Depew have been compelled to pay back nearly \$300,000 borrowed on fake security, which they got to keep out of jail, and it is not sure that they will not get into jail yet. Medicine Makers Angry.

Commissioner of Internal Revenue Yerke is being besieged by manufacturers of proprietary medicines who oppose the recent ruling that manufacturers and dealers in medicines of which a chief component is alcoholic spirits must have licenses under the federal revenue tax. The proprietary association is preparing an elaborate brief upon the subject, aimed chiefly at the letter of the ruling, which imposes upon dealers the necessity of ascertaining the character of their wares by December 1, on which date the new ruling is effective. Revenue collectors have been ordered to advise all dealers that they will be liable under the law for handling taxable medicines after that date. The effect of the order, according to manufacturers, will be to demoralize the entire trade before the government chemists have determined what medicines come under the new ruling.

Jewish New Year.

"Rosh Hashona," or the Jewish New Year, will be celebrated the world over next Saturday, September 30.

The New Year festival is one of the most important on the Jewish calendar of religious observances. It is known as the feast of trumpets, and the "Shofer" or ram's horn occupies a very conspicuous place in the day's worship.

The first day of "Rosh Hashona" marks the beginning of the year 5666, which period dates back to creation. The Jewish calendar being computed by the lunar system, the date of the Jewish New Year does not always fall upon the same date on the Christian calendar. For instance, the Jewish New Year in 1904 occurred September 10. The first lunar month of the Jewish year is the month of "Tishri."

Orthodox Jews observe two days of the New Year festival, beginning next Friday evening at sundown and continuing until sundown Sunday evening. In reformed circles, the festival closes at sundown Saturday.

Ten after the first day of the New Year occurs the "Yom Kippur," or Day of Atonement. The day is observed with fasting and prayer, and is looked upon as the most solemn and universally recognized festival observed by the Jews throughout the world.

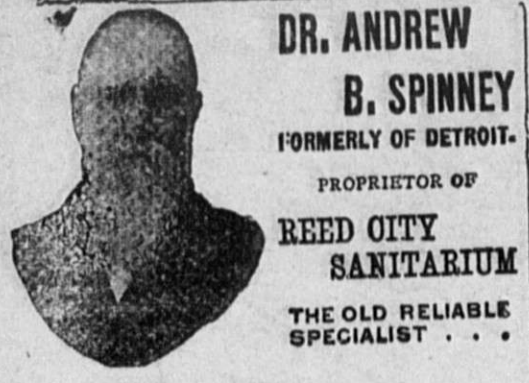
