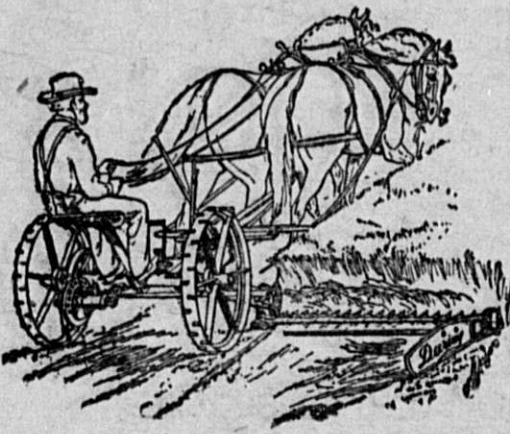

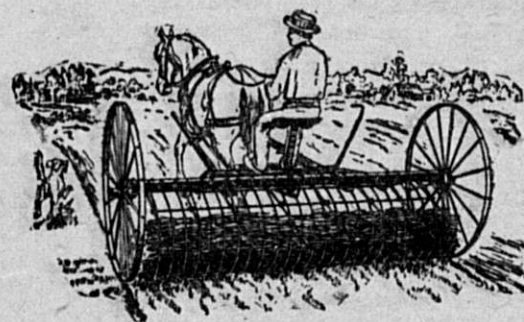

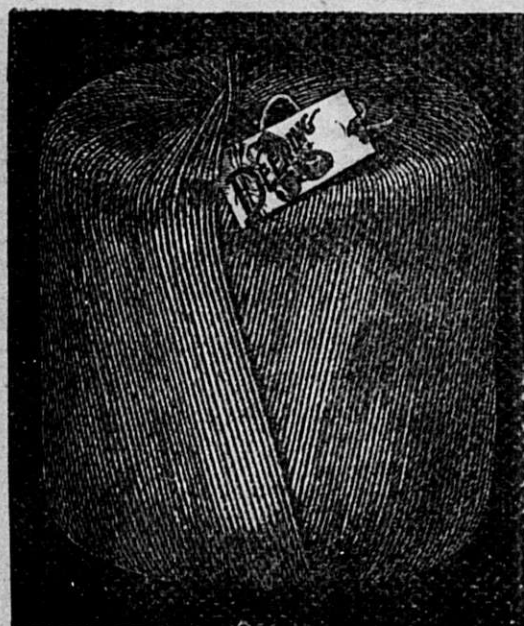

An Apalling List.

It is in order for Michigan towns to take time and the Fourth of July by the forelock and forstall a repetition of the horrors of last year resulting from the use of toy pistols, dynamite bombs and cannon firecrackers, the Grand Rapids Press thinks.

The records of the principal cities show that during the last ten years 1,100 persons were killed, 5,800 injured and a property loss of \$6,000,000 sustained in Fourth of July celebrations.

Most of these victims were boys slain to make an American holiday. The American Medical Journal says 4,449 deaths and injuries were caused last Fourth of July. There were 406 deaths from lockjaw caused by toy pistols; ten persons made blind; seventy-five lost one eye; fifty-four lost hands, arms and legs; 174 lost fingers, and 3,670 received other injuries—a costly sacrifice to so-called patriotism.

Sound Logic From Mr. Folk.

Rarely indeed is there to be found as much sound logic in so limited a space as Joseph W. Folk, democratic candidate for governor in Missouri, succeeded in crowding into his speech in the convention hall at Kansas City a few days ago. "Party committees should be the servants of the people of the party, not their masters," declared Mr. Folk in the course of his remarks. "No officeholder ought to be allowed on the state committee. To permit this inevitably leads to the building up of a machine to use the party for personal ends."

Here is wisdom served in tabloids. Mr. Folk knows because he has fought the machine and his utterances are based on actual knowledge of conditions as they exist. Nor is it necessary to go abroad for us to have the lesson brought home. The voters of Detroit and Michigan have had abundant proof of the correctness of this assertion in state affairs, and so long as they permit such conditions to exist they will get just what they deserve in the form of government. As a general proposition, applicable to any state or community, regardless of geographical location, irrespective of party, Mr. Folk's diagnosis comes as near being absolutely correct as anything that has been uttered in a long time.—Detroit Free Press.

Dissipations Among Boys.

At the recent meeting of superintendents of schools at Lansing, Prof. Parmelee, of Charlotte, who has become a prominent figure in this state through his investigations into the "dissipations of pupils," gave an address on that subject. In that address he asserted that dancing, card and other social parties held on other than Friday or Saturday evenings, are detrimental to pupils doing good work. Many of the so-called places of recreation are the starting place of dissipation, where the dreaded cigarette habit is acquired. Statistics compiled by him show that 25.2 per cent of the high school boys of the state smoke, mostly cigarettes, and that 14.4 per cent of the grammar school boys are slaves to the habit. It is cigarette smoking which causes a large per cent of the boys to drop out of school before graduating.

Prof. Parmelee says that the U. of M. fraternities, in their eagerness to get new members, solicit among high school students. He asserts that by correspondence with the several deans he has learned that all of the "conditioned" students are those who are foremost in such outside enterprises, which detract from their best efforts in school work.

Mr. Parmelee advocates strict laws relative to the sale of tobacco to minors. He thinks if a fine was imposed on every boy under age caught with tobacco on his person, it would stop the cigarette habit.

There is no subject of such grave importance to the nation as the proper training of our boys and girls. All dissipations or indulgences which dwarf the intellect, break up school attendance, cultivate bad associations encourage idleness, are a serious menace to the suture of the Republic. Parents and teachers should work hand in hand in the battle for an educated, strong and virtuous citizen ship.

Watch the Fires.

Harry H. Ryerse, of Allenville, state fire warden, was in the city last week, and met the supervisors from the different townships, giving them instructions as to the new law relative to starting forest fires. Below we give the principle part of this law, which should be read by all:

Section 9. Any person who willfully, negligently or carelessly sets on fire, or causes to be set on fire, any woods, grass lands or other combustible material, whether or not on his own lands, by means whereof the property of another is injured or endangered, or any person who willfully, negligently or carelessly suffers any fire set by himself to damage the property of another, is guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be punished by a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars or by imprisonment in the county jail not exceeding three months. Any person who maliciously sets on fire, or causes to be set on fire, any woods, grass lands or other combustible material, whereby the property of another is destroyed or life is endangered, shall be punished by a fine of not over five hundred dollars or be imprisoned in the state prison for a term of not over ten years, or both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 10. Any person who shall kindle a fire on or dangerously near to forest or grass lands, and leave it unquenched, or shall be a party thereto, and every person who shall use other than incombustible wads for firearms, or who shall carry a naked torch, firebrand, or other exposed light in or dangerously near to forest land, causing risk of accidental fire, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars or imprisonment in the county jail not exceeding three months.

Section 12. Every person who shall willfully deface, destroy, or remove any warning placard posted under the requirements of this act shall be liable to a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars for each offense, or imprisonment in the county jail not exceeding three months.

Great Camp Review.

The great camp review of Macca-bees convenes at Battle Creek, June 8. The members of the great executive committee will meet there Saturday, June 4, and will be in continuous session until the Great Camp convenes. Monday, June 6, the committee will hold final hearings on contested claims to make report to the Great Camp. Tuesday, June 7, will be jubilee day, when a big parade will be held in the morning with various exercises during the afternoon. The Great camp will meet Wednesday, June 8, and will probably remain in session through Friday. There are many amendments to the laws to be acted upon, and the matter of most importance to Port Huron to come up is the permanent location of the headquarters of the order.

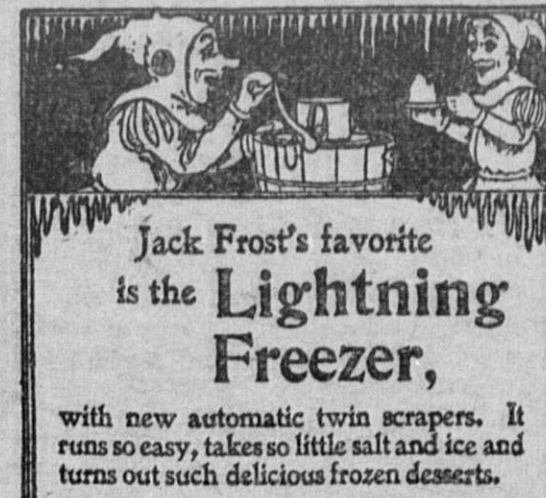

Ideal Entertainers June 4.

 Russell Hibbard, of Twining, was arrested last Saturday, charged with assault on a 7-year-old girl of that village.
 Baptist Burton, one of the best known business men of Bay City, dropped dead on the street last Sunday, of heart disease.

Mrs. Cox and daughter, Miss Nellie, of Bay City, spent last Sunday at the home of her mother, Mrs. Robinson, of this city.
 The republican representative convention for the Iosco district, has been called to meet at Standish, next Tuesday, May 31.
 The democratic state convention meets at Detroit next Wednesday, to elect delegates to the national convention at St. Louis.
 After four days session and 58 ballots without a choice for the nominee for governor, the Illinois republican state convention adjourned last Friday to May 31.
 The date of the encampment of the Michigan National Guard, has been changed from August 22 to August 4. The encampment will be held at Ludington.
 The city of Alpena has set aside \$12,000 for the purpose of building a city hall. The old Churchill hotel site has been purchased for it and the grounds will be called "Churchill Park."
 From all parts of the country comes the report of much damage to fruit trees by the severe winter. The plum trees are practically all killed, while other fruit trees and many shade trees have also suffered.

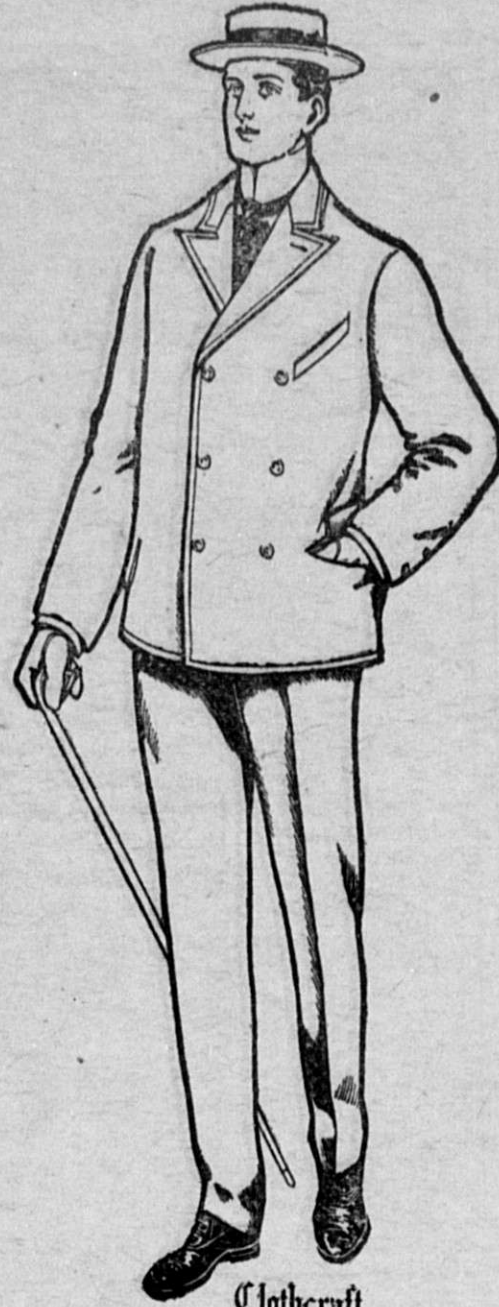
Preparations for the great "under the oaks" gathering at Jackson on July 6 are being actively pushed. It is estimated that no less than 25,000 people will visit the historic spot. Secretary of State John Hay will deliver the principal address.

 The U. of M. track and field men met the Chicago University team at Chicago, last Saturday, in their annual meet, and won by 70 points to 59 for their opponents. Ralph Rose, the shot putter of the Michigan team, established a new world's record by putting the shot 43.6 feet.
 In the Bay county circuit court last Saturday, Samuel and Henry Helter, composing the firm of Helter Bros., second-hand dealers, convicted of receiving stolen brass nautical instruments and other things from boys, were fined \$200 apiece and costs were added, making an aggregation of \$450.
 By an explosion in the drying room of the Lake Shore Novelty Co.'s plant at Findlay, Ohio, last Saturday, seven people were killed outright, and five more believed to have been fatally injured, and about twenty slightly injured. The company is one of the largest manufacturers of railroad torpedoes and 4th of July explosives in the country.
 "A Bird's-eye View of the Panama Canal," which appears in the June Woman's Home Companion, is one of the most interesting features to be found in the magazines of the month. It is a picture of the canal from ocean to ocean, and gives an idea of its position and construction such as can be had in no other way.
 The Otsego County Herald reached us last week as a three column folio, as a result of the fire which destroyed its office the week before. Bro. McKinley announces, that notwithstanding his loss is \$2000 greater than his insurance, he will at once install another up-to-date plant. The Herald is one of the very best of our exchanges, and we hope to see it again prospering.
 Cotton and its products will bring more than 400 million dollars into the United States from other parts of the world in the fiscal year which ends with next month. Last year the total exports of cotton and its products amounted to 376 million dollars and a statement just issued by the department of commerce and labor shows that in raw cotton alone the total for the present year exceeds the figures of last year by nearly fifty million dollars, thus indicating that the grand total of cotton and its products exported will exceed 400 million dollars in value.

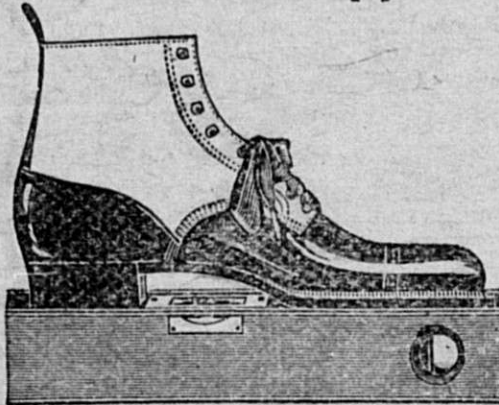
