Marcus A. Hanna, chairman of the national republican committee has finally issued the call for the republican convention to be held at Chicago, June 21. All delegates must be elected at least a month before that date.

A large number of Germans from Illinois, have recently purchased land in Bay county, and are locating there for the purpose of raising sugar beets. Several hundred people have already arrived, and others will follow.

A grade crossing accident at DeI roit last Friday evening, resulted in the death of two, and injury to about 40 people, when a Grand Trunk train smashed into a loaded street car. A separation of grades seem the only possible way of avoiding these accidents.

The Alcoa Land Co., is going to erect a small saw and shingle mill at Roé Lake, and will use the product of the mill in building fences and sheds for a great sheep ranch to be established on its lands. Contracts for getting out logs for the mill have already been let.

Gross earnings of all the railroads in the United States reporting for the first week in January were \$4,430,500, a loss of 3 per cent compared with the same time last year. Most of the western roads report a small loss in earnings, but in the southwest earnings continue larger.

R. G. Dun & Co. report 324 commercial failures last week, against 400 the week before, and 267 for the corresponding week of last year. In Canada there were 24 failures, against 37 the week before and 38 last year. Of the failures in the United States 108 report liabilities of \$5,000 or more.

A Michigan man wrote Attorney Cunnen of New York to inquire whether electrocution is an effective punishment for the crime of murder. The attorney general in reply stated that, so far as he is aware, no man who has suffered that punishment, ever again committed murder, or any other crime.

The directors of the State Fair association have passed a resolution to select a permanent location for the fair, and appointed Directors Fifield, Hoffman, Butterfield, Young and Collier a committee to receive applications from cities up to Feb. 15, after which the next meeting of the directors will be held.

Senator Dolliver introduced a bill providing for the pensioning of all persons who had ninety days or more military or naval service in the civil war, and for widows of such soldiers or sailors who were married prior to June 27, 1895. The pensions are to be \$12 a month, to take effect at the date of application after the passage of the bill.

The attendance was about as usual—27 of the 298 members being present. Notwithstanding the very unfavorable weather which was encountered during the fair last fall, the report of the officials show a gradual improvement of the condition of the society.

### Farmers State Round-Up.

The state round-up of Farmers' institutes which is to be held at the Agricultural College, February, 23 26, promises to be one of the most interesting and successful round-ups ever held in the state. Professor Taft superintendent of institutes, has secured one-half fare on all railroads and the college is preparing to give the visitors a royal welcome. Topics relating to farm crops, dairying, stock breeding and feeding, bee keeping, fruit growing, sugar beets, cucumber culture good roads, forestry, farm law, education, domestic and social science, etc., will be discussed by experts.

The college seems a very appropriate place for holding the institute. It is centrally located, easy to reach from all parts of the state and gives an opportunity to visit the institution and the round-up at the same time. The college is always glad to have the round-up held there for it gives the students an opportunity to study the practical and up-to-date questions which interest the farmer.
