The clerk reported that he had received a check for \$30.00 from treasurer of Arenac county in payment of costs of this county in case of Arenac county vs. Iosco county, being ordered by the Gregory small pox bill.

The clerk read report of jail inspection made Sept. 8, 1905. Same was on motion ordered received and placed on file.

To the honorable Board of Supervisors:

Your committee, to whom was referred the matter of the purchase of the fair grounds from the Iosco County Agricultural Society would report as follows:

That the committee have made a careful investigation of the abstract of title furnished by the society; we found upon that examination that the society had title to several tracts enclosed and occupied by them with the exception of an undivided one-half interest in all of block 13 and that portion of block 12 situated in the townships of Hemlock and East Tawas. The abstract showed that the other undivided one-half interest was in Milo Eastman. We at once sent the following communication to the officers of the fair society:

Aug. 14, 1905.

Messrs John Preston and Len Patterson, President and Secretary of the Iosco County Agricultural Society.
Tawas City, Mich.

Gentlemen:

In regard to the matter of the purchase of the grounds of the Iosco County Agricultural Society, the undersigned committee of the board of supervisors of Iosco county, having in charge the question of the purchase would say that we have examined your abstract and so far as it goes being completed to 1897, it shows title in your society of the grounds enclosed by you, also of some land outside the fence. The abstract however also shows that Milo Eastman owns an undivided one-half interest in Block 12 and 13 of Fred Scheffer & Co's addition to East Tawas. Your society does not occupy all of said block 12, but does occupy all of said block 13. The committee's opinion in the matter is that before anything further is done that your society should:

- 1st. Complete the abstract to the ground you now occupy down to date so as to show the state of the title to the present time.
- 2nd. To procure whatever title Milo Eastman may have to that part of said block 12 occupied by your society and also his title to the entire block 13, which is all within your society's enclosure.

When this is done if you will notify Edwin Rawden, chairman of our committee, he will call a meeting of the committee and then we can settle the matter.

This communication was mailed to Mr. Patterson and no notice was given your committee regarding anything until Sept. 19. A notice was given last week to call a meeting of the committee for last Saturday, Oct. 7, when a meeting of the directors of the fair society was to be held. Your committee met but was not present at that meeting of the directors, but after the meeting the secretary of the fair society notified the chairman of your committee that the action taken by the directors was to the effect that they would take the matter up in court and settle the title to the land mentioned in Blocks 12 and 13, and he was told to put this request in writing so that your committee could attach same to their report, but this has not been done.

Your committee was of the opinion that they were not justified in taking any final action on this matter of purchase until the fair society could show a good, clear title to all the grounds they occupied and the action taken by your committee was based upon that ground.

We examined the section of the Wilber road recently completed and found same, so far as we could determine, constructed according to specifications and built in first class manner. We also examined the Hemlock Western Extension County Road commencing just west of the East Branch of the Au Gres river, running west to township line between Reno and Grant. The work was commenced on this extension, same being practically all finished and logged. This road, your committee believes will be, when completed, one of the best pieces of work done by the commissioners as it will result in the construction of a road where now there is no road at all and will give the people of the western part of the county a good road over the plains to the good road on the Hemlock.

The semi annual apportionment of primary school money to be made by Superintendent of Public Instruction Kelly Nov. 10 will distribute about \$1,800,000 among the counties of the state. The rate will be \$2.70 for each child of school age in the state. This makes the total apportionment this year \$3 30, as last May's apportionment was at the rate of 70 cents per capita. The increase over last year is 15 cents per capita.

Your eyes will be greatly strengthened by putting the face down into a glass or eye-cup of water the first thing in the morning, and opening them under water, says the Indianapolis News. This is difficult to do at first, but if the water for two or three days be tepid and gradually be made colder by imperceptible degrees until it is no shock to put the face into quite cold water, it will soon become easy and is invigorating and refreshing. They should be wiped after this by passing a soft towel gently from the outer angle inward toward the nose.

The fate of Attorney Jerome in New York concerns the entire country. No matter who is elected mayor of the big city there will be many inquiries as to the vote which was cast for Jerome. He represents a definite something. He stands for enforcement of all laws and for prosecution of all offenders against the law. There is nothing else involved in his campaign. If there are a sufficient number of voters in New York who believe as Jerome believes and have sufficient courage to stand up for their beliefs he will be elected; otherwise some person will be elected who will do nothing. Jerome is running as an independent candidate and his name will not appear on any party ticket.

Many persons are aware that state expenses have been materially increased during the past fifteen or twenty years out of all proportion to the growth in population of the state, although but few will be prepared for the fact that in the last sixteen years the state expenses have more than doubled and in fact nearly trebled. A comparison of state expenses in the year 1889, under the administration of Governor Luce, with those of the year 1905, must constitute an eye-opener to the people of the state. In 1889 the population of Michigan, as nearly as can be estimated from the censuses of 1884 and 1890, was 2,000,000, while in 1905 the population was 2,500,000, an increase of twentyfive per cent. The total expenses of the state government in 1889 were \$3,134,929, while in 1905 the expenses had grown to \$8,287,991, an increase of 270 per cent.
