**Michigan Crop Report.**  
The following crop report was issued by the department of state last Friday:  
The weather during October was pleasant and very favorable for all kinds of farm work. The temperature according to the Michigan Weather Bureau was less than one degree above the normal throughout the state. The precipitation was also practically normal. These conditions were favorable for securing crops and also for the growth of wheat and rye.  
The condition of wheat compared with an average is 94 in the southern counties, 96 in the central counties, 97 in the northern counties and 95 in the state. Wheat was sown in good season this year and in most cases has made a good growth. Early in the fall it was warm and quite dry, making it favorable for the work of the Hessian fly. Many correspondents report that wheat is infested with this pest, the result of which will depend somewhat upon the weather in the future. Wheat sown late has not made such a good growth but is practically free from the fly.
