Railroad Taxes.

Lansing, April 30.—This is the last day for payment of railroad taxes without the application of the penalty, and as a result the auditor general has received \$1,297,374.33. This amount is computed by the companies on their earnings under the old law and they are given receipts on account for the respective amounts paid. The total assessed on these companies under the new law was \$2,353,914.06, a difference of about \$900,000. This hangs on the pend-

ing litigation. The largest amount paid to-day was by the Michigan Central, its check for taxes on the main and leased lines was \$554,436.79.

On An Extensive Scale.

The St. Helens Development Co., of St. Helens, Roscommon county, has closed three deals with Chicago parties for grazing lands in northeastern Roscommon. The largest is for 6,400 acres, and the others for slightly smaller tracts. All three will be developed into stock farms The company is operating in Crawford and Roscommon counties, and the development of the grazing land, which has lain idle since the pine was removed, is proceeding rapidly. In Alcona, the recently organized stock farm has a crew of seventy-five carpenters working on seeep sheds, that are 38x150 feet, and other buildings, made last week. 

Gentlemen—Seyeral weeks ago Mr BC Berger, of Detroit, Mich., agent for the ElliottFisher Book Typewriter Company, wrote me asking to put in one of their machines in the Register of Deeds office here on trial, he to pay all expense if not purchased. Being favorably mpressed with his proposition I wrote him to send an Elliott No 2 Book typewriter on trial. Received the machine one month ago and have since been using it for recording. I find that it works in a very satisfactory manner on the books now in use, making a clear, legible and permanent record. Also find that it requires only about one-half the space required for pen only that is, an instrument that will take up same source, and remaining unpaid; be it same source, and remaining unpaid; be it two pages of the record if put in with a pen, can be recorded with this machine on a trifle over one page. A printed form book costs \$20, and I think I am safe in saying that by the use of this machine one plain record book at an expense of \$16.will go as far as two form books at an expense of \$40. The price of the machine with an automatic roll top table is \$175, which amount the county will save in five years on the differ-ence in cost of books alone, to say nothing about the saving in vauit space and roller book shelves which of course would be in the same propor-tion. The machine would be used for the re-cords in the offices of the county clerk and judge of probate as well as in the office of the register. The question of the indelibility of type-written records having been raised, I wrote Mr Berger regarding it and attach hereto his reply.
