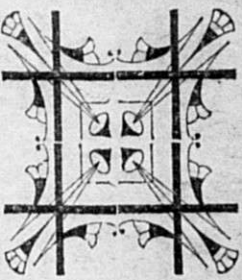

The bills of Stickney & Robinson, supplies \$3.84; and F. M. King, for services, \$2.50, in Kir, bitz small box case presented.

Moved by Ald. Walker, supported by Ald. Dixon, that above small box bills be certified to the Board of Supervisors as correct. Carried all voting yeas.

Moved by Ald. Stahmer, supported by Ald. Dixon, that the Committee on Ways, Means & Finance constitute a committee to settle with the City Treasurer. Carried.

Moved by Ald. Walker, supported by Ald. Dixon, that Aid. Garber, Stahmer and Schlichte serve as the Board of Registration and as election Inspectors, for ensuing city election. Carried.

Moved by Ald. Walker, supported by Ald. Stahmer, that Aid. Dixon, Len J. Patterson and W. W. Ramage constitute the board of Election Commissioners for ensuing election. Carried.

Moved by Ald. Walker, supported by Ald. Stahmer, that City orders be drawn in payment of taxes of 1902 and 1903 on property owned by City for park purposes. Carried, all voting yeas.

On motion council then adjourned to Tuesday eve. March, 29, 1904.

It is reported that the Warner men in Alpena county sprung a "snap convention" on the Stearns people last Thursday, and secured Alpena's eight delegates for the "cheese maker."

The old adage "a hit bird always flutters," seems to have been most emphatically proven by the howl put up by certain congressman whose names were included in the report of rottenness in the postoffice department, sent to the house of representatives last week. Willie Alldenying Smith, of Grand Rapids, seems to have felt especially bad because he was implicated.

Leader Murphy, of Tammany Hall, and some of his lieutenants are having difficulty in agreeing as to whether Judge Parker or Grover Cleveland shall be the candidate of the New York democracy for the presidency. The next thing they know W. R. Hearst will beat them all out and secure the delegates.

After reading the speeches made by a number of congressmen who were hit by the report of Fourth Assistant Postmaster General Bristow's report which was submitted to the house last week, one would naturally conclude that all the rottenness in government affairs was confined to the postoffice department. It's bad enough, but there are others.

Judge Wanty, of Grand Rapids, has declined an invitation to attend the "under the oaks" celebration at Jackson, giving as his reason that a judge of any court should avoid active participation in any political party function. If all members of the judiciary would use as good judgment their popularity among the people would be much greater.

**Cadet Appointments.**

Congressman Loud has been advised of two appointments for him to fill for the naval academy at Annapolis, for which eight candidates are desired, one principal and three alternates for each appointment. Candidates must be competent to pass a very strict physical and mental examination, and any desiring to apply will

be supplied with information by writing Congressman Loud. There will be two examinations, and each can be taken by the candidates at their option. The first will be held the third Tuesday in April, at Saginaw, Grand Rapids, Detroit or Washington, D. C. The second examination will be held the third Tuesday in June at Annapolis, Md., only. Candidates in applying must supply written recommendation from the principal of the school in which they have been attending, both as to mental qualifications and moral standing.

**Knocked Out.**

Washington, March 14.—The opinion of the supreme court of the United States in the case of the Northern Securities Co. vs. the United States involving the merger of the Northern Pacific and the Great Northern railroad companies was handed down today and was in favor of the government. The opinion was read by Justice Harlan.

The opinion of the United States circuit for the district of Minnesota was affirmed.

The effect is to sustain the contention that the Sherman anti-trust law applies to railroad combinations of the character in question.

The decision was concurred in by Justices Brown, Brewer, McKenna and Day, while the chief justice and Justice White, Justice Peckham and Justice Holmes dissented. Justice Brewer gave a different reason for concurring in the decision than that of the majority.

The case has attracted more attention than any other suit before the court since the first insular cases were decided, and has been regarded by bench and bar as equal in importance with those cases and with the income tax case. It was argued in December last for two days, and attracted general attention at that time as it did previously when the decision was rendered by the circuit court for the district of Minnesota.

The action was brought in the circuit court under the law of Feb. 11, 1902, which was for the purpose of expediting the case and was heard by the four circuit judges of the circuit. They united in a decision favorable to the United States and opposed to the contentions of the railroad companies.

Holy Rosary Academy, at Essexville, was destroyed by fire Saturday night. The Sisters in charge and 45 children were rescued with difficulty, six persons being injured, two seriously. The fire is believed to be of incendiary origin, and the people of the village are wrought up to a high pitch, as fires of that nature have occurred at the rate of three or four a week.

It has been reported to the state board of health that the increase in the amount of typhoid fever is as high as 214 per cent above the average. The appalling increase is shown by reports from towns to be confined entirely to places making use of a general water supply. In vicinities where private pumps are used there is no such increase. The moral is clear—boil the water—say the health authorities.

ALL TO HANG.

Fate of Car Barn Bandits Decided Saturday.

Chicago, March 12.—"Hanging for all" was the verdict of the jury today in the first murder case against the so-called "car barn bandits," Harvey VanDine, Peter Neidmeyer and Gustave Marx, who attained notoriety by a desperate all day battle that started in a "dug out" in Indiana, where the trio had taken refuge after a series of remarkable crimes, including the murder of two employes of the Chicago railway at one of the company's barns here, the motive in each instance being robbery.

Emil Roeske, who was with the bandits in the dug out and who participated in many of their crimes is to be tried separately, not having been implicated directly in the particular murder for which his associates were first arraigned.

The verdict of the jury was delayed from yesterday afternoon until today on account of a temporary division of opinion as to making the punishment alike for all the defendants.

The bandits heard their doom stolidly. The mother of VanDine was in the court room. Neidmeyer's mother was also present. The mother of Marx has not appeared. She is said to be at home in a state bordering on collapse.

March Crop Report.

The temperature during February was low, varying, according to the Michigan Weather Bureau, from four to ten degrees below the normal. There was a heavy fall of snow so that the ground was well covered during the month.

In answer to the question, "Has wheat during February suffered injury from any cause?" 174 correspondents in the southern counties answer "yes," and 175 "no;" in the central counties 8 answer "yes" and 135 "no;" and in the northern counties none answer "yes" and 91 "no." Snow protected wheat in the southern counties 3.45 weeks, in the central counties 3.96 weeks, in the northern counties 4.00 weeks and in the state 3.65 weeks.

The average depth of snow on February 15th was, in the southern counties 9.94 inches, in the central counties 15.82 inches, in the northern counties 22.55 inches and in the state 13.28 inches.

On the 29th the average depth of snow in the southern counties was 6.40 inches, in the central counties 14.92 inches, in the northern counties 25.85 inches and in the state 11.50 inches.

In most of the counties throughout the state wheat suffered no injury during February. In some of the more southern counties the majority of crop correspondents agreed that some damage had been done; reports from the southern section, as a whole, are very evenly divided in regard to the matter. The crop is passing through a critical period at the present time, the outcome of which depends largely on climate conditions during March.

The average condition of horses and sheep in the state is 95, of cattle, 93, and of swine, 94. All kinds of live stock are reasonably healthy and in thrifty condition.

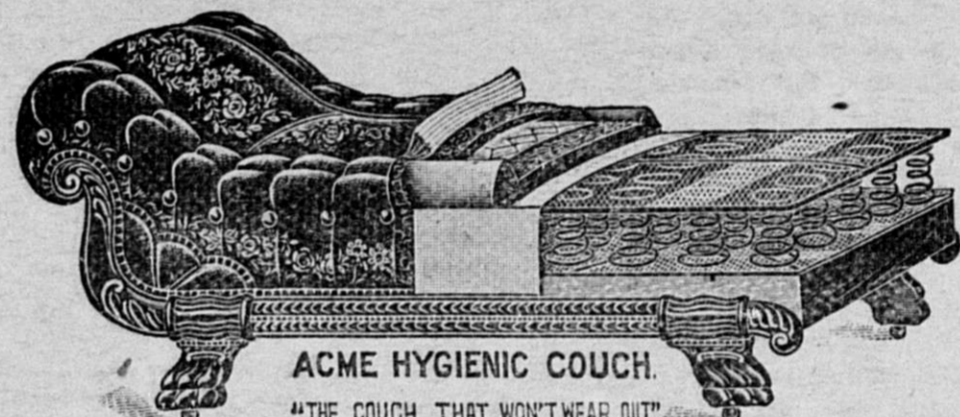
