Judge Sharps, of West Branch announces that under no consideration will he be a candidate for the republican nomination for congress against Col. Loud, next year, nor will he oppose the Colonel's re-nomination.

Senator Doherty, of this district, announces that he will not be a candidate for re-election next fall. Well, if the republican voters of the district had had their say he would not have been a candidate for election last year. The powers that be seem to have selected as his successor either Frank Noble, of Mio, or A. C. Carton, of East Tawas, as these two names appear simultaneously with Senator Doherty's announcement that he will not again seek the nomination. If the next senator from this district is to be chosen by these powers we hope to see Mr. Carton win out as he is a young man well qualified, from a political standpoint, to fill the position.

Graft and bossism received a severe jolt at the various elections held last Tuesday. In New York Tammany, the democratic organization, was defeated in its main fight to defeat W. T. Jerome for district attorney, and Mayor McClellan's election is questioned by William R. Herst, the municipal ownership candidate. Unofficial returns give McClellan 3,485 plurality over Herst. In Philadelphia and Pennsylvania the corrupt republican ring were decisively defeated by the citizens and democratic nominees, William H. Berry, the democratic nominee for state treasurer being elected by 75,000 majority. In Ohio Boss Cox and his machine were utterly routed, the democrats electing the entire state ticket and carrying both houses of the legislature. Gorman the democratic boss in Maryland was defeated. These victories are in no sense party triumphs, but simply an up-rising of the people against machine rule and corruption in politics. That next year will see the same kind of an up-heaving in Michigan and many other states is reasonable to expect. It is no longer a question of party but simply the people against the bosses and ring rule.

Inspiration Institute.

The Institute held in Tawas City, Nov. 3 and 4, was a record breaker. Every teacher in the county except four, was present. Of these one is at present on the sick list. The remaining three should have been present. The needs of their district demanded it.

Mr. Holmes, the conductor proved himself one of the very best instructors that we have ever had the good fortune to listen to. His general talks to the teachers were eloquent, inspiring and practical. He will not be soon forgotten.

Miss Wilsey's talks on Domestic Science and Manual Training were also very practical and suggestive.

Every director should see that his teacher attends these meetings. He should co-operate with the school commissioner in raising the standard of his school. The first essential in accomplishing this is an earnest, active, progressive teacher. One who attends every institute and association except prevented by illness.

Every superintendent and principal in the county except one was present. The readiness of our city and county teachers to co-operate speaks volumes for our Iosco county teachers. No county in Michigan has a more up-to-date, progressive class of teachers.

Much credit is due Prof. Ellsworth and his efficient corps of teachers for the completeness of arrangements made for the comfort and convenience of visiting teachers.

To the citizens of Tawas City many thanks are due for their hospitality.
