The Post Mortem.

The most remarkable feature of the legislature whose sessions came to a close on Wednesday evening was not the partisan unanimity of its membership, but the absolute unanimity with which it frowned an every measure that had its source in popular demand and was recommended by its own merit. Such measures of general interest and importance as were transformed into laws came as reluctant concessions to the people, and so far as possible were stripped of provisions which would insure certainty of the effectiveness of the law as the remedy for the condition complained of or which it was deemed desirable to correct.

The two laws of most considerable general importance are those affecting the method of making nominations and reducing the membership and increasing the power of the tax commission. The first is notably and distinctly an effort to mollify public sentiment through the medium of a law that offers opportunities for its own annulment and substitutes for the hope that it may do so the chance that it will. The latter was a distinct popular victory in that it will bring to an end the terms of two repudiated tax commissioners, but its equalization clause promises to be of indifferent efficacy while its constitutionality is very doubtful. There were some commendable measures enacted whose general effect will be beneficial, particularly the "good roads" law, the sanitarium for consumptives and the sleeping car tax laws, but the omissions, more particularly those affecting the conduct of municipalities, were far more notable than were the commissions.

It is in this connection that the quality of the legislature was most distinctly shown. Other measures of either general or particular interest were enacted or failed of enactment according to the divergent views of the members and the power and influence of their advocates and supporters, but with the single exception of the sleeping car tax law, nothing that affected directly or indirectly the interests or hopes of the possessors of so-called "vested rights" was ever in danger of serious consideration. There is a direct alliance between the principle of home rules for cities and the enlargement of municipal powers in the conduct of local affairs and the laws that would restrain the free exercise of the privileges now held by public utility corporations. In the extension of the former there is always present the threat of the curtailment of the latter. And the conduct of the legislature as to these matters we cannot fail to see the effect of private influence, especially as there was apparently no principle at stake. A charter for Grand Rapids was passed that confers on that city powers that were carefully withheld from Detroit, and Detroit was given the right to buy, build, own and operate a garbage plant, a privilege that would not have been given had there been any regard for consistency or if the refusal to grant other privileges of a similar nature had had a basis in anything but the desire to prevent interference with the rights of a particular corporation.

The complete defeat of the Gruesel resolution, which sought nothing but an expression of opinion from the voters of the state on the question of a modification of the constitution, was initiatory evidence of this legislative inclination which was confirmed and strengthened by the fate of every measure that had a similar purpose in direct or remote contemplation. There was, for instance, a distinct refusal to pass a bill making it obligatory to submit franchise propositions to a vote of the people in Wayne county, as well as to give more than insulting notice to an honest bill for the regulation of street railway fares and the charges of all public utility corporations.

For its failure to tamper with the

liquor laws, inadequate as they are at present, there may be some palliation as there may be for other neglects, but the persistent refusal to heed matters that are of vital importance to the people or to treat such matters with fairness and sincerity cannot be forgotten, and it should not be. When the chronological record of reforms that are certain to come is written it will be found that there were notable failures of performance on the part of the legislature of 1905 which will become more and more surprising and more and more eloquently illustrative of the shortsightedness of that body of lawmakers as its actions pass farther and farther into history.—*Detroit Free Press.*

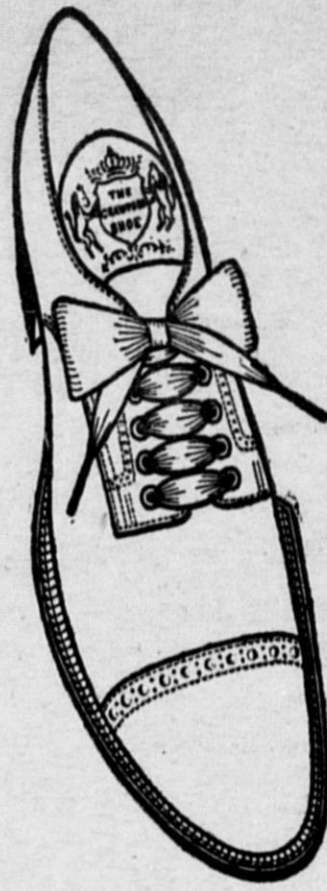

The business men in many towns in Michigan are waking up to the fact that they must do something to overcome the inroads made by the mail order houses in the large cities in securing the trade of the farmers of the state. They are beginning to realize that something more than appeals from the local papers for loyalty to home industries are required to overcome the liberal advertising done by the mail order houses, and that in order to successfully compete with them they must fight them with their own weapon—printer's ink. And when this question is considered it is easily seen that the local merchant has all the advantage. By a little study of the mail order catalogue he can easily make a list of goods which a comparison of prices, freight and other expenses considered, can be sold as low or lower than they are by the foreign concern, besides giving the purchaser the opportunity of seeing the goods before he pays for them. Farmers and all others buy where they believe they can buy the cheapest and the publication of this comparison in the merchant's advertisement will quickly bring him the trade instead of sending it to the mail order house. The united efforts of the merchants of any town will in one year practically kill the "mail order habit" in any locality, and when the merchants of any town allow thousands of dollars to go to the mail order houses each year they can blame no one but themselves.

Names for Farms.

We wish that every farm would be named. This is not a matter of sentiment but it is strictly business.

The man whose farm is known by some name is certain to take a greater interest in its products and to conduct all of his operations on a better plan. On every place there is certain to be some peculiarity that will suggest a name.

How much more dignified it is to be spoken of as the proprietor of Oak Grove Farm than to be alluded to as Jim Jones. By all means name your farms and it will make you all better farmers, says an exchange.

This is all the more important when one considers the R. F. D. service that now exists.

Name your farm and then go to your printer and get a few hundred letter heads, envelopes and bill heads printed on nice paper with the name of your farm, and on the envelopes a return request. Then the whole family will feel so proud they will begin to write letters to all old acquaintances and you may find an old maid aunt who is rich and has no closer heirs than yourself.

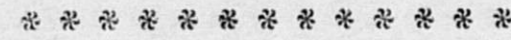
