

CHAPTER X.

Until it is warm enough in the spring seed will not germinate although plants that have lived through the winter may continue to grow. The lowest temperatures at which seeds will germinate varies with the kind of seeds. Sach, has studied this question carefully and says that Indian corn will not germinate below 48 degress Fahrenheit nor will barley and wheat germinate below 41 degrees. At these lew temperatures the sprouting is not at all satisfactory. It was found, in other experiments, that these facts. the best germinating temperatures were between 84° for wheat and barley and 93° for corn.

This would seem to indicate that these grains ought not to be sown very early in the spring for the ground must warm up very slowly in the spring after the frost goes out. Average temperatures of the soil would be deceiving on this point as the soi warms up, in the surface three inches and coors down during the night Observations as early as in April in such years as 1878, when the season was unusually early, showed soil temperatures at two o'clock, in the after noon, as high as 84°, the temperature falling at night to 65 ° or below. In other seasons the ground did not warm up to 65° as the highest daily temperature until in late May. The rule ought to be, not to sow grains in the spring until the ground is warm enough to assure rapid germination.

Naturally wet soils warm up more slowly than dry ones because of the greater amount of heat required to raise a given weight of water one degree than is required by any of the other constituents, of the soil. All of this vast tonnage has to be hauled over the public roads to the railroad station or the nearest market town. The average distance is not less, probably, than three miles and the cost of handling that tonnage over a bad road is not less than twenty-five to fifty cents a ton a mile, or an aggregate of \$9,000,000 a year and up. 




