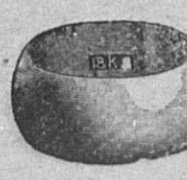
Regular services at the Tawas City M. E. church next Sunday. The pastor preaches morning and evening. Public services.

### The Country Newspaper.

We have heard it said that since the advent of the rural carrier and the suburban railway, bringing the city and country more closely together, the country newspaper would be a thing of the past. This, however, is not a fact. There can be no change in conditions that will ever affect the country newspaper. It has a field distinctly its own and will continue it so long as the subscriber to the local paper has a particle of interest in the neighborhood happenings and that will be always. The city newspaper cannot now, nor will it in the future, take the place in the homes of country and towns people that their local paper does. The news columns of the city daily are too limited to give the personal news of the villages, and it would soon lose its usefulness as a city paper should it attempt it. The country and village people want to know what their neighbors are doing and can only learn it from the local paper. Consequently they will continue to subscribe for it so long as it retains its individuality as a local newspaper and remains close to its patrons. Advertisers know this and will continue to patronize the country newspaper. While it is true that the city daily has increased its suburban circulation, it has only added to the reading matter of the country and village people and not in any way taken the place of the local paper or affected in any way its usefulness or circulation.—Michigan Farmer.

### 100 Families to Settle along the A. S. & N. W. this year.

AuSable, April 4.—Settlers are beginning to arrive here for points along the line of the AuSable & Northwestern railroad. Six families came last night from points in Ohio and Indiana, bringing four carloads of important movables. Many other families are on their way from Oklahoma, Kansas, Nebraska, Iowa and other states. Quite a number of land lookers have been here from other states and bought land during the past two weeks. This influx of desirable settlers is largely due to the work of the railroad company's land commissioner, A. R. Code. He expects to locate at least one hundred families along the line this year who will look the land over with a view to securing homes for themselves in the future.

Land in the localities where these settlements are have increased in value in the past two years.

**Japan's Great Naval Leader.**

One of the most interesting figures in the war in the far east is Vice Admiral Heihachiro Togo, commander in chief of the Japanese war fleets. Admiral Togo attracted the attention of the whole world by the daring of his attack upon the Russian fleet at Port

Arthur and further secured his place as the idol of the Japanese people, who think there is no admiral on the seas so brave as their own Togo.

A great part of Admiral Togo's naval education was received at the British Naval college at Greenwich. In 1894, when the war began between China and Japan, he was commander of a cruiser. For vallant service in that war he was at its conclusion raised to the rank of rear admiral. From that time until his promotion to the high place he now holds he was in charge of one of the mikado's principal dockyards on the sea of Japan.

Admiral Togo is about fifty-five years of age. He is not of noble birth, but is a simple gentleman, one of the samurai of the Satsuma clan, from which spring so many of his fellow officers.

**Cabinet Eligibles.**

The senate is very much of a retreat for former members of the cabinet. There are no less than three former secretaries of war. Proctor served under Harrison twelve years ago, and he was succeeded by Elkins, who is now a senator from West Virginia. Alger was McKinley's first secretary of war. Teller was a Republican secretary of the interior away back in Arthur's time. There are a number of senators who might have been cabinet officers if they would have consented to it. Allison has declined the secretaryship of the treasury at least three times from as many different presidents. Aldrich declined the same position when McKinley came in. Chauncey M. Depew could have been secretary of state under Harrison during the last few months of the latter's administration after the resignation of Blaine. Senator Hoar has been invited into the cabinet, besides being invited to be ambassador to Great Britain. John C. Spooner could have been attorney general under McKinley, and McKinley also asked him to be secretary of the interior. He also declined the chairmanship of the national committee in the second Harrison campaign.

**A Vanderbilt in Dublin Castle.**

Word comes from London that the Duke of Marlborough is to receive the appointment of viceroy of Ireland, as has been rumored for some time. The appointment is to be announced soon after Easter, when the Earl of Dudley will retire. This means that an American woman is to rule in Dublin castle. Her grace the Duchess of Marlborough, formerly Consuelo Vanderbilt of

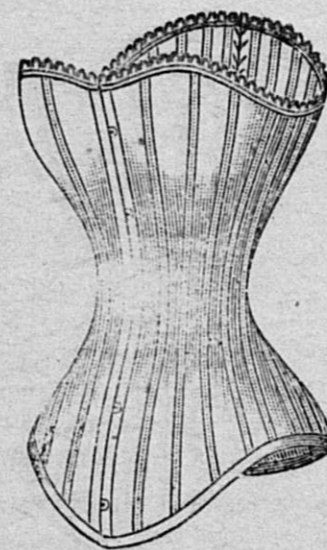
