Death of Two Pioneers.

Two aged and highly respected pioneers passed to the great beyond this week.

MARY LOUISE BRABANT.

Died, at the home of her son Steven, in this city, March 21, 1904, Mary Louise Brabant, aged 84 years, 9 months and 5 days. The deceased was born of French Canadian parents at Coteau-du-Lac, Lower Canada. At the age of 17 she was married to the late Antoine Brabant, and was the mother of 13 children, five of whom died in infancy. The family moved to Upper Canada, where within a few months the father died, leaving the subject of this sketch among strangers to make a living for the family and with undaunted courage she faced the struggle. The following year the family moved to Detroit, and from there came to Tawas City, some 31 years ago. Her faithfulness to her family and kindness of heart to all won for her the respect of the entire community, and for years she has been known as Grandma Brabant. Four sons, Suple, Joseph, Steven and Nelson, nineteen grand children, and ten great grand children, besides a large circle of friends are left to mourn her loss and cherish her memory.

The funeral was held from St. Josephs Catholic church Wednesday morning at 9 o'clock. Rev. Fr. Kinney officiating, and was largely attended. The Ladies' Altar Society, of which the deceased was an honored member, attended in a body.

John Kinney, an aged and highly respected resident of Alabaster, died at his home in that township, Monday night. The decease was born in Ireland, and had he lived until next August would have been 95 years of age. He has been a resident of Alabaster for over 30 years. The first battle between Hearst and Parker for the control of delegates to the democratic national convention will take place in Indiana. Tom Taggart, national committeeman from Indiana, is for Parker, and it has been decided to make an open fight.

Granges, Farmers clubs and other reform organizations are now busy passing resolutions declaring they will not support any man or party who are not pledged to support primary reform and other reform measures. A careful analysis of the votes cast in these neighborhoods at next fall's election will show that all these good resolutions have been forgotten, and that "party" has taken preference to "principle."

Whenever some millionaire gentile senator at Washington gets married as a rule, like Boss Platt, he has to settle with some female clerk of the departments or stenographer. Some of the old coons, settle before scandal comes but many do not. Yet from the howl going up about Senator Smoot, of Utah, one would think that there were no glass houses inhabited by our representatives in the U. S. Senate.—*Cheboygan Democrat.*

The nomination of Hon. George A. Prescott, of this city, for the office of secretary of state by the republicans would receive a most enthusiastic endorsement from the people of this county. Mr. Prescott is the kind of a man whom his neighbors are pleased to endorse, and is well qualified for any position of trust to which he may be called to fill. While he informs us that it is not yet an assured fact that he will stand for the nomination, there is no doubt but what he can secure the support of this section of the state if he wants it.

Will It be Ignored?

Under the "leave to print" rule in the house of representatives, Congressman Baker, of N. Y., succeeded in getting printed in the Congressional Record, charges against Congressman Babcock, of Wisconsin, which should lead to the investigation of the most rotten part of the postoffice department. It is well-known that the basis on which the railroads receive pay for carrying the mails is based on the amount in weight carried in some certain month selected once in four years. Rep. Baker charges, and supports his charges with affidavit, that during the mail weighing term Congressman Babcock shipped tons after tons of congressional and other documents in to his district under frank thus increasing the railroads income many thousand dollars. In some towns several tons of this stuff was sent to one man, and more mail was sent to some offices than had been received before in 16 years. This same charge will apply to many other districts throughout the country. In fact this enormous "graft" has been the one thing above all others which has prevented a thorough investigation of the entire postoffice department. Could something be done to stop this immense robbery the annual deficit in the postoffice department would disappear.

A pamphlet has been sent to all representatives from S. W. Green, of New York, that the department is paying millions for the service of transporting mails it doesn't get. He charges this weighing of mails for a short period to determine the compensation for four years was accepted as the correct basis, but after that large amounts of second-class mail matter were ruled out for which the department is still paying at the rate of \$55.40 per ton. He says the amount "quenched" in two years was 298,602 tons, which represents \$14,880,550, which the department is still paying without any service being rendered by the railroads.

The Value Of Trees.

In many parts of our country farming would be impossible but for the trees, such is their influence upon the streams. They regulate the water supply and their tendency is to prevent both flood and drouth; they supply fuel, one of the greatest necessities of life, and they furnish the lumber for the building of our cities, railroads, ships, and a thousand other things without which our present civilization would not have been possible for ages, if at all. This is why we should be careful of our forests, which are fast dwindling away in many sections; this is why we should legislate against sheep-grazing in the forests, and against other practices which tend to cause forest fires, and why we should try to protect our trees from their natural enemies, such as landslides, floods, insects and fungi. And it is well to remember that we cannot replace in fifty years a tree which we can destroy in an hour.—*Woman's Home Companion.*

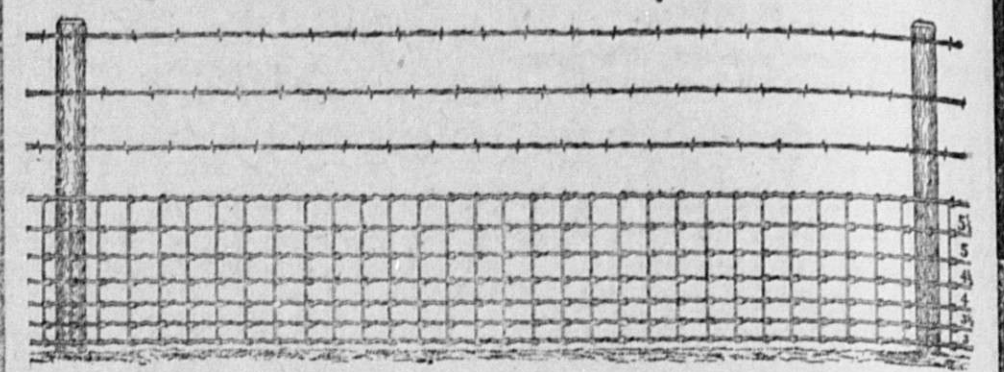
The old, time honored Ten Commandments, as handed down to Moses on the tablet of stone, have been warped and twisted by the factory bosses until they read something like this:

9. Thou shalt hold no meetings to consider thine own interest or protest against a reduction of wages. Thou shalt not have a union paper in thy house, for it speaks the truth and is not afraid to say that my belly is filled with choice roast beef and plum pudding, while the poor are lucky to get codfish and water. Thou shalt read no newspaper of any sort, as I wish to keep thee in ignorance all the days of thy life.
10. Thou shalt not covet thy master's money or his comforts or his luxuries or anything that is his. Thou shalt not covet thy overseer's room. Thou shalt not covet his money though he gets \$3 a day and thou \$1. Thou shalt not object to anything as I want to reign over and tyrannize over thee and keep thee in bondage all the days of thy life.

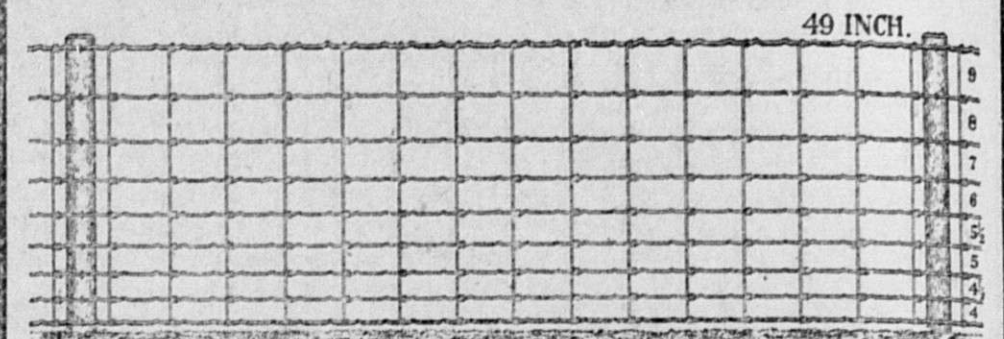

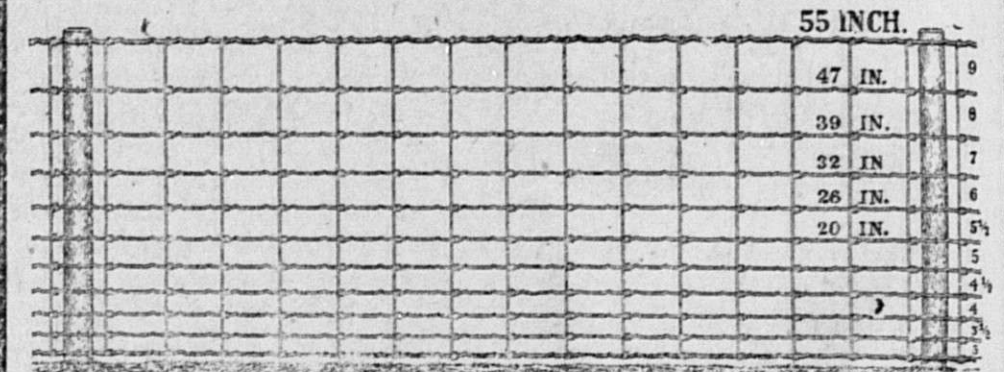
