On the theory that the laborer is worthy of his hire the Jap soldier ought to fight better than the Russian. The Jap soldier is paid 60 cents a month and he is earning every cent of it while the Russian soldier is paid but 12 cents a month. How many Americans would care to turn out and face the peril of modern warfare on such a wage?

Thirty-four indictments and a report ensuring the recorder's court of Detroit for lax methods in the naturalization of foreigners were presented Saturday to Judge Swan of the United States district court by the federal grand jury, which has for several weeks been investigating alleged fraudulent naturalization of many Italians here.

Hereafter when debtors in Michigan pay up their notes they will find that they have not "three days of grace," but must pay on the date when their obligations become due. This is one of the most interesting effects of the negotiable instrument bill signed by Gov. Warner lately. It covers all kinds of "papers," and is intended to make the Michigan law conform to that of most of the other states.

Regarding the safety of operating the highest speed trains, an official of one of the largest railway systems says: "It is just as safe and, I think it is safer to operate a high speed passenger train than the ordinary train which runs at an average rate of 40 miles an hour. The tracks are cleared ahead of these 'specials' from three-quarters of an hour to an hour, and every foot of the way is watched for their coming."

The situation in Kansas following the decision of the supreme court to the effect that the appropriation for a state oil refinery was unconstitutional, cannot be especially gratifying to the oil monopoly. The very fact of appropriation was sufficient to show to the people that they are able to accomplish much if they will only set themselves to it. Doubtless private capital will furnish the means by which that will be done which was attempted by the state, though, of course, prison labor would have been a decided advantage. Possibly some plan may yet be devised for making use of prison labor in the work of operating a private independent refinery. If this is done Kansas may yet lead the way to an ending of the monopoly of oil distribution. Governor Hoch and the leading members of the legislature are as determined as before that the fight shall be carried on to a finish. In this they will have the sympathy of the people of the other states as well as of Kansas.

Breaks all Records.

Immigration into the country this year is breaking all records and President Roosevelt is said to be considering the idea of urging upon congress drastic action to prevent the inflow of undesirable elements. The figures indicate total immigration for the twelve months of over 1,000,000, mostly from Italy, Hungary and Russia. As already pointed out in the Railway World, immigration from Great Britain Ireland, Sweden, Norway, Germany and other countries heretofore furnishing desirable material for American citizenship, is rapidly decreasing, and is being replaced by an enormous immigration of the least desirable class from the three countries named. Newspaper despatches from Washington indicate that President Roosevelt is giving special attention to this growing immigration problem and that he is to make important recommendations as to the best way of dealing with it when he sends his next message to congress.—*Railway World.*
