From all corners of the state come
reports of the newest and most brazen
of grafts. Farmers are being visited
by a sleek-looking stranger, who says
he is a government inspector of cattle.
He inspects the lowing kine to see if
they have any contagious diseases,
demands—and often receives—\$5 bill
for the inspection, and then drives away.
Undesirable immigrants from all
parts of Europe are pouring into this
country at an increased rate according
to United States Commissioner Wat-
kern. About 48,000 immigrants arrived
during July, against 36,000 in the
same period last year. The undesir-
able element is shown by the increased
number of deportations. More than
1000 were sent back during July as
against 645 a year ago.

About 2,000 automobile licenses
have now been taken out by owners
of machines in Michigan, but the sec-
retary of state is informed that double
that number of machines are being
run in the state. Although the law
provides that licenses shall be taken
out before July 15, the owners for un-
licensed machines may be arrested at
any time for failure to comply with
the law. It is probable that there will
be few prosecutions until the owners
have had ample notice of the new law.

R. F. D. Service.
Rural Free Delivery service having
been ordered by the postoffice depart-
ment to commence August 15, the
office at Vine will be discontinued
after the 14th inst. The routes laid
out by the officials cover the entire
territory heretofore supplied by Vine
and Edson postoffices. Patrons of
the above offices will hereafter have
their mail addressed to Tawas City.
Carriers will leave Tawas City P. O.
at 8 a. m. daily, except Sundays and
legal holidays designated by the de-
partment.
This branch of the service has been
established for the accommodation of
the farming community and persons
living some distance from a postoffice
and it is expected that such persons
will avail themselves of the advantages
provided by the department. With a
daily mail delivered at the door of
every farm house or as near thereto as
possible the farmer or resident of
rural districts is provided with al-
most the same advantages as the res-
ident of towns or villages. The car-
riers will receive applications for
money orders and also receive money
orders for payment. They will re-
ceive and deliver registered letters
and in every instance will give and
take receipts for same. Will also
carry stamps and stamped envelopes
for sale to patrons.
It is absolutely required by the de-
partment that each and every family
shall place a suitable box on the road
side in such way that the carrier will
not be obliged to get out of his wagon
to receive or deliver mail in the same.
Every box so placed must be of style
as approved by the department, and
for tampering with any such box the
penalty is not exceeding \$1000 fine or
three years imprisonment.
It is desired that all persons on or
adjacent to the routes established will
avail themselves of the advantages
offered and have boxes placed as
promptly as possible, as no mail will
be delivered to persons not having
proper boxes or who do not comply
with the requirements. Any informa-
tion desired will be given by the post-
master at Tawas City or by the carriers.
Owing to the delay of having boxes
placed there will be some inconve-
nience to many persons on the route,
as also to the postmaster at Tawas
City and the carriers; we therefore re-
quest that due consideration be given
and with the assistance of the patrons
we hope in a short time to prove the
advantages of the system.
