Abner McKinley, brother of the late President McKinley, was found dead, in his home at Somerset, Pa., last Saturday. His death resulted from Bright's disease.

The democratic state nominating convention will be held at Grand Rapids August 3. In addition to placing a complete state ticket in the field the convention will be called upon to elect a new state central committee.

The picturesque Senator Carmack has been endorsed for vice-president by the democrats down in Tennessee. He accepts it as a good natured compliment, but says that the beginning of it is a good place for it to stop.

Judge Nelson Sharpe, of West Branch, is making an active canvass for one of the republican nominations for the supreme court. Judge Sharpe is an able jurist and his nomination would prove a popular one throughout this section of the state.

The attendance at the St. Louis exposition during May was \$63,000, while during the first week in June over 300,000 passed through the gates into the big show. While heavy travel is expected St. Louisward during latter June and July by Michigan rail and boat lines, yet all transportation authorities agree that during September and October travel to the world's fair city will be congested.

It has long been charged that attorney-general Knox was the tool of the trusts and combines, and his appointment to the U. S. senate as the successor of Senator Quay, should convince the most skeptical of the truth of the charge. Henry C. Flick was the man who brought about his appointment, after he had been declared out of the race.


County politics are beginning to become active. The prospects are that the republican county convention will be held next month. The indications are that the present incumbents will all be re-nominated except Sheriff Johnson, who is serving his second term. Charles Curry seems to be the leading candidate for this nomination, although several other names have been mentioned.

At last we have it, the seedless apple, the greatest wonder of the orchard world. John F. Spencer, of Deerfield did it, but he won't tell how. He is an old Colorado fruit farmer, now living in Michigan, and it took many years to coax the coreless pome. Now he is grafting seedless cuttings on all his apple trees. There are many peculiar things about the variety. The fruit is solid with a navel away from the stem end. And, says Mr. Spencer the apples come without preliminary blossoms.—Ex.

At the republican primaries held Monday in Alpena a solid delegation of thirty-six was elected to the county convention who will vote to nominate county officers this fall by direct vote. Four of the townships have elected eighteen, making fifty-four out of a possible seventy-two delegates. The following question was submitted: "Shall we nominate candidates for state officers and all other public offices by direct vote?" There were only five votes against it in the city and not any in the country.

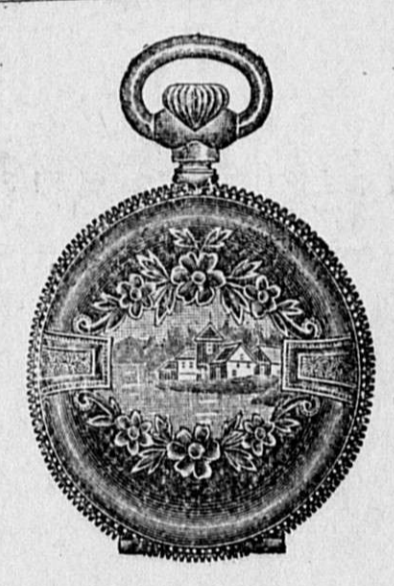

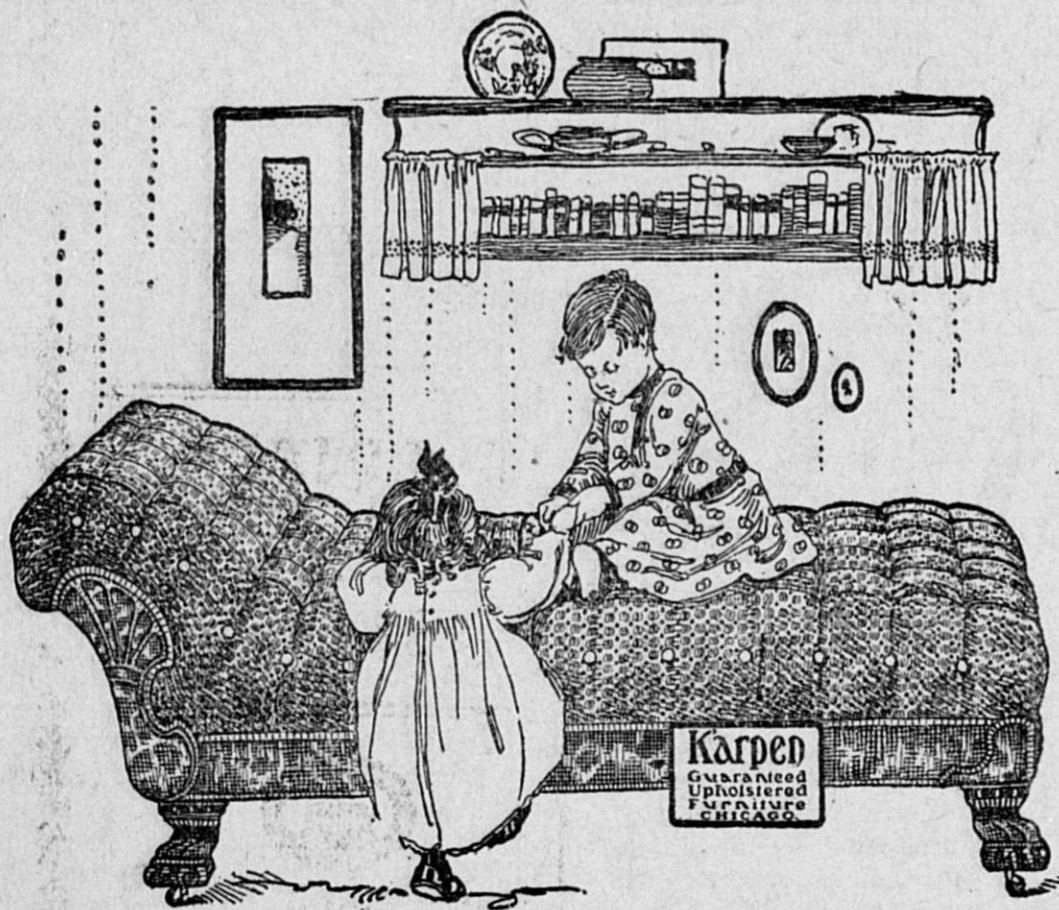

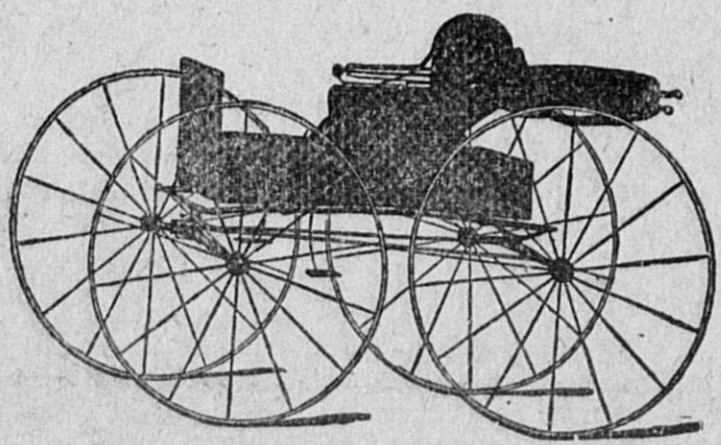

Six Hundred Dead.

New York, June 15.—The three-decked excursion steamer General Slocum of the Knickerbocker Steamboat Co., burned to the water's edge off North Brother island, East river, at the entrance of Long Island sound today, resulting in the death through burning or drowning of at least 600 persons, mostly women and children. Four hundred and forty-seven bodies have been recovered tonight and divers were at work taking bodies from the hold of the steamer.
