### UP IN SMOKE.

### The Plant of the Tawas Manufacturing Co. Destroyed

last Sunday Afternoon

The clang of the fire bell brought our citizens to the streets last Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock, and it was soon learned that the plant of the Tawas Manufacturing Co. was on fire The fire had gained such headway that it was impossible to save the mill, and the fire department, which was promptly on hand, bent all their efforts to saving the adjoining property, and by the very hardest kind of work kept the flames from spreading.

Just how the fire originated is a mystery. The factory was shut down at 12 o'clock Saturday night, and the watchman left at 7 o'clock Sunday morning, when everything was apparently all right. At about 2 o'clock in the afternoon the fire was discovered and had gained such headway that it was impossible to save anything from the mill except a few boxes of skewers which were packed ready for shipment.

The loss on building, which was owned by T. J. Armstrong, will reach about \$1200, while Messers Tyler & Pease, proprietors of the Manufacturing Co., estimate their loss on machinery and stock at between \$4,000 and \$5,000, all of which is an entire loss as there was no insurance.

The loss is a severe one on the Manufacturing Co., who commenced about six months ago, and were crowded with orders far in excess of their capacity. They had just completed wiring their factory preparatory to installing electric lights and were going to run night and day.
