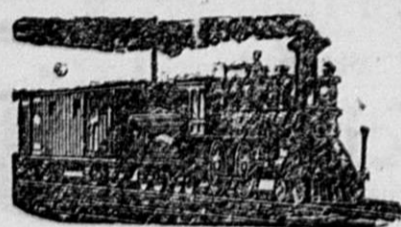

### What Ferris Can Do.

If Ferris were governor he could not enact the smallest fragment of a primary election law. All either Warner or Ferris as governor could do would be to favor or veto such laws when passed by the legislature.—Grand Rapids Herald.

If Ferris were governor he could not pass a primary election law but his election would be equivalent to a notification to the house and senate that they must pass a direct nomination law or take the consequences at the next election.

If Ferris were elected governor he could not pass a primary election law but he could stand as a guard over any iniquitous combine in the senate such as existed in the last legislature and block any of its nefarious games by the power of veto.

If Ferris were elected governor he could not pass a primary election law, but he could say to the legislature that it pass the kind of a law demanded by the people or no law at all.

If Ferris were governor he could not pass a primary law but he would be in a position to head off all kinds of legislation inimical to the interests of the people.

If Ferris were governor he could not pass a primary law, but he could represent the people of Michigan, standing as a watch dog over their interests and hold in check such jobbery as an immortal nineteen might put up.

That's the kind of a man that ought to fill the governor's chair. The governor and the legislature should work for the welfare of the state; and not legislate for corporations and individuals as against the interests of the commonwealth.

The machine is making its fight against Ferris because it does not wish to lose control of the house and senate. The machine aims to get a majority in each body that will do its bidding—a majority that can be handled, and they do not want a man like Ferris to stand on guard where he can interfere with their plans.

But the people do and that is why the independent republicans of the state are going to vote for Mr. Ferris.—Bay City Times.

### The Republican Party was not Founded on Plunder.

Eight hundred office-holders will make speeches in Michigan during the three weeks intervening between now and the day when the independent republicans must decide by their ballots whether we are to have two more years of Atwood-Navinism or whether the party is to be purged of this element. This understood to be the program. Well, these speakers will address themselves to you, independent republicans, you Fremont voters, you members of the granges and of the farmers' clubs, you whose devotion to principle has made and unmade majorities, you who have made the republican party possible and who can on Nov. 8 make Atwood-Navinism impossible.

They are not going to tell you that the appointment of "Tip" Atwood as the state commissioner of railroads was a good thing. They will not commend the release of Frank C. Andrews, nor the subsequent ticket-of-leave and leave-without ticket management of the state prison. They will not commend the signing of railroad affidavits by the state tax commission. They will not refer to the repudiation of the primary reform platform by the last two legislatures and by the last two state conventions. Not a word will they have to say about their "See" Doherty, nor their pro-corporation Maitlands; not a word about the census ripper bill governor factory. They will not tell you that your taxes have been increased from \$3,000,000 to \$8,000,000, nor that the state tax commission worked illegally

to favor the railroads. This is what they will tell you:

"Don't go back on the grand old party of Lincoln. You do not want primary reform, anyway. A machine is necessary."

In effect, they ask you to become a turn-out. Machine principles are not republican principles. The republican party was not founded on plunder. These 800 orators will tell you that by clinging to your principles of honest popular government and rebuking those who masquerade under the cloak of republicanism, you are disloyal. Remember, they have their jobs at stake and do not argue from disinterested motives. It will be a pretty spectacle for an enlightened community, these office-holders arguing against your manhood trying to persuade you to abandon principle and to stand by your machine. What will two years more of Atwood-Navinism profit you?—Detroit Tribune.

To the Electors of the City of Tawas City: Notice is hereby given that a General Election will be held in the City of Tawas City, Isosco County, Michigan, on Tuesday, the 8th day of November, A. D. 1904, at which election the following officers will be elected, viz: Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, State Treasurer, Auditor General, Commissioner of Land Office, Attorney General, Superintendent of Public Instruction, Member of the State Board of Education, Justice of the Supreme Court for the term ending December 31, 1907; Justice of the Supreme Court for the term ending December 31, 1909; and Justice of the Supreme Court for the term ending December 31, 1911.

Representative in Congress for the tenth Congressional District of which this county is a part: fourteen electors of president and vice president of the United States; senator for the twenty-eighth senatorial district of this state, comprising the counties of Arenac, Alcona, Isosco, Cassida, Ogemaw, Gladwin, Chittaweb, Roscommon and Missaukee; and a representative in the state legislature for the Isosco representative district, comprising the counties of Alcona, Isosco, Arenac and Ogemaw. Also the following county officers: Judge of probate, sheriff, county clerk, treasurer, prosecuting attorney, register of deeds, circuit court commissioner, surveyor, and two coroners.

You will also vote on the two following questions:  
1. The question of calling a convention for the purpose of making a general revision of the constitution.  
2. The question of a proposed amendment to article four of the constitution of this state by repealing section twenty-eight of said article which section limits the time for the introduction of bills in each house of the legislature. And that in accordance with a special act of the legislature of 1899 said election will be held at the City Hall in the third ward, and that the polls of said election will be open at 7 o'clock in the forenoon, or as soon thereafter as may be, and shall continue open until 5 o'clock in the afternoon of said 8th day of November A. D. 1904, and no longer.
