Supervisors' Proceedings.
Thursday, June 29, 1905.
The board of supervisors of Iosco county met in the court house in the city of Tawas City, said county, on Thursday, June 29, 1905, pursuant to adjournment from Thursday, April 29, 1905.
The board was called to order by George Sutherland, chairman, who ordered the clerk to call the roll.
The following supervisors answered to roll call: Supervisors Alda, Brown, Davidson, Ely, Featherston, Ferrister, Hottis, James A. Jackson, Thomas Jackson, Johnson, Karus, King, Carleton, Macfarlane, McDonald, Muncey, Rawden, Richards, Robinson, Sutherland, Walker, Whittemore, Williams—23. Quorum present.
East Tawas, Mich., June 29, 1905.
To the Hon. Board of Supervisors of Iosco county, Mich.:
Gentlemen—This certifies that Geo. N. Carleton was duly appointed president of the common council of the city of East Tawas at the regular session of said council held May 1, 1905, and as such duly qualified to a seat on the board of supervisors in the absence of C. W. Luce.

To the Hon. Board of Supervisors:
Gentlemen—I have to report on the case of Arenac county vs. Iosco county, for the Gregory case, as follows: Mr. Rawden assisted me in the case and we filed a plea in abatement to the plaintiff's declaration. This matter was argued before Judge Conine in February and some time after he sustained our plea in abatement, which leaves the case now in such shape that they will have to start a suit by mandamus to compel the payment of the amount due. We have taxed the costs against the plaintiff in the sum of \$35, thus clearing Iosco county of any expense in the matter.

To the Hon. Board of Supervisors:
Your committee on public buildings, supplies and repairs would respectfully report as follows: We have investigated the question of the cost of building a new fence around the court house grounds. After careful investigation we came to the conclusion that the only way to do anything with the fence was to build an entirely new fence. The fence on the east side would undoubtedly have to be built by the county, as the present owners of the property east of the court house land claim that the present fence was built by them entirely. Your committee has investigated the cost of a new fence and find that it will be about one hundred dollars.
Regarding the water closets in the jail: We found that the only way to do anything with them was to put in an entirely new system. The plumber is now at work on the installation of the new ones. Your committee had expected to have them all installed before the meeting of the board, but on account of some delay in getting some of the material needed the work has been delayed.
We have had the broken window lights in the court house taken out and replaced with new ones and the windows painted up.
Your committee would recommend that on their accepting the work now being done in the jail, that the treasurer be authorized to pay the amount of the same, in order that the parties doing the work will not have to wait until the next meeting of the board. And further that the committee be authorized to build a new fence around the court house grounds.

After reading all the details of the Equitable life insurance squabble, the only wonder is where there was any surplus to quarrel over.

The Roosevelt, in which Capt. Robert E. Peary hopes to reach the north pole, sailed from New York on her long voyage last Sunday.

Gen. W. W. Blackmar, commander-in-chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, died at Boise, Idaho last Sunday. The remains were taken to his home at Boston for interment.

Walter Wellman claims to have it from Roosevelt indirectly that he has said he will not in any way attempt to dictate his successor and that he is not picking Root or Taft or anybody else for the next presidential nomination. It is not necessary for President Roosevelt to make any such denial. But the public has not been slow to realize that by the selection of Root he is placed in a more favorable position as a presidential candidate than formerly. Mr. Wellman also states that Root needed no urging to go into the cabinet.

James B. Dill, the famous trust lawyer of New Jersey, sometimes called "the father of trusts" at his residence in East Orange told what his reasons were for having taken from Gov. Stokes of New Jersey an appointment as lay judge of the court of errors and appeals. "When you have been storming a fort for 25 years it is some fun to get inside and see what effect your shots have had on it," he said, in reply to the question why he had given up a \$300,000 a year practice to accept a \$3,000 a year judgeship. "There are lots of things in life," he continued, "that are more fun than money hunting. Why did Root give up his immense practice for \$8,000 a year as secretary of state? Why did Taft give up a big income to enter the government service? Ambition! Ambition! Ambition, my boy."

Will Sue Railroads.

A Washington dispatch says the Department of Agriculture has prepared papers in 1,200 suits to be brought against the railroads of the country asking that in each case a fine of \$500 be assessed for a violation of the so-called twenty-eight hour law, providing for the humane shipment of cattle.

Nearly every railroad from Maine to California is involved. The suits will be filed in the circuit courts of the United States, and judgments will be asked for the benefit of the federal treasury.

The evidence against the railroads is so clear that the attorneys for many of the big companies have already begun negotiations with Secretary Shaw with a view to having him agree to compromises.

New Truancy Law.

A bill was passed by the last legislature which effects a considerable change in the methods of governing the district schools throughout the state. The old law provided that all children between the ages of 7 and 15 years should attend school at least four consecutive months each year. This has been amended so that children between the ages mentioned must attend continuously throughout the year unless physically unable so to do. Children attending private or parochial schools will be compelled to observe the law.

The bill further provides that the sheriff of each county, in selecting his deputies, shall designate at least one to act as truant officer for the county. Heretofore the chairman of the board of school inspectors of the different counties have acted in the capacity of truant officers. The officer whom the sheriff may designate shall perform all the truancy work in the county when directed to do so by the county commissioner of schools, his compen-

sation being fixed at \$3 per day when actually employed.

The evident purpose in the new law is to have a truant officer for the respective school districts who will perform his duty without being influenced. It is believed the new law will have the effect of forcing a more regular attendance.

There is one objection to the law, however, and that is that the expense attending the truant officer and his salary comes out of the county treasury, thereby compelling the people of the city to pay nearly half of the cost of enforcing the law.

Two members of the committee, Messrs Jackson and Rawden, went to Lansing June 17, and spent some time with the committee of the legislature having charge of the bill. The bill was finally passed, but in the following form, leaving the salary the same as before but fixing the proportion to be paid by the three counties as follows: Iosco, \$700; Alcona, \$240; Osceola, \$300. This leaves us with \$200 per year less to pay.

Your committee has not yet received a copy of the bill, but we have been informed by Representative McCarthy that the bill was passed by both houses and signed by the governor.

Resolved, That the President and Secretary of this society are hereby authorized, upon payment to them, for the society, by the board of supervisors of Iosco county, of the sum of \$250, to convey to the county of Iosco by warranty deed, the land now owned by this society and fully described in said bill and now occupied by said society as fair grounds; that upon said deed being executed by said president and secretary they shall at the same time take an exclusive lease from the board of supervisors at a nominal rental of said grounds for a period of ten years, with the privilege of renewal.
All of which is respectfully submitted to your honorable board for consideration and approval.

Dear Sir—In reply to your favor of June 21, I will say that I am sending to you herewith a copy of House Enrolled Act No 382, which was approved June 13 and given immediate effect.

House enrolled act No 382; bill No 576—An act to amend section thirty-six of act number one hundred eighty-three, public acts of 1897, being compiler's section 36 of compiled laws of 1897, being an act, entitled "An act to provide for the appointment and to fix the term of office, duties and compensation of circuit court stenographers in the state of Michigan."

The People of the State of Michigan enact: Section 1. Section thirty-six of act number one hundred eighty-three of the public acts of eighteen hundred ninety-seven is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 36. In the 22d circuit, the stenographer shall be paid an annual salary of fifteen hundred dollars, apportioned as follows: By the county of Iosco, seven hundred dollars per annum; by the county of Alcona, five hundred dollars per annum; and by the county of Osceola, three hundred dollars per annum.
