Sad News From the Southland.
MR. EDITOR:—Permit me through your paper to reach more of our friends with the words which follow, than I can do by personal communications. On Monday evening, May 15, not far from 5.30 o'clock, my dear wife took her departure for the Heavenly country. The day previous she had attended public worship morning and evening, appearing to be in a little better health than for a few weeks, and in a very happy frame of mind. Having prepared some readings in the forenoon of Monday, at 3 p. m. she attended the Woman's Missionary meeting, at the distance of nearly half a mile. Having taken an interested part in these services, with others, she set out on her return soon after half past five o'clock. Walking between two of the sisters and still speaking of where mission work is most needed, when near half way home she paused a little and said, "What makes me feel so strangely?" and began to sink to the earth. The ladies beside her, took hold of her, called for help, and carried her into the house before which they were. A physician was summoned. Restoratives were used. But there was no rallying, not even breathing, only a few gasps. In five or six minutes all was over, without struggle or any appearance of suffering. In a manner so sudden and free from bodily distress was God pleased to take unto Himself one who had out of much weariness and pain, through many years, been looking toward the land that is fairer than day, and longing to see the King in His beauty.
The messages sent to me at Kansas City, failed to reach me, and it was only on my return to Pine Bluff on Wednesday afternoon, on leaving the train that I learned how God had exalted my companion and cast me under waves of sorrow. The interment took place on Thursday, at 9 a. m.

The 31st annual meeting of the Michigan Pioneer and Historical society will be held at Lansing June 7-8. A very fine program has been arranged and the meeting promises to be the best ever held by the society. The society is anxious to secure any and all records or relics pertaining to the early history of the state and persons have such are requested to forward them to the secretary at Lansing.

The competition for county exhibits at the State Fair this fall promises to be very keen. Of the group of counties with which Iosco comes into competition some seven or eight will be represented. This means that the people of Iosco county must not be negligent in preparing for our exhibit this fall if they wish Iosco to retain her place at the head of the list. There is thus no need for further discussion of the fact; what is needed is a practical remedy for the acknowledged evil. The usual or only remedy proposed, and which has been actually tried by some state legislatures is prohibition.—*Ec.*

"If Paul Jones was a pirate, as the British newspapers say, then Washington was a highwayman and Franklin was a lobster," declared Henry Waterson in closing his speech at the remarkable farewell banquet given to General Horace Porter of New York, who has just retired as American ambassador to France. "It was the hands of Paul Jones," said Mr. Waterson, "which first loosened the flag which we adore and which carried this flag defiant and triumphant into English waters, into the Irish sea and into the North sea; yea into St. George's channel, not merely bearding the lion in his den, but coming away with those same hands stuffed with indisputable trophies, with actual and visible fragments of his mane and tail. I do not wonder they call him a pirate."

Orange-and-Date Salad.

Peel the oranges, and trim off all the white skin. If the oranges contain no tough fibre they may be sliced lengthwise, otherwise cut out each section of pulp from the membrane inclosing it. For one pint of pulp mix one fourth of a teaspoonful of salt and three or four table-spoonful of oil, then gradually beat in one table-spoonful of lemon juice; pour this over the oranges. Have ready a pound of dates dressed with the same quantity of oil and acid. Mix the dressing thoroughly through the fruit, and dispose it on a bed of heart leaves of lettuce washed and dried thoroughly; surround the dates with the dressed oranges. Before dressing the dates prepare them after this fashion: After separating with a fork, pour boiling water over them, skim from the water and let dry in a hot oven. When cool cut each date in four pieces, removing the seed.

Let bread and butter sandwiches accompany this dish. Perhaps the most appropriate bread would be that made of entire-wheat flour and containing a goodly number of hazelnuts.—*Womens Home Companion* for June.

REVIEW QUESTIONS ON CHAPTERS VI TO XV.

Weekly Crop Report.

The following weather report for the week ending Monday, May 22: The mean daily temperature for the week ending May 22 was 53.9 degrees, or 0.7 of a degree below the normal; the average precipitation was 0.91 of an inch, or 0.08 of an inch above the normal; the sunshine averaged 48 per cent of the possible amount. Much of the week has been quite cool and very wet and a continuation of the general conditions which prevailed the preceding week. The continued heavy showers have thoroughly saturated the soil and flooded considerable low land and undrained fields, greatly retarding field work, especially corn planting. The cool, wet weather has been generally very beneficial to wheat, rye meadows and pastures, which on the whole are in splendid condition. Meadows, especially new ones, now point to good hay yields. Rye is heading in the southern and central counties. Early oats and barley are growing rather slowly, but continue generally healthy. Late oat germination is slow. The wet soil and fre-

quent showers have greatly retarded plowing for beans and late potatoes and decidedly checked corn planting, the commencement of which has been general as far north as the Straits of Mackinac. Corn germination in the southern counties is rather slow. Sugar beet seeding, while generally begun, is proceeding slowly; the early seeding in the southern counties has been considerably washed. Early potatoes are germinating well. It now appears that frost and wet weather have had a bad effect on early cherries and will somewhat shorten their yield. Late cherries are setting well. Other fruits continue in very promising condition.

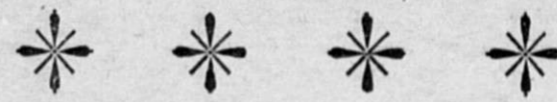

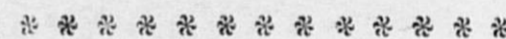

A CITY HALL TOO

FLINT LIKELY TO LAY CORNER STONE FOR ONE IN JUNE.

Plans Under Way to Make This One of a Fine Group of Public Structures.

On June 7th and 8th the city of Flint will celebrate its fiftieth anniversary, and for nearly a year now plans have been maturing for the event in a manner commensurate with its historical importance and in recognition of the material growth and prosperity enjoyed by the greatest Vehicle City in the world.

A move this week is indicative of the spirit and enterprise at Flint, and it is now expected that in addition to the elaborate program already prepared to add the laying of the corner stone of a new \$50,000 city hall.

Probably not in a thousand times would a city prepare to celebrate its fiftieth anniversary under such auspicious circumstances. A handsome new \$100,000 court house has just been completed and will be formally dedicated at this time. A beautiful \$25,000 Carnegie library will be formally opened with appropriate ceremonies and an address by President Angell, of the University of Michigan. The corner stone of the new federal building to cost \$75,000 will be laid, an appropriation having been made by congress for this purpose, and Vice President Fairbanks having promised to deliver an address.

Now in addition to this remarkable group of buildings the public spirited and enterprising citizens of Flint have come to the conclusion that they must also lay the corner stone for a new \$50,000 city hall and a bill allowing the city to vote on this proposition has passed the legislature and a special election has been called for the purpose. There is no question whatever but that the vote will be in the affirmative, as the feeling is unanimous in favor of the new building and a Flint taxpayer who would make serious objections to the new structure would really feel ashamed of himself so keen is the spirit for improvements and so substantial is the prosperity and growth of the city.

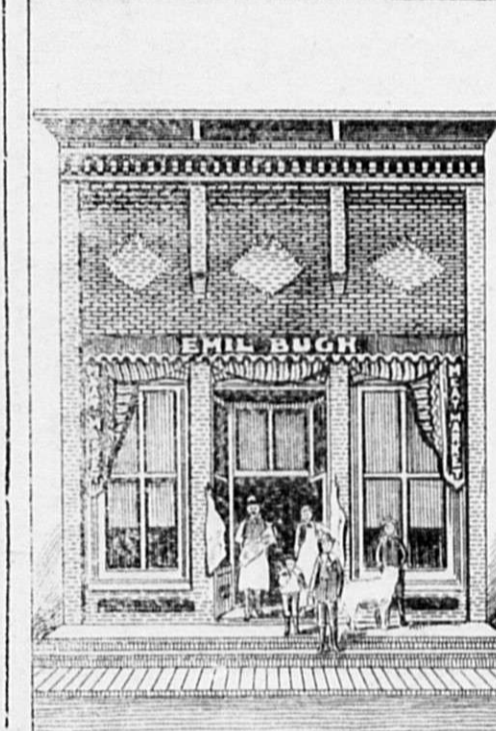
