The National Socialist party closed week's convention at Chicago last Saturday. The convention was the largest and most successful ever held by that party, and indicates rapid growth throughout the country. Eugene V. Debs, of Indiana, was nominated for the presidency, and Daniel Hanford, NewYork, for vice-president.

It is now proposed to authorize postmasters and deputies to open letters on which no postage stamps have been placed, to learn the name of the writer and avoid sending it to the dead letter office. If all who write would have their name and address printed on the envelope they use, as the postoffice department requests, no such trouble would arise.

The forestry department of the University of Michigan has received a gift of about ninety species, including over five hundred specimens of forest trees, in value about \$200, from Robert Douglas' Sons', forest tree nurserymen, of Waukegan, Ill. The material vas selected at the invitation of the donors, by Professor Roth and Mr. Davis of the forestry department, and will at once be set out on the Saginaw Forest Farm.
