In the September number of Tom Watson's Magazine, Dr. Albert Bushnell Hart, professor in history in Harvard University, replies to Mr. Watson's arraignment which attracted so much notice throughout the country. Stead, probably the world's foremost journalist. The Hon. Samuel Seabury contributes "Municipal Ownership in New York," and Frederick Upham Adams has another biting sociological satire, entitled "Mr. Stony-chap's Parade." ### Must be More Careful.

Township treasurers will have to be more careful in the future regarding the transaction of business with taxpayers and the county treasurer. A new law goes into effect September 16 which will have for its object the protection of persons who pay their taxes and are afterward informed that their lands have been sold for back taxes.

Owing to carelessness on the part of some of the townships the county treasurer has often not received money paid on a piece of land, although the owner has been given a receipt for the payment of the same. As a result the description has been listed among the delinquents and sent to Lansing. The owner naturally never learns of what has transpired until somebody buys his land for back taxes, when he is notified.

The new law makes it imperative for the county treasurer to commence suit against the treasurer of a township who is negligent for the purpose of securing money. Thus the matter is taken from the hands of the state officers and is made more local in effect.

### An Objection to Public Ownership.

The objection that public ownership centralizes too much power in the hands of the government is weak, to say the least. It rather diffuses the power. The railroad companies of this country employ about one million men. Do they use their power with these men to influence elections? Of course they do. Frequently a man's job depends upon the way he votes. But under our civil service regulations which might be extended and improved upon with much benefit, the government employee would not be influenced in his action any more than the officer or private in the regular army now is. We need better civil service regulations whether we have public ownership of anything else or not. We need it for what we have. The spoils system has done much to corrupt and undermine our free institutions, and every patriotic citizen should cry out against it. But, even as it is, its baleful influence is nothing like that of the corporations, for not only do the corporations use the power they have over their employees to influence elections, but they have done more to corrupt our legislatures and courts than all other forces combined.

It is known that hundred of thousands of dollars have been spent in bribing congress to pass laws granting lands to different railroad corporations and it has been stated that the Union Pacific Company spent \$525,000 to bribe congress to pass an amendment to the original act, so that the government would accept a second mortgage on the road for its own loan to the company. The greatest lobbies kept in our legislative halls are those of the railroad corporations and banks, and these can be got rid of by taking absolute control of the railroads and of the currency. Instead of government ownership centralizing power it would have the reverse effect—that of diffusing the power among all the people, and would most certainly put a stop to so much wholesale corruption and debauchery of our courts and legislatures.

Boys who have proved too much for school after school, teacher after teacher, never give her the slightest trouble. Children who have been given up as hopeless idiots, learn to read under her tutelage, and take the first step toward fitting for a trade. She is an enthusiast and an optimist, declaring that she has yet to see the child too stupid to become self-supporting, or too bad to be reached by kind, firm treatment."

### City Council Proceedings.

Regular meeting of the common council of the city of Tawas City, held in the council rooms Friday evening, Sept. 1, 1905.

Called to order by Mayor Waggazer. Present: Aldermen Garber, Hadwin, Marzinski, Brown, Attorney Jahraus and Clerk King. Quorum present.

Minutes of meeting of Aug. 18, '05, read and approved.

Moved by Garber and supported by Marzinski that M. E. Friedman be given permission to lay a water pipe across Mathew street, yeas, Garber, Hadwin, Marzinski, Brown, nays, none. Motion carried.

Ald. Brabon entering took his seat. The committee on claims and accounts then made the following report:

Your committee to whom was referred the notice of Chas. Blust by his next friend August Blust, claiming damages therein for injuries on a sidewalk on 4th street and near the south west corner of 4th and 9th streets in the city of Tawas City, would respectfully report as follows:

We find that the claims served upon the city clerk on Aug. 5th, 1905, shows that the alleged accident, and for which damages are claimed, occurred June 7th, 1905, and that the notice of claim served upon the city clerk on the said 5th day of August, 1905, was not accompanied by a certificate of an officer of the city, nor was it verified by the affidavit of the said Chas. Blust or by any one in his behalf within sixty days after the alleged injury occurred, as statute provides.

Your committee would therefore recommend that the claims be not considered for the reason that the aforesaid claim when served upon the city clerk on the 5th day of August, 1905, was not certified to by any official of the city, nor was it verified by the affidavit of the said Chas. Blust or by any one in his behalf within sixty days after the alleged injury occurred, as statute provides.

Moved by Hadwin, supported by Brown, that the report of the committee on the claims of Chas. Blust for alleged injuries caused by defective sidewalk be accepted and adopted and the recommendations thereon carried out and the claim be not considered for the reasons set forth in the committee's report. Motion carried. Yeas, Garber, Hadwin, Marzinski, Brabon, Brown, nays, none.

Moved by Marzinski, supported by Garber that Jahraus & Radwin be retained as attorneys to represent the city in the claim of Chas. Blust. Motion carried. Yeas, Garber, Hadwin, Marzinski, Brabon, Brown, nays, none.

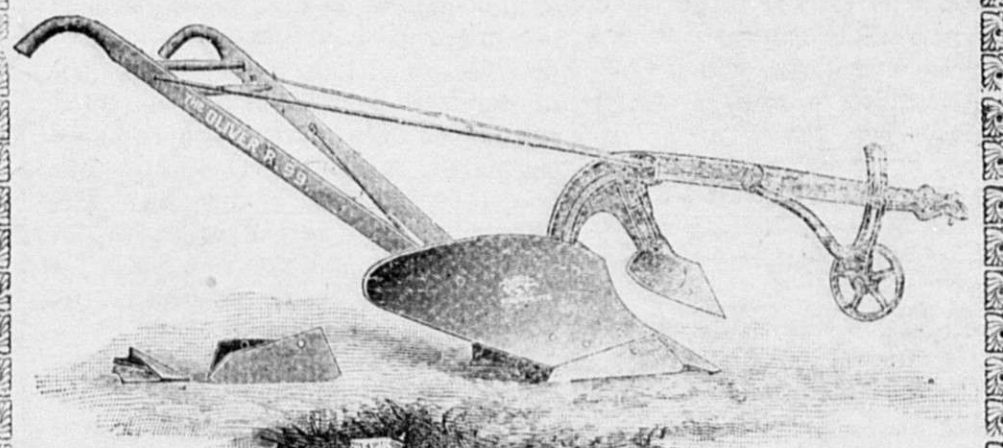

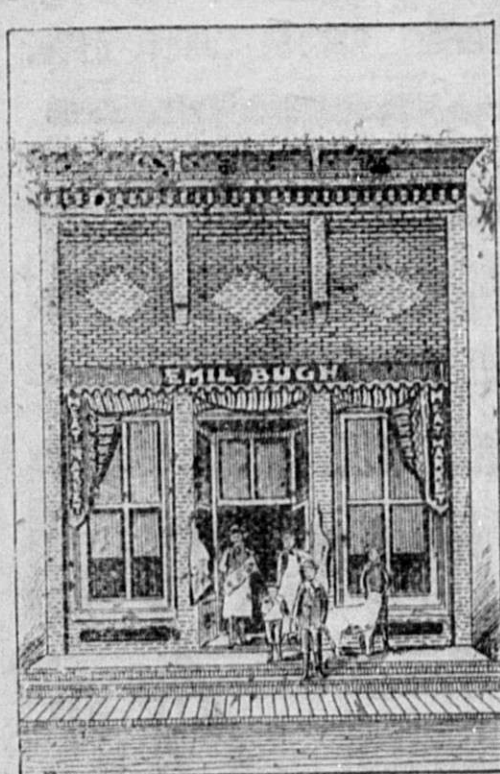
