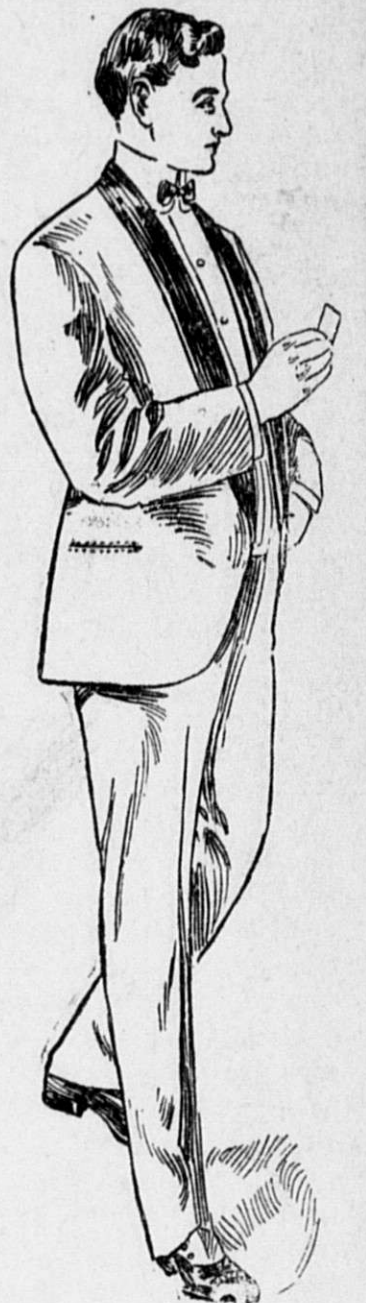

The city council has entered into a contract with the Thorn Construction Co., of Bay City, and the Tawas Manufacturing Co., for the installing of an electric lighting plant for commercial and street lighting purposes. Under the provisions of the contract the cost complete is to be \$3,493.50, and the city is to have five years in which to pay for same. During the five years the cost of operating the plant is borne by the people installing the plant and the city will pay a stated sum for the light, and sell same to the consumers. The cost of the light to the consumers has not yet been fixed nor full details completed. It is expected to have all arrangements completed within a few days and the work of construction commenced. Under the contract the plant is to be ready for business within 50 days from the time work is commenced. Electric lights will be a welcome addition to our city and we hope that the city has made a good bargain in securing them, but as full particulars as to the contract are not yet at hand and other arrangements as to cost etc. are not completed we are not in a position to give our readers any idea as to details. \$5.00 REWARD. A little over 27 years ago H. C. McKinley established the Otsego County Herald at Gaylord and has published it continually since that time, growing with the town until today the Herald is one of the very best weekly papers in northern Michigan. Bro. McKinley last week leased his paper to Dietz & Corselius, two experienced printers, and will take a year's vacation. May he enjoy his well-earned rest.

Secretary H. N. Wilder, of the grand lodge of Odd Fellows, has just completed the report for the year. It shows a net gain in membership for the order of 2,825, the total membership being 44,100 in Michigan. The total receipts of the lodge during the year were \$331,613.15, and of that amount \$202,200 was paid in dues. The Rebekah lodges have a total membership of 25,867, a finan of 938 during the year.

The prognostications of Rev. Irl Hicks for May were singularly verified taking into account the scope of the same, covering as they do a continent. His forecasts for June indicate a storm period extending from June 7, to 12 and will bring some of the most general and severe disturbances of the most general and severe disturbances of the month. Another storm period is scheduled with high temperature and falling barometer. June showers and electrical unrest will continue until the 28th. Taken in general, however, the conditions for the month according to this forecast are much more favorable for less moisture in June than has been experienced in May.

Entirely too little respect is shown for law in America. In every state we find laws a nullity for policy's sake. Such a thing is unknown in any other land. Disregard of one law breeds disrespect for all law. In allowing some laws to go unenforced, we reap a harvest in having all laws broken. The law may not be to one's liking, but the answer "It is the law," should be sufficient for the law abiding. Good men will observe even the bad laws, but bad men will break even good laws. It should be that all men, good and bad, be compelled to keep all law, good or bad, because it is the law. Few careless people usually are as to whether laws are enforced or not. This lethargy gives rise to civic evils. Indeed nearly all public wrongs grow out of the indifference of the people.—Joseph W. Folk.

Governor LaFollete sent a message to the Wisconsin legislature pleading for enactment of more drastic laws to drive paid lobbyists from legislative halls in that state. He recited the situation in Wisconsin where the lobby has been all-powerful for many years until the present session and he pointed out that it would be insufficient to merely declare that the lobbyists should keep out of the state house. He would have a law making it a penal offense for anyone to influence or attempt to influence a legislator or a state official in regard to any legislative matter other than in open session of a committee. He would send the lobbyists to jail. Some time ago the legislature had before it a bill to punish lobbyists out it failed. Later a legislative committee was appointed to make an inquiry into the violations of the law by lobbyists during this session. Now the governor has indicated that more legislation is needed and the Wisconsin legislature may be in mood to readily follow his advice.

### Educational Advertising.

Advertising is one of the greatest of educational forces. Education means rousing the spirit of inquiry. The easy and sensible way to rouse this spirit in any human being is to tell him of something which he does not know and which it will be clearly

to his advantage to know. The man with something good to sell is therefore in a position to increase the sum of human comfort and happiness—and the more he benefits himself, the more does he increase that sum.

A few years ago advertising was in a very crude state; it is still not quite the exact science it is going to be. For an exact science it must be—just as any other form of reaching.

Commerce is the great civilizer; advertising is to commerce what the teacher is to learning.—Saturday Evening Post.

In the present number of Tom Watson's Magazine there is more of Mr. Watson himself than in any previous issue. The editor also states the Populist Creed in downright fashion, and under the title "Planting Corn" gives an idyllic picture of Georgia life which shows in contrast to the sharpness and vigor of his usual style. John H. Gardner is represented by an article on "Poverty," suggested by Robert Hunter's book of the same title. Other articles are "The Southern Negro as a Property-Owner," by Lenora Beck Ellis; "A Japanese Populish," by Thomas C. Hutton; "The Story of a Suppressed Populist Newspaper," by Thomas H. Tibbles, People's Party candidate for Vice-President; "A Phase of the Money Problem," by Albert Griffin; "Monopoly; the Power Behind the Trust," by Joseph Dana Miller; "A Leaf from a Protective Tariff Catechism," by Joel Benton, and "The Track Walker," by Theodore Dreiser. Mr. Watson has enlarged his department of "The Say of Editors" so that he includes not only selections from reform editors, but from all editors, regardless of their political beliefs. The best story in the magazine and one that will stand favorable comparison with the best story in any magazine this month is "Tuck-of-Drum," by A. T. Sheppard. Other fiction is contributed by W. E. Grogan, Will N. Harben and Vincent Harper.

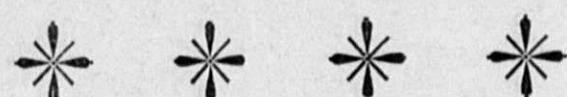

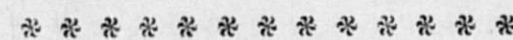

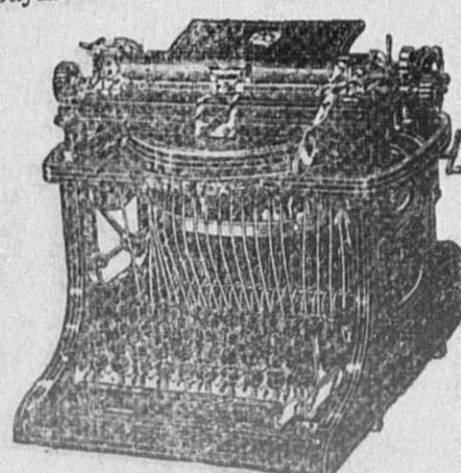

The long looked for naval battle between the Russian fleet under Admiral Rojestvensky and the Japanese under Admiral Togo was commenced in the straits of Korea last Saturday and continued through Monday.
