be the largest automatic exchange in the world.

On Feb. 11 and 12, there will meet in the buildings of the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, the most important convention ever held for the consideration of municipal government in Michigan. This will be the sixth annual meeting of the League of Michigan Municipalities, which on this occasion will be combined with a meeting of the Michigan Political Science Association.

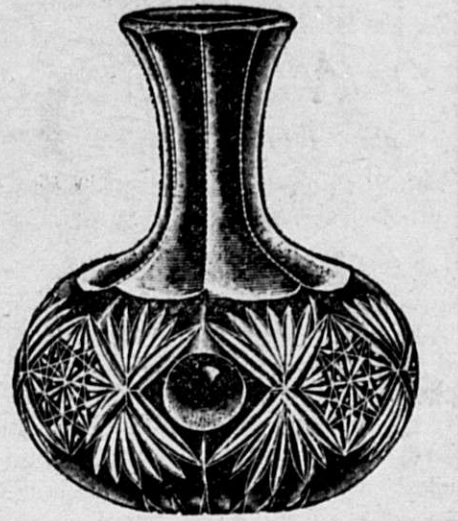
