Many young men miss their chance to rise in the world because they are not ready for the next step up when the opportunity comes. As long as we are satisfied with just enough knowledge or skill to perform the work in hand, we shall never rise any higher. Those who have fitted themselves for a sphere of larger usefulness by diligent study and careful preparation, usually get the opportunity sooner or later.

If the roofs leak in the farm buildings, shake some lime in a close box. When done, sieve it. To every six quarts of this lime add one gallon of water, and one quart of rock salt. Boil and skim clean. To every five gallons of this add slowly three quarters of a pound of potash and four quarts of fine sand. Apply with a paint or whitewash brush. This paint wash looks as good as oil paint and is as durable as slate, besides it is fire-proof, lasts long, costs a trifle.—E.c.

The man who is the possessor of a piece of land has the game in his own hands. There is no promoter or stock gambler who can jeopardize his investment. Where it is purchased with judgment land is always worth the money paid for it and it is bound to increase in value. It cannot be destroyed or carried away. It requires only industry to make it profitable and productive. It constitutes a source of independence in any condition of the money market and amid all the mutations of speculative enterprises.

Governor Folk has won a great victory over the gamblers in Missouri by the passage of a law making it a felony punishable severely to engage in "bookmaking" or "pool" selling in Missouri. Some years ago a bill was passed called a stock breeders' bill which legalized this form of gambling for the benefit chiefly of the gamblers in St. Louis who put their gambling under the guise of interest in good breeding. Now the veil has been torn asunder and gambling is made a felony even if it is done in the name of encouragement to live stock enterprises.

The outcome of the contest over the governorship in Colorado is pleasing from the fact that it is a compromise which will insure peace in the state; but it was hardly in accordance with American ideas of justice. One or the other, Adams or Peabody, was elected

governor. If Adams got the most votes then Peabody had no rights whatever, and vice versa. Yet the legislature ousted Adams and decided virtually that Peabody was not elected. It must be confessed, however, that the legislature was in a good deal of a predicament and to many the compromise agreed upon must have appeared to be the only safe and sensible thing.

The Western Normal school at Kalamazoo will offer an Extension course for experienced teachers who are unable to attend the institution during the regular school year. The Extension Course will be put in operation at the opening of the coming summer term, which begins on Monday June 26, and will be open to selected teachers who have taught successfully and who have previously graduated from an approved twelve grade school. For teachers planning to secure the Life Certificate residence will be required at the Normal during three summer terms. The course also includes work to be carried in absentia under direction of members of the Normal school faculty during a minimum period of two years. The Extension course is open to a limited number of selected persons and will, it is confidently believed, prove of great service in promoting the growth of the teachers for whom it is intended.

Objects to a Tax.

Wall street is up in arms against the proposed tri-state tax of two cents on every \$100 worth of stock sold. Such a tax on actual transfers might, the street admits, be easily borne, but to tax every so-called sale would cost \$3,500,000 a year and drive away "business." Tax the legitimate business of the street, but leave gambling alone. That is the plea. To amount to \$3,500,000 the tax must be levied on nominal sales of \$17,500,000,000—more sales in a single year in a single exchange of a single city than the entire railroad capitalization of the country. If a tax would check such preposterous stock gambling and stock washing, by all means let it be levied.—New York World.

Explosion of Boiler Causes Many Deaths. Brocktown, Mass., March 20.—A boiler in the shoe factory of R. B. Grover caused much damage by fire and the loss of several lives today. The entire factory was destroyed, a building 200 feet long and well filled with machinery. The floors immediately above the boiler, which was on the ground floor, collapsed following the explosion. Sixty persons were killed and many were injured. Those killed fell into into the flames and it was impossible to rescue the bodies.

City Council Proceedings. Regular meeting of the common council of the city of Tawas City, held in the council room Tuesday evening March 21st 1905. Called to order by Mayor Hartingh. Present Aldermen Garber, Hartingh, Stahmer, Brown, Schlichte and Clerk King. Quorum present. Minutes of meeting of March 7, 1905, read and approved.
