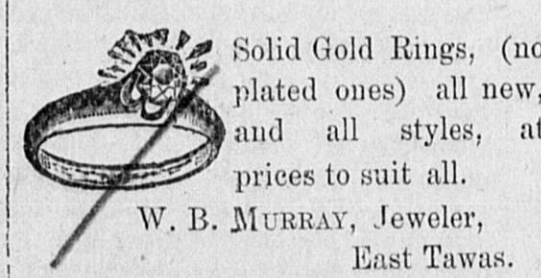

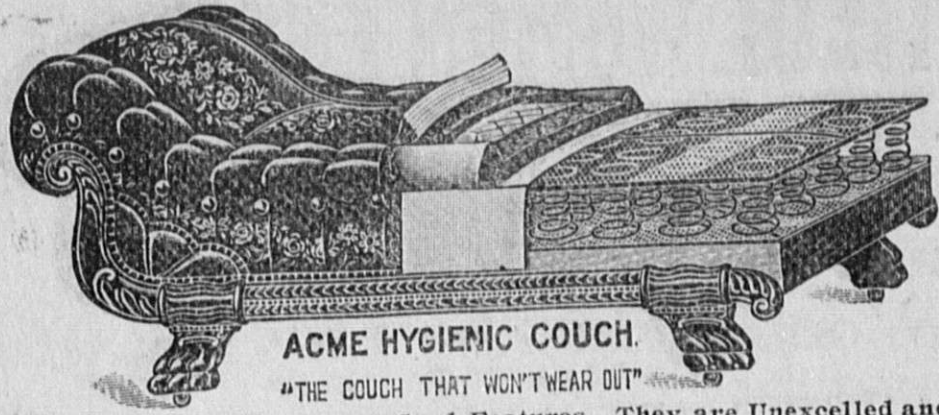

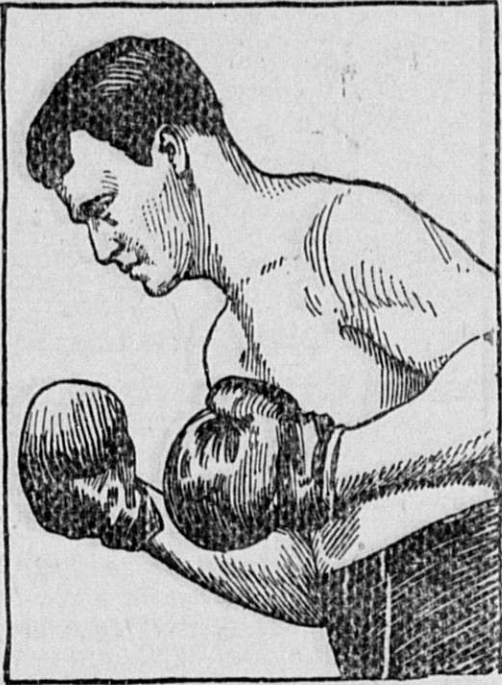

The SPORTING WORLD

Munroe and Jeffries.

Jack Munroe, the Butte (Mont.) miner boxer, has been prominently before the public since his recent victory over Tom Sharkey in Philadelphia. Munroe's next opponent will be Jim Jeffries.



JACK MUNROE IN ACTION.

His victory in the national bowling tournament at Cleveland makes Martin Kern of St. Louis the undisputed tenpin champion of America. For years he has been known as one of the best six bowlers in the country, but he has been falling off during the past two years. This has been due mostly to ill health, and, as his health improved recently, Kern came back into the form that places him above all.

With the exception of the 1903 tournament, Mr. Kern has demanded notice in every national tournament for years. With the championship this year he has won the Timm trophy, which was put up for the last time in Cleveland. Kern won the trophy the second year it was put up at the Buffalo tournament. As it was decided this year that the trophy go to the winner as his actual property, Mr. Kern has one more cup in his collection of prizes.

In a match game some time ago Kern made the remarkable average of 298 for two games. In order to make this score he bowled twenty-three successive strikes, falling off four pins with his final ball.

English Lad and Highball.

The much talked of colt, English Lad, by Reginald—English Lady, favorite in the Kentucky Derby, will be shipped east after the American Derby next June to start in the Lawrence Realization stakes. Last year the colt was the best two-year-old in the west, winning \$23,000 in stakes and purses. This winter he has developed into a magnificent three-year-old, for whom his owner, Cook, recently refused \$20,000.

It is improbable that Highball will be a starter in the Montgomery handicap. The weight, 116 pounds, is not regarded with favor by Trainer May, who also believes that it would be asking too much of the colt to start him in such a hard race so early in the season. Highball will be seen in the early stakes and will then be shipped to Chicago about the 1st of June to start in the American Derby, for which he will be especially pointed.

Amherst Baseball.

Regular baseball practice has begun at Amherst. A large number of candidates have reported to Captain Shay. Practice will be continued every afternoon to try out the new material. Fielding practice will be held in the baseball cage in Pratt gymnasium under the direction of Captain Shay, while the batting drill will be in Barrett gymnasium. For some time this will be the extent of the work until the squad is thinned out and more of the old men report. Coach Dowd will then take up the work in sliding to bases, and the general theory of the game will be studied.

Reid Harvard's Coach?

The appointment of Edward Bowditch, Jr., to a secretarial position with the United States consulate at Dalny, Manchuria, is taken by well informed undergraduates to mean that Bill Reid will be head football coach for Harvard this season. Rowditch was practically slated for the position, and now that he has accepted the consular place it is looked upon as a certainty that Reid will be given the post.

Ill Tempered Horses. Bad habits in horses must always have their origin in bad handling when they are young. Kind treatment will develop the best there is in a horse, but meanness to colts hurts a horse's disposition permanently. Jerking at the bit and other ill treatment never do any good. Horses have long memories. They do not forget injuries.

Andrews Has Tommy Britton.

The well known trainer W. J. Andrews has arrived at the Jewett covered track with a string of seven horses. In the lot are Tommy Britton, 2:03½; Re-elected, 2:11¼, and five without records, including several that are very promising.

Concerning Jack Curry.

Jack Curry will have the Texas pacer Al Bock back in his stable this year. Curry will train his horses at the Empire City (N. Y.) track early in the season and put the finishing touches on at the Grosse Point course.

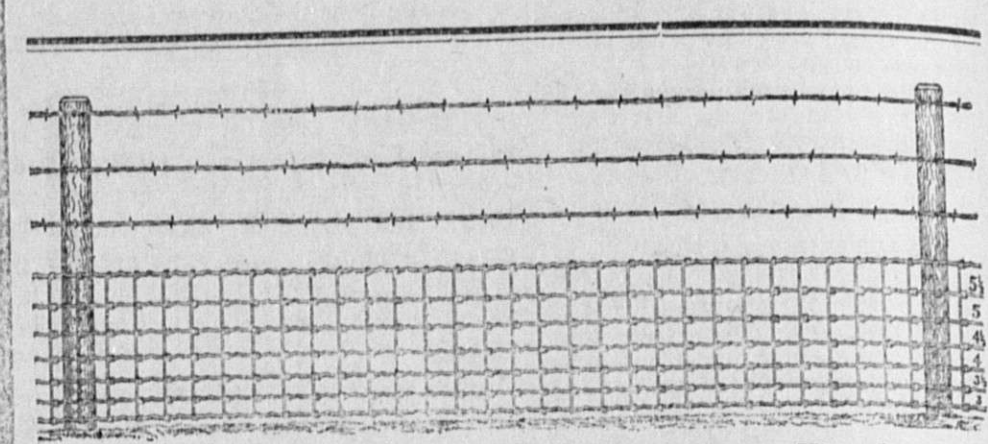

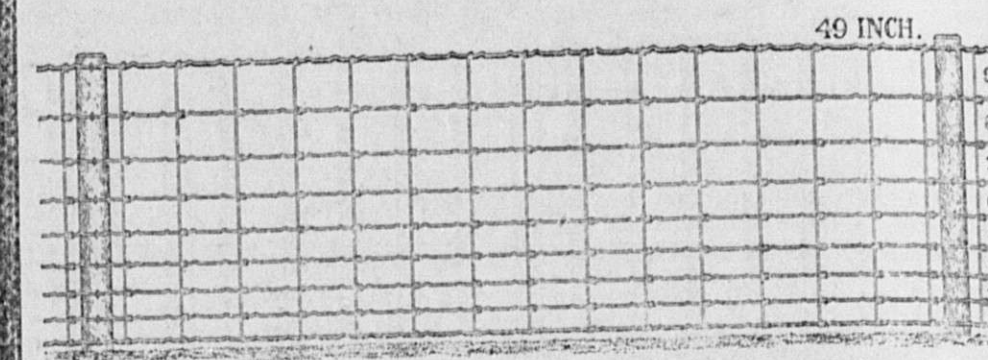

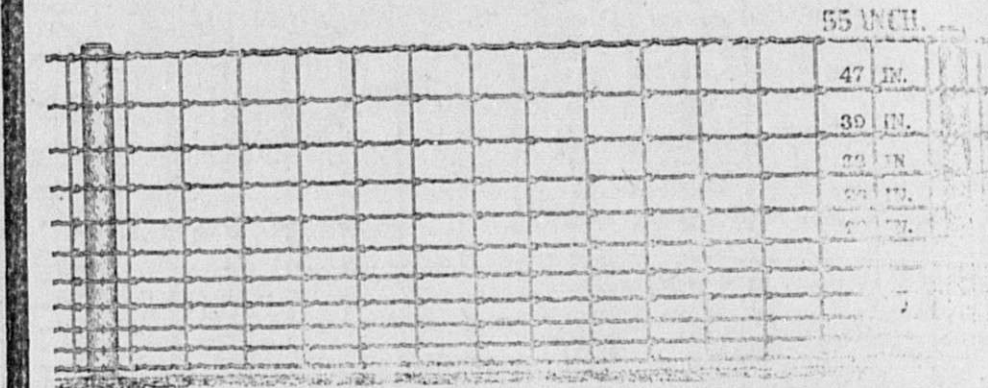

We had quite a snow a week ago, which was the first we had had this winter. The boys and girls enjoyed themselves very much in snow balling.

Cotton grows very extensively down here and some of the stalks grow to be six feet high. It is a beautiful sight to see it growing in the field with the white balls of cotton on the stalks. In the first place the cotton makes a blossom and on the first morning it is white and the next morning it is pink, and then drops off. Then it forms a ball which is about as large as an egg and about that shape; then it breaks open like a hickory nut shell and the cotton forms into four parts.

My papa has a peach orchard and one with mixed kinds, which are plums, apples, and pecans. I don't suppose they raise pecans up there because it is so cold.


