Senator Alger has announced that he will not be a candidate for re-election and already the money-bags begin to jingle. The price of seats in the legislature will now begin to go up.

The comptroller of the treasury has allowed the claim of the state of Michigan in the sum of \$46,608 for reimbursement for expenses incurred by the state in aiding the United States in raising the volunteer army for the war with Spain.

A Philadelphia grafter who recently made \$800,000 left a note stating that he did it when he was drunk. Here is a chance for a distiller to find out what brand it was and offer it to others who want to get rich quick and care little as to the method.

The treasury deficit was larger than it ought to have been. The treasury officials say it was because the expenditures were so great. Somebody is to blame for the shortage and it should be the duty of the next congress to fix the responsibility.

In the United States court at Chicago, last Saturday, indictments were returned by the grand jury against 17 prominent men in the beef packing industry, including J. Ogden Armour and a dozen other prominent millionaires, on the charge of violating the Sherman anti-trust law.

Secretary of State John Hay died early last Saturday morning, at his summer home on the shores of lake Sunapee, New Hampshire. Thus passes from the field of action one of the most able and successful of America's diplomats, and one of the great men of the present generation.

Imports of merchandise through the port of New York for the year were valued at \$684,170,042, as compared with \$600,170,033 last year. They exceeded those of any previous year by \$66,000,000. The exports of domestic merchandise were valued at \$506,448,437, as compared with \$493,698,208, those of foreign merchandise being \$13,491,306, as compared with \$13,102,304.

Recognition of the fact that there is an uneven and unequal distribution of the rewards of toil is not confined to a few "agitators," as some persons would have you believe. President Roosevelt has given distinct recognition of the fact. He differs from the others as to the remedy; but in that all persons have equal right to their own opinions. Nobody has a right to claim that his remedy is the only one.

President Hadley of Yale has announced an endowment of \$1,000,000 from John D. Rockefeller to the university, and also gifts totaling this amount from graduates in sums varying from \$50,000 to \$250,000. The Rockefeller gift is the largest single donation ever made to the university. The only condition attached to it was that the money should be invested in income producing securities and preserved inviolate as an endowment, the income only to be used for current expenses.

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### Vacancy at West Point.

Congressman Loud has been notified by the war department that he is to make a nomination for appointment of a cadet at the United States military academy at West Point in place of Oscar Westover, of the west side, who is to be graduated in June 1906. The appointment is for a cadet who will enter the academy at the beginning of the academic year 1906, presumably in September. The request is made that the congressman proceed at once in the selection, but he cannot give it attention until his return from his trip to the Orient, which will be in October next.

In a letter to the Tribune concerning the matter the congressman says: "It is my desire that those who are eligible physically and mentally and desire the appointment, should advise me before that time and be prepared to take the examination in Bay City November 15. It is my intention to ask the superintendent of public schools of Bay City, together with some practical business man and one of the physicians of Bay City to pass upon the educational, mental adaptability and physical qualifications of the candidates.—Bay City Tribune.

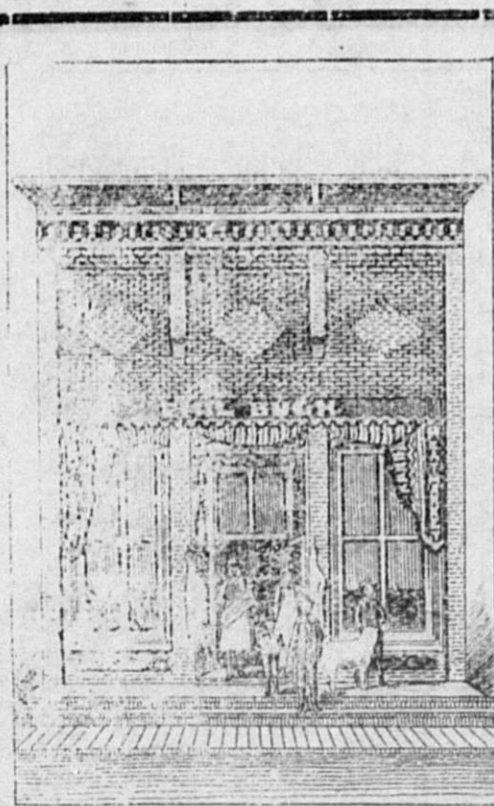

### City Council Proceedings.

Special meeting of the common council of the city of Tawas City, held in the council rooms Thursday evening, June 29, '05, for the purpose of further considering an electric light plant. Called to order by Mayor Wuggazer. Present, Alderman Hartingh, Marzinski, Attorney Jahraus and Clerk King. There being no quorum present, on motion council adjourned to 10 o'clock a. m., Friday, June 30th, '05.

Adjourned special meeting called to order by Mayor Wuggazer at 10 o'clock a. m., Friday, June 30th, present, Mayor Wuggazer, Aldermen Hartingh and Clerk King on motion board adjourned to 2 o'clock p. m.

Called to order at 2 o'clock p. m. by Mayor Wuggazer, present, Aldermen Hartingh, Garber, Hadwin, Marzinski, Brabon, Attorney Jahraus and Clerk King. Quorum present.

Moved by Hartingh supported by Garber that the city of Tawas City enter into a lease contract for the furnishing to the city of an Electric Lighting by the Thorne Electric Co., of Bay City, Mich., hereafter entered and referred to, and that the mayor and city clerk be hereby authorized and directed to execute said lease in behalf of city.

Carried, Yeas, Garber, Hartingh, Hadwin, Marzinski, Brabon. Nays, none.

THIS AGREEMENT, Made and executed this 29th day of June, A. D. 1905, by and between the Thorne Electric Company, of Bay City, Bay County, Michigan, a corporation, hereinafter called the Company, of the first part, and Tawas City, a municipal corporation, hereinafter called the city, of the second part.

Witnesseth, That Whereas, the Thorne Construction Company has heretofore made a proposition to Tawas City for leasing to it certain electrical apparatus, etc., which agreement the said Thorne Construction Company has requested the Thorne Electric Co. to carry out and perform.

Now Therefore, it is agreed by and between the parties hereto as follows:

First: The Company agrees to furnish, erect and construct an electric light plant and to lease the same to the City upon the terms hereinafter mentioned, such plant to be in complete operating condition, the apparatus comprising same to be as follows:

GENERATOR.  
One 50 K. W., 2200 volt 60 cycle A. C. generator, having a running capacity of 50 K. W., and three arc lamps of 1200 candle power capacity each and one thousand 16 candle power incandescent lamps and to be of the latest type alternating current generator and strictly first class in every respect.

SWITCHBOARD.  
One 2 panel switchboard to contain all the necessary instruments, meters and switches required to properly handle the electrical output of the generator above mentioned.

ARC LAMPS.  
The Company is to furnish and install fourteen alternating current series arc lamps, outdoor type, fitted with the necessary inner and outer globes, and metal reflectors, each lamp to give light equal to 1200 candle power in the clear.

REGULATORS.  
The Company to furnish and install one arc light regulator of 5 ampere light capacity, to automatically adjust the light voltage for any number of lamps ranging between five and twenty-seven and keep the lamps up to the normal candle power.

POLE LINE.  
The Company shall construct a pole line of approximately two and a half miles, poles to be not less than twenty-five feet in length, six inches at the top, and those carrying the arc lamp suspension rig shall be not less than thirty feet in length, all to be spaced close enough to properly suspend the line wire and not to permit too great a sag, and all poles requiring it shall be properly guyed and braced. The line wire shall be not less than No. 8 B. & S. gauge wire, P. wire, and run in two circuits, one circuit comprising one series arc circuit and one incandescent commercial lighting circuit, the arc lamps to be hung by the center span suspension method thereby permitting them to be hung over the center of the street. The pole line is to be located or run through the streets of Tawas City best suited to reach the locations of the arc lights to be operated by the City or its electric lighting committee, and the incandescent circuit to generally parallel the arc circuit.

TRANSFORMERS.  
The Company shall furnish and connect three transformers to be suitably located.

The whole plant as above described to be connected throughout and put in complete operating condition in location and upon foundation to be furnished by the City, and to guarantee each of the several apparatus or parts going to the make up of the plant as a whole against any inherent defects for the period of one year.

It is further understood that the Company shall warrant and defend the City in the right to use the apparatus herein mentioned and described to be furnished and supplied by it against all claims of any person or persons whatsoever on account of patent rights, royalties, or otherwise.

The said plant to be constructed and completed on or before the 24th day of August, 1905, ready for operation when power to be furnished by the City is applied.

The said Company also agrees to and does hereby lease the property above described to the City for the period of six years and for the consideration of Three Thousand Four Hundred Ninety Three and 50/100 (\$3,493.50) Dollars, which the City agrees to pay as follows, viz:

Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars within thirty days after the plant is ready for operation; Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars in one, two, three, four and five years from date plant is ready for operation, and Four Hundred Ninety three and 50/100 (\$493.50) Dollars in six years from said date, together with interest thereon at the rate of six per cent, per annum, payable annually, for which several payments proper orders upon the proper funds of the City shall be drawn and delivered to the Company at the time of the making of the cash payment, it being understood that the payment of such rentals as represented by such orders may be anticipated or paid at any time and all interest shall cease at date of payment.

Said First Parties being the owners of a factory in Tawas City and having surplus steam power for rent, and Second Party having leased an electric light plant, property, lighting fixtures and the apparatus above described shall belong to the City, it being expressly understood that in case of forfeiture the right to take such apparatus under this contract is optional with the Company.

Carried: Yeas, Garber, Hartingh, Hadwin, Marzinski, Brabon. Nays, none.

in first class shape, and operate such plant in an efficient and serviceable manner; and to furnish and operate the same so far as the incandescent part of said plant is concerned all night for each and every night of the year, and for the arc light circuit of said plant, to furnish the power and operate the same each night from dark until dawn upon all nights when the moon is less than one half full, and at least for 265 nights in the year.

First parties agree that power for fourteen arc lights as furnished by the city, shall be operated as above without specific charge therefor, but in return herefor, the city hereby in lieu of rental allows first parties to operate the incandescent portion of said plant to furnish lighting to private individuals and firms, and to charge such reasonable and just amounts as shall be a fair equivalent and compensation for the same; and first parties to furnish at all times when operated a good, steady and brilliant light equivalent to what such a plant should furnish when properly and efficiently powered and operated, for lights of like power and system.

Second parties also to furnish all carbons and materials necessary to run the waste and consumption incident to the operation and use of such plant and lights, except that second party shall supply broken lamps or material incidentally destroyed without fault, subject of first parties in operation, and for which first parties are not accountable.

First parties also agree to furnish at all times a man sufficiently skillful in such matters to look after and operate such plant, and to keep the same in good repair and running condition, and also agree to keep and preserve said plant and all material and property connected therewith which belongs to said second party during such operation, free from injury and waste, except such as may result from natural wear and tear, and damage by the elements.

As a basis for furnishing lights to private parties, first parties hereto agree to furnish the same at the rate of fifty cents per month, flat rate, for each light or lamp used of 16 candle power, for an all night service; or if meters are used, then prices therefor as quoted below, viz:

For 10 K. W. or less	15 cents per Kw.
For 10 to 25 Kw.	11 " " "
For 25 to 50 Kw.	11 " " "
For 50 to 75 Kw.	10 " " "
For 75 to 100 Kw.	9 " " "
For 100 to 200 Kw.	7 " " "
For 200 to 400 Kw.	7 " " "
All above 400 Kw.	6 " " "

A discount of 2 cents per Kw. shall be allowed for prompt payment, within fifteen days after first of each month; all bills to be paid monthly, and to be paid in advance. Second parties shall have the entire control and oversight and superintendence of such plant, subject to the right of the Council or its officers to from time to time inspect and investigate the same, and examine into its condition and operation, and as to its proper and efficient working, and the right to have the same operated properly and efficiently.

All connections made by private parties shall be subject to supervision and control of first parties, and they shall supervise the same as far as necessary to secure the most efficient operation thereof, and without injury to the operation and efficiency of the main lines and plant as a waste of power.

Second parties agree to furnish, when necessary, transformers and wire for connecting the same, as the incandescent service may require.

To secure the faithful and efficient performance of the conditions above enjoined upon first parties, they said first parties hereby agree to furnish a bond in the penal sum of Two Thousand Dollars, payable to the City of Tawas City or its duly qualified officers, or assigns, in case it fails to perform such contract, or in case it ceases to operate such plant within five years, which term it is hereby agreed by both parties hereto, shall be the extent of time for which this lease shall run under the conditions herein expressed.

Second party hereto hereby agrees that during and for such five years, it will allow no other firm or individual the use of its streets to furnish lighting in competition with first party in the carrying out of this contract.

In case of default by first parties in carrying

out the terms of this lease, or in furnishing power therefor, or in case they shall discontinue furnishing power, or move away, second party shall have the right to immediately possession of said plant, and first parties shall turn the same over to second party, without cost or expense therefor.

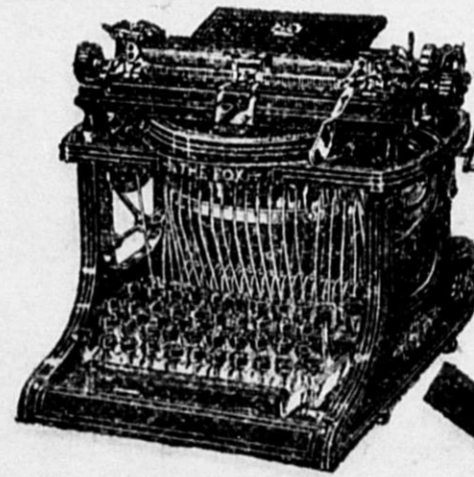

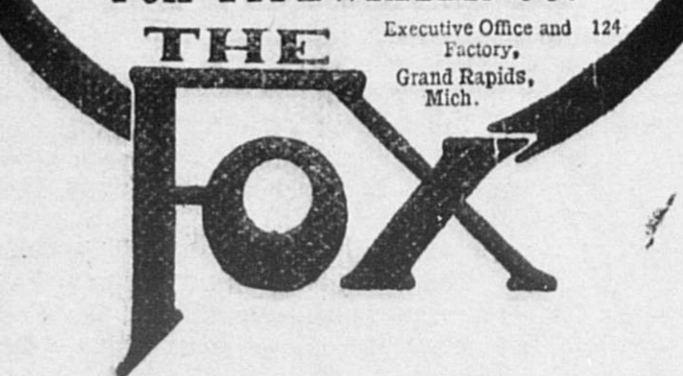
