High Record Gold Coinage.

Philadelphia, April 18.—The enor mous output of gold comage at the Philadelphia mint continues at a rate which surpasses all previous records. Since February 6 up to April 16 there has been coined \$60,180,390 in \$20 gold pieces.

The coinage during the week beginning Monday, April 11 and ending Saturday April 15, inclusive. aggregated \$11,302,600 in gold, an average of hearly \$2,000,000 per day. On the last day of this record breaking week the coinage was \$5,500,000 as a record breaker. The weight of the gold to produce this one week's coinage was over 42 tons. This vast coinage of gold in so short a time, it was announced at the mint, has never been equalled by the mints of any other nation nor by any mint in this coun-



"LET THERE BE LIGHT."

The Practical Gas Construction Co. submit a Lighting Proposition for Municipal and

Commercial Lighting. The question of street and commercial lighting has been discussed in this eity for the past ten years, but nothing has been accomplished. That light is needed and desired is admitted by all; yet the question of expense has been such that nothing has been accomplished and we are still in darkness. During the past week C. H. De-Gryse, representing the Practical Gas Construction Co., of North Chicago, Ill., has been in the city and on Tuesday evening submitted to the city council a plan and proposition for a municipal lighting plant, which his company claim will excell any electric light plant in existance both as to cost and quality of light. In substance their claim is as follows:

The plant which they propose for said to be second to none in the state. this city would be a 1200 light plant, each light equal to 70 candle power or ful operation of the road largely to a total of 84,000 candle power. In these two facts. - Detroit Free Press. comparing this with electricity to furnish the same candle power would require 525 horse power, as one horse power is required to furnish ten 16 candle power incandescent electric Salt Trust a fresh illustration of the lights one hour. The cost of running old saying, "there are tricks in all an electric plant is very expensive as is well-known.

Mr. DeGryse claims that a 1200 light Practical Cold Gas plant will furnish this city with light for the present as well as for years to come, and a better light at less money than any electric light plant. The claim for this plant is that it does away with the expensive question of labor and fuel and can be operated at a very small expense, the entire plant being built to work automatically, and requires but very little attention, it being estimated at from two to three hours daily. It does not require an expert to operate it, and can be attended to by the marshal at very little additional cost to the city. Gasoline is used to manufacture the gas, and the claim is that five gallons of gasoline will furnish 1000 cubic feet of gas. This gas furnishes not only light, but is an economical fuel for cooking purposes and furnishes power for gas and gasoline engines.

The proposition to the city, which is estimated, and can probably be bettered if adopted, is this: The company will install a 1200 light plant including a brick and coment building, all machinery and engines for man ufacturing the gas, lay three and one half miles of mains, set and connect 35 boulevard street lights for a cost not to exceed \$8,500. The company claims that this plant, with 100 consumers of gas will light our streets pay the running expenses of the plant and pay for the installing of the plant in ten years, and at the same time furnish the consumers with better and cheaper lights than can be had from electric or any other light. They furnish the names of 90 towns where these gas plants have been installed and ask our city council to send a com mittee to any of them and investigate as to whether their statements are true are not.

The Herald gives the statements to its readers as they have been furnished to the city council and our people. It is our opinion that the proposition is worthy of consideration and investigation, and we believe that our city council will be justified in appointing a committee to visit plants now in operation and investigate the matter. Why should we longer go in the dark?



Spreads of old hand woven linen, with borders of antique lace, are being used again by those who are fortunate to possess them. Dishwashing Machine.

When the inventor set himself the task of designing a machine to relieve the washerwoman of the hardest part of her work, about the only obstacle he had to contend with was the tearing of the fabric as it went through the cleaning process, which difficulty was very soon overcome, with the clothes washer as the result. In making a machine that would wash dishes, however, the task was not so easy, as breakage of the crockery is apt to occur frequently if the pieces are subjected to severe handling.

As will be seen, the plates, cups, saucers, etc., are piled up around the

sides of a conical wire support, and when in position a flat wire grating is placed over them. Above and below the dishes are placed coiled springs, which serve to compress the cone and grating together and prevent movement of the contents of the washer while in motion. When the outer vessel is partially filled with hot water, the inner casing, with its load of crockery, is churned up and down as often as may be necessary to remove the dirt, the water circulating freely through the wires and around the dishes.

A Bench For Library Window. An attractive device for a library window, either in a city or country house, is a bench made of whitewood decorated by pyrography. This useful as well as ornamental bench should be first put into shape by a nearby carpenter and afterward the top fire etched in some strong individual design. The treatment may be a group of blossoms, copied in their natural lines, or in some bold conventionalized method suitable for a flowery plan-either a treatment of chrysanthemums, sunflowers, big bunches of grapes and leaves or a branch of dogwood blossoms. After the pattern is laid in by the pencil the pyrogen does the rest. The remaining part of the wood which is not fire etched is stained in walnut or mahogany.
