The United States sold \$193,000,000 worth of breadstuff abroad last year, an increase of \$6,000,000 over the best previous year.

With a deficit of \$77,000,000 starting in the face it would seem a good plan for the government to economize in the graft department.

The Louisiana Purchase exposition opened at St. Louis last Saturday. This is the most extensive and expensive exposition ever attempted, and opened under the most favorable conditions.

The last member of the first class graduated from the University of Michigan has just died. He was Edmund Fish, of the class of 1845. His death occurred at his home at Hillsboro, Ill., where he had for many years been a surveyor and fruit grower.

A state convention of the men who voted for John C. Fremont, in 1856, has been called to meet at Jackson, May 18. It is believed that there are nearly 6,000 of these men in Michigan. The names and addresses of over 3,000 have already been collected.

The University of Michigan has purchased the dental library of Dr. Jonathan Taft, for many years dean of the department of dentistry. The library will be added to the collection of dental books now at the disposal of the faculty and students of the department.

Joseph W. Folk, of Missouri, is now being promptly mentioned as a possible candidate for the democratic presidential nomination. He would make an ideal candidate, and if there is any way to prevent either Cleveland and Bryan from endorsing him there might be a possible chance to nominate a candidate that would unite the two wings of the democratic party.

A defaulting postmaster has given himself up at Winona, Minn., after wandering about the country for ten years with a bad case of conscience. His wish is to take his medicine at once; indeed, he would probably have surrendered a month or two ago, but feared to do so while Congress was in session, lest the majority should block an investigation of his crime. He evidently has little knowledge of law, but he seems to know Congress fairly well.—Ex.

Railroad Taxes.

Lansing, April 30.—This is the last day for payment of railroad taxes without the application of the penalty, and as a result the auditor general has received \$1,297,374.33. This amount is computed by the companies on their earnings under the old law and they are given receipts on account for the respective amounts paid. The total assessed on these companies under the new law was \$2,353,914.06, a difference of about \$900,000. This hangs on the pending litigation.

The largest amount paid to-day was by the Michigan Central, its check for taxes on the main and leased lines was \$554,436.79.

On An Extensive Scale.

The St. Helens Development Co., of St. Helens, Roscommon county, has closed three deals with Chicago parties for grazing lands in north-eastern Roscommon. The largest is for 6,400 acres, and the others for slightly smaller tracts. All three will be developed into stock farms. The company is operating in Crawford and Roscommon counties, and the development of the grazing land, which has lain idle since the pine was removed, is proceeding rapidly. In Alcona, the recently organized stock farm has a crew of seventy-five carpenters working on sheep sheds, that are 38x150 feet, and other buildings, and the first shipment of three double deck car loads of lambs and ewes was made last week. The sheep were purchased in Concord, and more sheep, also cattle, will be shipped as soon as buildings are completed. It is said that the river bottoms in all northern counties is as good as any in the country for stock raising, and the local people who have invested say the country has a great future as a cattle raising district.

At the annual meeting in January Temple Emery was elected president in direct opposition to his expressed wish, and J. G. Dimmick, secretary, under the same conditions. As the result of this action, the board were called upon to fill the vacancies, also that of treasurer, W. B. Kelly tendering his resignation. The following executive officers were elected:

Secretary—Henry L. Drake.
Treasurer—George W. Mount.

It was voted to hold the next annual fair on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, October 6th, 7th and 8th. This is two weeks later than for the past two or three years.

The sum of \$500 was appropriated for the races and will be divided as follows:

Free-for-all Running Race..... 75
Farmers' Race..... 25

The brutes serve as meat for human consumption, and their magnificent coats are converted into rugs and garments. 40,000 to 50,000 dogs are slaughtered every year.

On the Detroit and Mackinac railway yesterday one of the new locomotives started out of the west side yards for the north with a train composed of 67 cars, fully half of them loaded, many of them with coal. The usual freight trains on this road is composed of 45 cars. The new engines, it is said, are capable of handling seventy cars.—*Bay City Tribune.*

Dr. Charles B. Fanceede, professor of surgery in the medical department of the University of Michigan, has recently performed with apparently perfect result, a simple operation for the cure of trifacial neuralgia. The operation consists in the injection of osmic acid into the affected nerve after its exposure by a trivial incision. This method has been introduced but a short time, and this was its first trial at the University hospital.

The 11,000 sheep, mainly ewes, that were fed on beet pulp and alfalfa, at Greeley and Windsor, Col., factories have been marketed at top prices. A thorough test was made of the value of beet pulp as food with excellent results. The 11,000 head netted a profit to their feeders of 70 cents each. Agricultural Superintendent Timothy reports that application has already been made to him for next year's pulp to feed 50,000 sheep at the factory yards.

Cleveland, Columbus, Toledo and Cincinnati parties have purchased 400 acres of land on the Lake Huron shore beginning at a point half a mile north of Point Lookout and extending north around a little sheltered bay. It is said that cottages will be erected this summer and that the persons who bought purchased for themselves only it being the intention to restrict the resort to some extent. The location is said to be ideal for those seeking rest in solitude and purely natural surroundings.

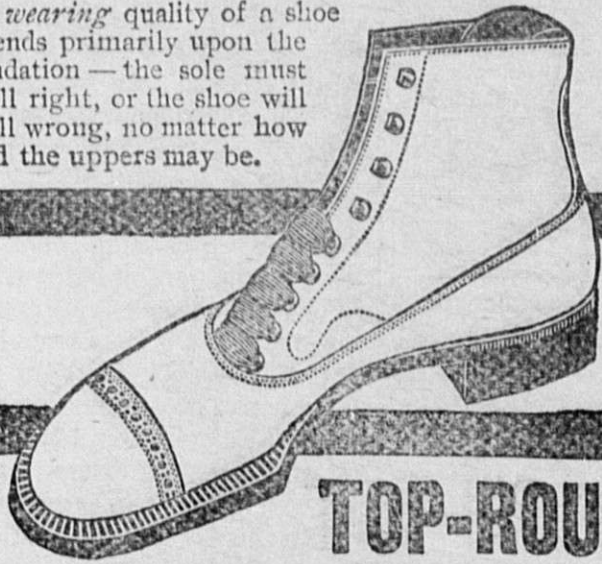

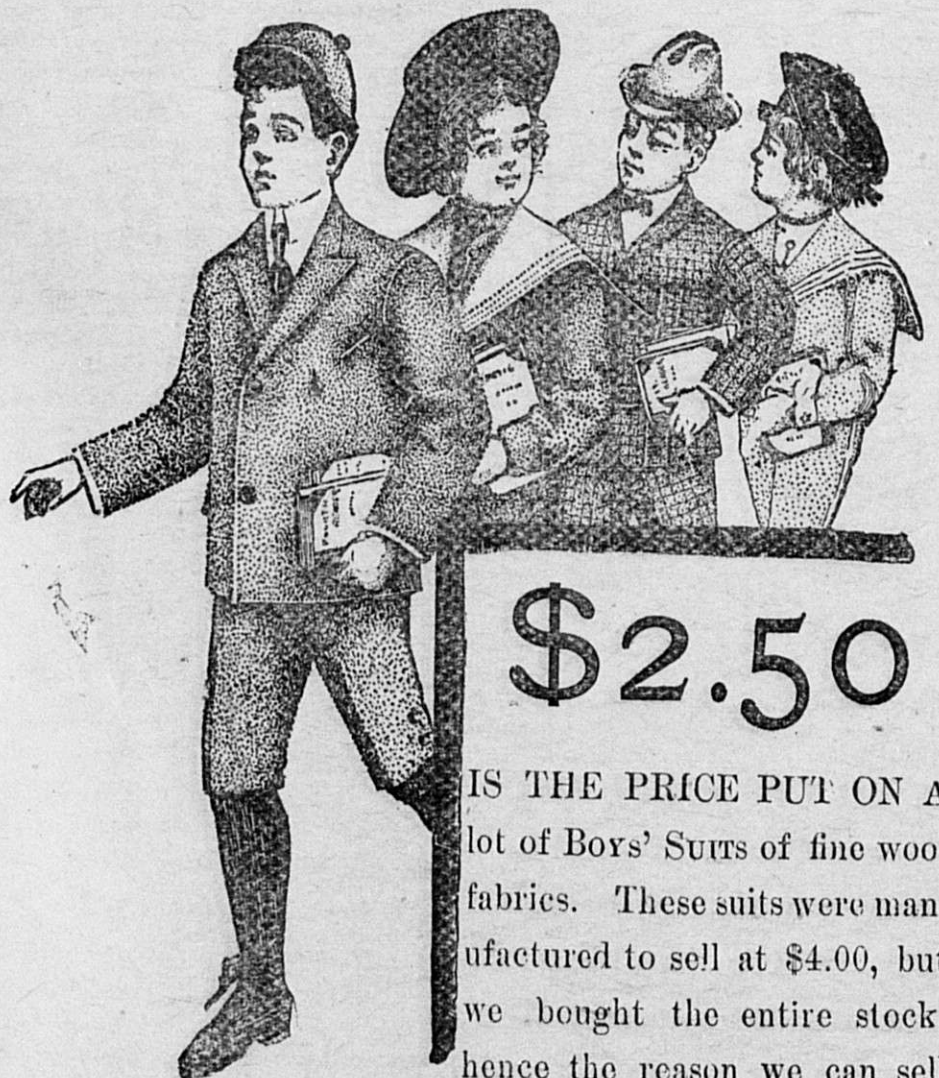

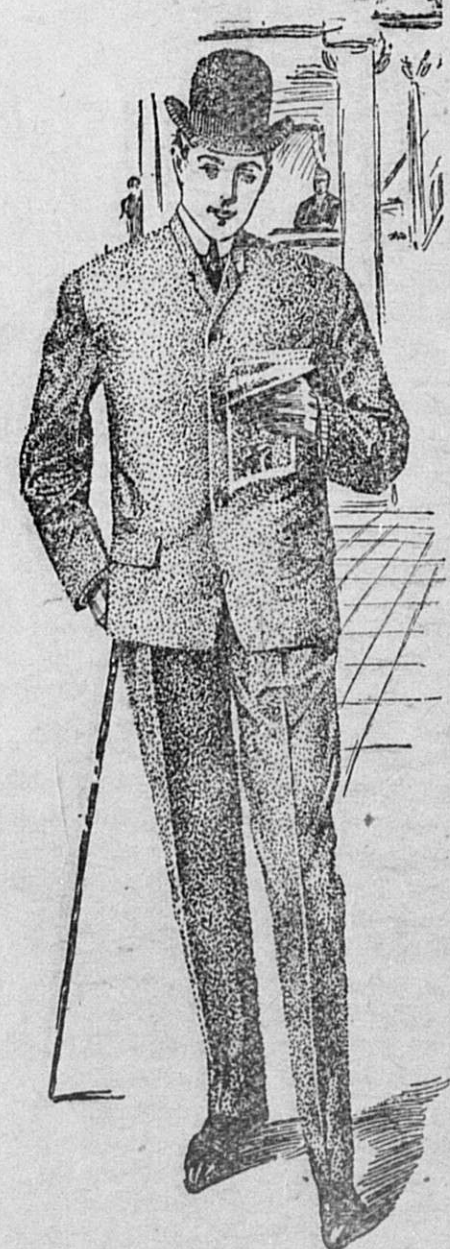
