Consult the Dictionary.

The following from Moderator Topics is from the pen of Hon. H. R. Pattengill, one of the best authorities on this point, in the state. Educators and public speakers would do well to read it and impress it upon the minds of the school children.

Recently a somewhat noted platform speaker mispronounced "program" by calling it "progum" three times in one sentence. A little later in his evening's work he made great sport of someone who called "syntax" "swinetax." "Oh wad some power the giftie gie us, to see oursel's as ithers see us." The "swinetax" error may indicate a degree or two more of ignorance or carelessness, but it has the redeeming feature of being funny. The writer after the entertainment closed chanced to fall in with the star of the evening, and in a pleasant conversation ventured to ask him where he got any authority for the pronunciation, "progum". He replied: I don't know unless it is from Worcester. "No, Worcester does not recognize it, nor does any American or English lexicographer." "Well," said the star, "it is easy to say it." "But do you think it right for public speakers to take liberties like that with our language?" He answered frankly "No."

The injunction left with him was, "Go and sin no more." But "grum" is no easier than "gram." There is no call for the change. It comes through ignorance, carelessness, affectation or the aping habit. Some uncultured speaker first used it, perhaps a preacher heard it, and thought it a fine new style, and cheap withal, he adopted it. The Woman's Club heard it and thought it cute. The schoolmaster not to be outdone in the race, added his influence, and the error grew. It does not necessarily follow that because a public speaker pronounces a word in a certain way that such way is correct. A most excellent rule is not to change your pronunciation of a word until good authorities have been carefully consulted. We heard Senator Foraker pronounce the president's name as if the first two syllables rhymed with "boozzy." Within ten minutes we heard a small boy who was selling badges at the great meeting, pronounce the name correctly, giving the first two syllables to rhyme with "posy". Consult the dictionary. Seek to know the truth. Help to spread it.

Michigan Christian Endeavor Day.

Among the plans discussed at the meeting of the officers of the Michigan Christian Endeavor Union, held at Saginaw recently, was the celebration of Michigan Christian Endeavor day.

An appeal is to be made to each society in the state to fittingly celebrate this day on Sunday, Dec. 11. The state executive committee have prepared excellent programs for this anniversary, and will furnish copies free to each society in the state. As many copies as desired may be secured by addressing our state secretary, Edward T. Lindsay, of Saginaw. Michigan Endeavorers have certainly great cause of thankfulness in the rapid growth of this movement in the state. It has grown from the one society organized at Murr, in 1884, to over 1,300 societies, with a membership reaching nearly 40,000.

These programs briefly outline the various lines of work planned by the state executive committee, and bring to Michigan Endeavorers much needed information regarding the state work. Their use by each society will aid in preparing the way for the new field secretary, who, it is hoped, will enter upon his duties about Jan. 1. Any contributions towards the field work will be gladly received and should be sent to the state treasurer, W. L. Hammond, of Ludington.

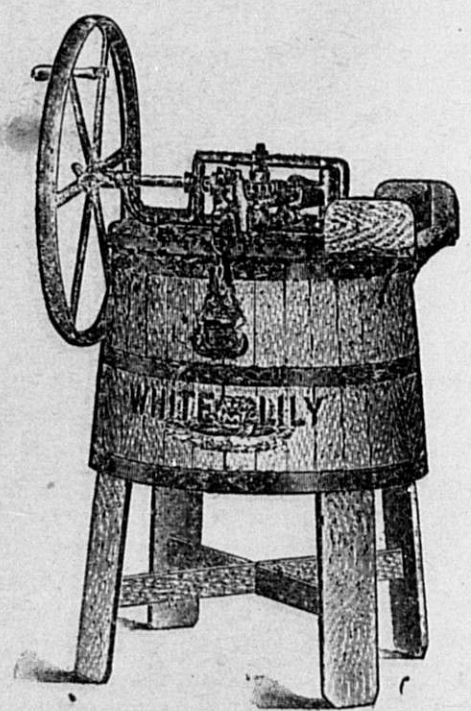
