I haven't any patience with those people who begin to talk to me about this nationality and about that nationality. We are Americans, whether we have our ancestry in Germany, in England, in Italy, or in the Sandwich Islands. It is all the same.

The men of my age here tonight know very well that the same warfare was brought against the Australian ballot that is now brought against nominations by direct ballot.

We have had the machine with us all the time. The only point that now excites our attention particularly is that the machine practically owns us and rules us.

Primary election, the nominating by direct ballot, will destroy the machine. Now the question is, do you

want to destroy it? That is the primary question before the voters of Michigan today. Do you want to continue the machine? The primary election law will destroy the machine. —*Detroit Evening News.*

Weekly Crop Report.

The following weekly crop and weather report was issued by the Michigan section of U. S. department of agricultural last Monday.

The mean daily temperature for the week ended August 29 was 64.1 degrees, or 0.5 of a degree below normal; the average precipitation was 0.85 of an inch or 0.35 of an inch above the normal; the sunshine averaged 73 per cent of the possible amount.

The weather conditions of the past week have been quite favorable to most outstanding crops and the progress of field work, but the continued deficiency of temperature, especially the cool nights, have retarded the growth of corn.

The precipitation has greatly improved the condition of the soil for plowing and materially advanced pastures. Late potatoes, buckwheat, sugar beets and beans are generally in good condition and fairly promising.

Early beans are maturing and their harvest has begun, the yields have been shortened by droughty conditions which prevailed during the latter part of July and the early part of August; late beans are more promising.

Corn continues to grow slowly, but is generally in a healthy condition and is fairly well cared; on account of poor seed and considerable replanting corn is uneven; its present condition indicates that it will be safe from frost in most counties of the Lower Peninsula about Sept. 20 and in the Upper Peninsula about Sept. 25.

Plowing for winter wheat and rye has made good progress, but seeding has not yet generally begun. The high winds of the past week blew down considerable fruit, especially apples, but the general prospect for apples and plums continues quite promising.

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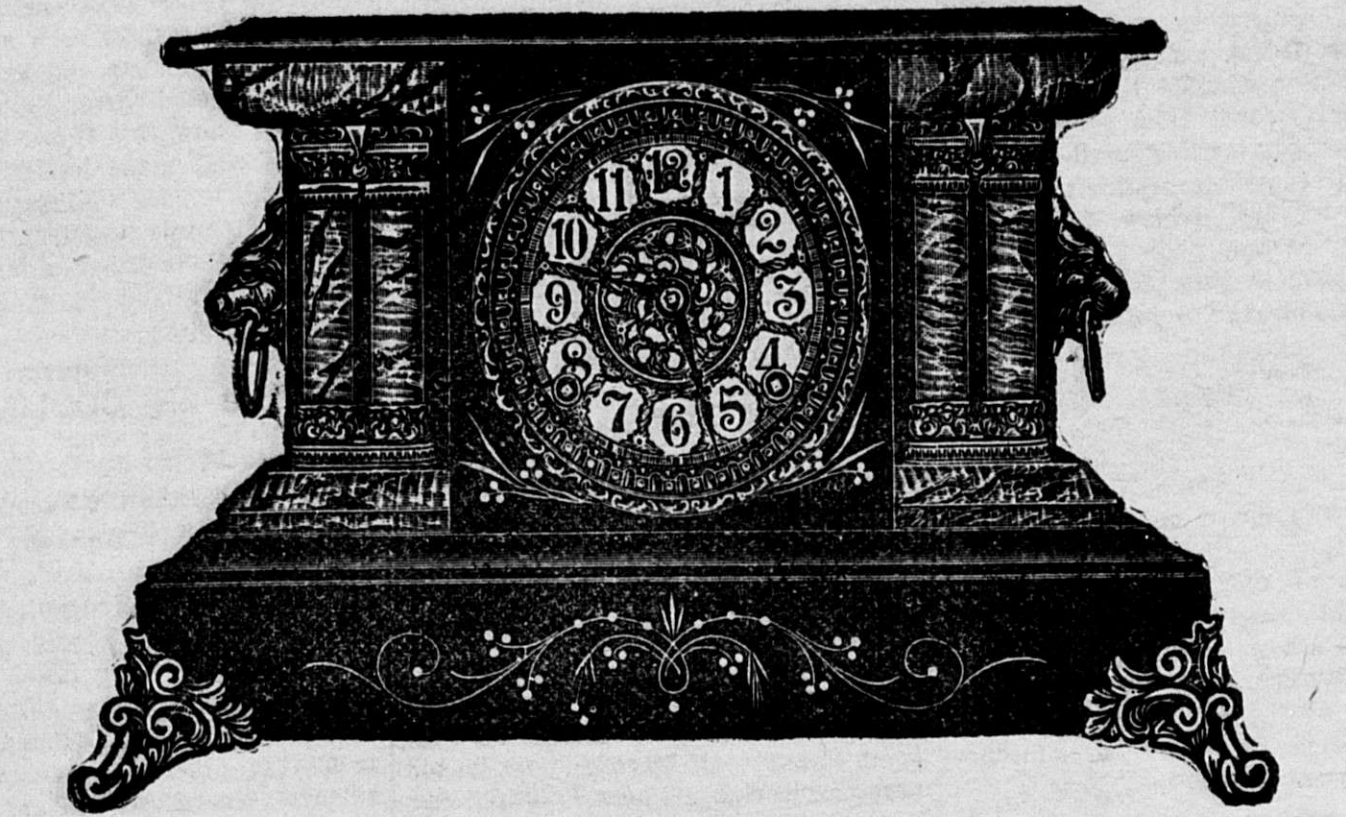
