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

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

Taxing the Coffee Cup to Pay Railroad Graft.

Secretary of the Treasury Shaw and other leaders will urge that at the special session of congress in November measures shall be taken to provide for the deficit in the national finances by surance business ought to be conducted increasing the internal revenue taxe and by a tax on coffee.

The deficit during the year ending June 30, 1905, was about \$28,000,000 However, it is shown that during that year the postoffice department paid to the railroads of the country for the rent of postal cars, transportation of the mails, etc., approximately \$46,000,000. It is estimated that if the government compensated the railroads only at the average rate express companies charge for transporting merchandise-manifestly an exhorbitant rate-the cost of carrying the mails would be only about \$10,000,000 a year. Accordingly it seems that the payments to the railroads are excessive by \$36,000,000 a year, the greater part of which huge sum is a graft pure and simple. By A few weeks ago negotiations were becutting off the graft the deficit would gun by the Free Press Co., with the be provided for and in addition a surplus of \$8,000,000 would remain. Instead of increasing the taxes the graft should be eliminated. A failure to recognize this simple way of providing for the deficit would be calculated to precipitate a discussion for an entire revision of the tax system of the national government. Would a tax bill whose title ought to be "A bill to tax the coffee cup of the people to enable the government to continue an indefensible system of excessive payments to railroads" be likely to prove a popular measure with the public?-Detroit Journal.

The low rates of the fraternal concerns must go up and the high rates of the old line concerns should come down. 


