A Grand Rapids physician invites attention to the practice in many cities of using salt on street car tracks and sidewalks to free them of snow and ice. He believes that it is responsible for many cases of grip and pneumonia which are so prevalent at this season of the year. The combination of snow and salt makes a freezing mixture of the most intense kind, as is illustrated in the use of salt and ice in making ice cream. People tramp about in the snow and salt, the feet becomes suddenly chilled, and the foundation is laid for grip and pneumonia. This practice has heretofore met with condemnation at the hands of physicians, but it is followed regardless of the consequences or the ordinances which forbid it.

The force of nurses employed in the University hospital at the University of Michigan now numbers a total of 51. Of these, one is superintendent of the school for nurses, one is her assistant, 6 are graduate nurses and 43 are pupils in the nurses's training school.

The law firm of Ross & Harris of this village have commenced a law suit in Roscommon county to test the validity of the action of the board of supervisors in rebating taxes to purchasers of delinquent tax lands. The action is brought by the township of Gersh against the county. A few years ago several of the townships and school districts entered into an agreement with certain land speculators to rebate 90 per cent of the local taxes, if they would pay over the remaining 10 per cent of the delinquent taxes. The county also agreed to make the same rebate on their share, and the amount of the different rebates was paid over by the county treasurer under a resolution of the board of supervisors. There is now a new set of township officers and they claim that the action of their predecessors was not only invalid but unlawful; hence the suit to compel the county to turn over the amount of the rebate. The case will be watched with considerable interest as the same conditions exist in a number of other counties and may lead to more litigation on the part of townships or school districts which may feel themselves aggrieved by the action of their representatives.—West Branch Herald-Times.
