Iosco's State Fair Exhibit.

At their session last week the board of supervisors appropriated \$300 for the purpose of making county exhibit at the state fair again this year, and appointed supervisors J. A. Jackson, David Davison and Gust C. Karus as a committee to act with the executive officers of the Iosco County Agricultural Society in getting up the exhibit. They also appropriated \$50 to assist in getting up an educational exhibit from our county schools under the supervision of County Commissioner Campbell.

The committee met last Saturday and organized to begin work, and they wish to impress on the farmers the necessity of taking an active interest in this matter this year if they wish the county to retain the high standing which it has attained in these exhibits. Last year we secured two first prizes, and in order to do so again this year it will require the united efforts of all, as each of the counties which were in competition last year promised to be back this year and for no other purpose than to beat us. In addition Ogemaw and one or two other counties will make an exhibit this year. The competition this year will be very sharp, and the people of this county cannot afford to come out second best.

Our farmers know what is expected of them early enough this year to make special preparations, and we sincerely hope that no effort will be spared on their part. The expenditure of this money on the part of the supervisors has in the past proven a most paying advertising proposition for the county, and with the state fair at Detroit this year will give us much more advantage in this line. Every citizen do your duty.

A VISIT TO A NEAR BY KINGDOM.

Prof. C. D. SMITH, of the M. A. C.

CHAPTER XIII.

Turning next to the application of nitrogen to the soil you will remember at once that the two most common and the two most advisable forms of nitrogen to add to the soil are barnyard manure and green crops. The former, barnyard manure, contains other elements as well, but finds its chief valuable plant food in the nitrogen. Barnyard manure varies in its content of nitrogen according to the feeding of the animals producing it and according to its treatment. If the manure is left out of doors and is washed by repeated rains, its content of nitrogen must fall very low indeed. Roberts has shown that perhaps half of all the nitrogen which a given quantity of manure contains may be washed away and lost if it be left exposed to the washing of rains. Again if the manure is allowed to decay rapidly, the nitrogen will be lost, it may escape into the air as ammonia or even as free nitrogen. The best and safest way is to haul the manure to the fields as fast as possible, spread it out on the land as fast as hauled and plow under, not to deep of course, but get it into the soil and well mixed with it as soon as possible. There the decay of the manure will warm the soil and its organic compounds will slowly decay into the much needed humus. The bulk of the manure will be made in the winter and the effort should be to save it all by tight floors and plenty of absorbents and to get it at once to the fields where the losses by washing away are not great.

The farm supplies of nitrogen are supplemented from the markets in various ways. The best way naturally is by the purchase of feeding stuffs

rich in nitrogen, feeding them to stock and applying the resulting manure to the fields.

Nitrogen may be applied directly to the fields in the form of cottonseed meal which contains 7.00 per cent nitrogen or it may be bought in the form of dried blood, 13.5 per cent nitrogen. There are many other organic substances which will furnish nitrogen cheaply to the farmer. These organic substances should be bought for sandy soils and for crops requiring long time for growth, like fall wheat. For spring vegetables or for crops of short periods of growth where an immediate and forceful effect is desired, nitrate of soda is recommended. This salt contains 15 to 16 per cent of nitrogen.

The next essential element of soils that we shall consider is lime. We noted in the earlier observations made in this journey that the particles of clay were too fine to serve good purpose unless organized into kernels. They must be built up into orderly masses to allow the free movement of air and plant roots. In the soil as in the city, the great factor in holding the particles together or the bricks together into buildings, is lime. If a clay soil is plastic and will not build itself into the desired kernels, will not break down into fine friable soil when harrowed and cultivated, it needs lime. If dirt be mixed with water and allowed to settle the water will be "roily" or will have a multitude of the finest particles floating in it. Now if lime be added these fine particles will rush together into kernels of sufficient size to settle to the bottom within a few minutes. So when clay is sticky and refuses to break down into soil, the addition of lime will cause it to do

so. For this purpose as much as four or six tons of slaked lime per acre may be added to very sticky clay.

Many of both the upland and muck soils of Michigan are sour or acid, as it is also called. Plants will not grow well in sour soil. To tell whether soil is sour, buy at the druggists some litmus color, blue in color. Wet the soil and place the litmus paper against it. If the paper turns red, the soil is sour, if not it probably is not. If the land is acid, apply lime in large quantities. It does not follow because a soil is muck, composed largely of slowly decaying organic matter, it is necessarily or probably acid, still all muck soils should be tested for acidity at the outset of their examination. Test particularly the "cheesy" muck.

The loams on higher lands are some times acid and need the addition of lime to correct this sourness. Try therefore, all soils by the litmus paper before deciding what to apply in the way of fertilizers. Add lime whenever you find acidity.

Lime acts on humus to aid in its rapid destruction. Where therefore the soil is cold and inert and needs the hastening of decomposition, lime is just the thing to add. Where, on the other hand the supply of humus is not excessive and is in danger of too rapid exhaustion, lime should not be applied. When a heavy coat of manure is plowed under, or a heavy green manuring crop, apply lime to the surface after plowing, to aid in the decay of the excess of organic matter and to correct any acidity that may come from this decay.

Lime may be applied as air slacked lime, the poorest form, or it may be hauled to the field as stone lime and allowed to slake covered with earth in little piles in the field. Marl is a common form of lime carbonate in Michigan. Whether marl is useful or not depends on its physical condition, its location and ease of access and finally on its composition. It may contain but 5 per cent of lime or as high as forty per cent.

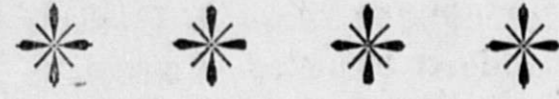

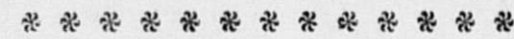

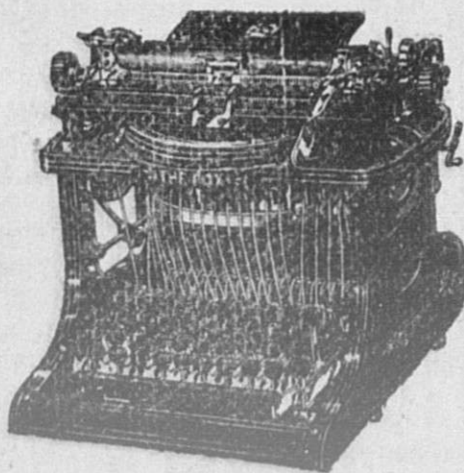
