Senator Fairbanks, of Indiana, has announced his willingness to accept the republican nomination for vice-president. It is claimed his wife brought the necessary influence to bear.

The Illinois republicans nominated Charles S. Deneen for governor last Friday, on the 79th ballot, thus ending one of the most remarkable "deadlocks," ever held in a state convention.

The name of W. R. Burt, of Saginaw, is being brought forward as the democratic candidate for governor. He would prove a strong nominee, and would make an excellent executive.

There is anxiety in some quarters lest the democratic convention at St. Louis may be stampered by a mere incidental mention of the name of Folk. The way he has knocked over the boodle-snatchers without regard to party is certainly calculated to attract attention and even admiration.

H. S. Karcher, of Rose City, is making a strong fight for the republican nomination for state senator from this district, against A. J. Doherty, who is after the third nomination. The only recommend Doherty has for another term is that he was the "machine" leader in the last senate, and an ardent anti-primary reform man.

Hon. J. S. Stearns, who wants the republican nomination for governor, came out this week with a hot attack on the republican "machine" which is backing Fred Warner. He charges that the republican party of the state represents the Michigan Central railroad, and that it now controls the governor and both houses of the legislature, and is now making an effort to secure control of the supreme court.
