Doubtless private capital will furnish the means by which that will be done which was attempted by the state, though, of course, prison labor would have been a decided advantage. Possibly some plan may yet be devised for making use of prison labor in the work of operating a private independent refinery. If this is done Kansas may yet lead the way to an ending of the monopoly of oil distribution. Governor Hoch and the leading members of the legislature are as determined as before that the fight shall be carried on to a finish. In this they will have the sympathy of the people of the other states as well as of

## Breaks all Records.

Immigration into the country this year is breaking all records and President Rooseyelt is said to be consider. ing the idea of urging upon congress drastic action to prevent the inflow of undesirable elements. The figures indicate total immigration for the twelve months of over 1,000,000, most. ly from Italy, Hungary and Russia. As already pointed out in the Railway World, immigration from Great Britain Ireland, Sweden, Norway, Germany and other countries heretofore furnishing desirable material for American citizenship, is rapidly decreasing, and is being replaced by an enormous 1mmigration of the least desirable class from the three countries named. Newspaper despatches from Washington indicate that President Roosevelt is giving special attention to this growing immigration problem and that he is to make important recommendations as to the best way of dealing with it when he sends his next message to congress.—Railway World.

## Horticultural Note.

Prof. Taft, authority on the San Jose scale, announces that if the para site is not removed from the trees of

Ypsilanti, the city will be shadeless within eight years which is the limit of life allowed to a tree infected and left to the pest. One scale who feels well can in a single season reproduce a million. He cannot be dealt with by feeding him poison as he rejects all nourishment except the sap of the tree which it is his business to destroy but he is not insensible to lotious. Fifteen pounds of flour of sulphur, eight pounds of salt and twenty five pounds of lime to fifty gallons of water, administered in the form of a spray will make him itch like a politician for ar office and it will kill him too, which is wherein he differs from the politician. Prof. Taft states that in China, whence the scale, disregarding the immigration treaty, smuggled itself into this country, is not much feared, on account of the ladybug which feeds on him and enjoys his juice. Efforts to acclimatize the ladybug in America have proved unsuccessful in the zone no farther north than Washington she cannot stand a low thermometer and refuses to wear wraps.

### Cut the Weeds.

The importance of removing all noxous weeds at this season cannot be overestimated, and the law upon the subject is very strict. Following are

some of the provisions: "It shall be the duty of every owner occupant or person having charge of Canada thistles, milkweed or other noxious weeds growing thereon or on lands between the centre of any highway passing through the same in each and every year so often as shall be sufficient to prevent said Canada thistles, milkweed or other noxious weeds going to seed, and it any owner, occupant or person having charge of said Nov. 23, rec'd primary money Nov. 1904 1359 15 Dec. 3, Deling. tax C. > cut down in due season all noxious weeds on his own lands, but it also makes it his duties to cut down all noxious weeds growing in the highway between his land and the center of the highway, and if he does not do so he is subject to fine and imprisonment.

> The law also makes it the duty of every pathmaster or overseer of highways to cause to be cut down in time to prevent them from going to seed, all noxious weeds growing in the highway in his road district, and the law provides a penalty if he fails to do so.

The statute above quoted, sections 3499 to 3511 inclusive of the Compiled Laws of 1897, provide for the appoint. ment of a commissioner for the destruction of noxious weeds, making it the duty of the township board in each township to appoint a citizen to see that every person owning or occupying From primary fund From delinquent taxes land does not allow any noxious weeds to go to seed.

This is a very important matter to the farmers of the county and every township board ought to appoint some man who will see to it that no noxious weeds go to seed within his township. If the owners or occupants do not cut them in due season they ought to be prosecuted under the law, and the commissioner should see to that.

The law also provides that in such case the commissioner for the destruction of noxious weeds shall, after having served notice on the owner or occupant to cut the weeds and upon his failing to do so, go upon the lands and cut all the noxious weeds himself or have it done and that the expense of cutting them shall be certified to the township clerk. The township board shall then audit the expenses and pay them and all amounts so paid shall be certified to the supervisor of the town. ship and assessed against the respective parcels of land upon which the weeds were cut. The above law leaves the whole matter of noxious weeds practically in the hands of the township board of each township, and each township board ought to see that the law is observed within their township.

### From the Southland.

Sheppards, Va., July, 1905. Having been here just three months and in keeping with my promise, I would say that our stay thus far has

been very agreeable. We held our stock in Farmville until we made a selection of a farm. Managers of the old tobacco ware house kindly offered their barns free of charge for our stock. I did a wise act in buying a half car load of hay as I would have had to pay \$22 per ten for northern

hay at that time. After looking over considerable country we bought \$12 acres embodying all necessary qualities, buildings, orchard, timber and water and it is reasonably well fenced. After moving our belongings onto the farm we began to put in crops. We planted a lot in corn with eight rowed yellow Flint, on the 5th day of May from which we will have roasting cars by the 15th of July. I have in 25 acres of corn, all of which is looking well.

We had potatoes, peas, etc. from the garden by the 20th of May, also ripe cherries and strawberries and we have been enjoying an abundance of apples, peaches and pears since the 20th of June. There are wild fruits galore. The wheat, oats and rye are a good sample; red clover was a fair crop. Hurd's grass is very good; the wild grass-Japan clover and Broom straw-is in abundance and my cattle are doing as well feeding upon them as they dil upon timothy and clever.

The weather is superb, the theremometer has been as high as 95, but the ayerage is about 78. Sweat? I

guess you would, there is no ice cool breeze to chill your brow, but there is the balmy breeze from the ocean which is unsurpassed.
